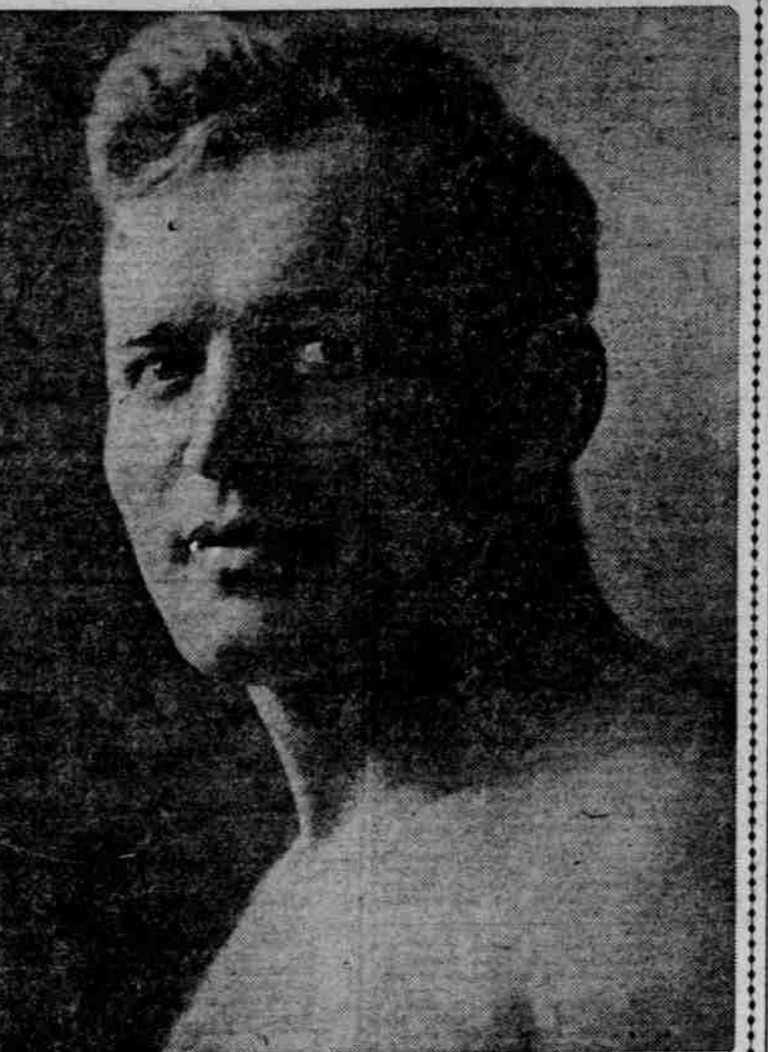
Salt Lake Matman Arrives in Pink of Condition.

MIGHTY BOUT PREDICTED

Contest at Armory Arena Involves Middleweight Championship Title Annexed by Utah Man.

Mike Yokel, Salt Lake City's claimant of the world's middleweight wrestling title, and Bull Montana, Los Angeles movie star and wrestler, are to be unleashed in the arena tonight in what has been widely advertised as a wrestling match, but which is more likely to resemble a riot.

Yokel stepped off the train in Portland yesterday morning looking in splendid shape and ready to give the handsome Bull the tussle he has been waiting for.

By virtue of victories over many of the leading middleweights of the country, Yokel claims the title in his class. There are many, perhaps, who have just claim to it but none who have any better right to the crown than the Utah matman.

The seven experts representing the best authorities in the country were Jack Curley, the Police Gazette, Farmer Burns, George V. Tuohy, Ed. White, Joe Coffey and George B. Foster. Four of seven gave the call to Yokel.

On the Pacific coast, Ted Thya, wrestling instructor of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club, is recognized as a claimant of the middleweight title. It is likely that Yokel, who has been wrestling around Salt Lake City for the last several months and in splendid shape.

There will be two preliminaries on the card, in addition to the main event. One of the preliminaries will find two heavyweights, Young Norbeck of St. Louis and Charles Waters, Fargo, N. D., twisting limbs. This bout is for one fall or two falls at the end of 30 minutes. The winners for the other match have not yet selected. Herbert Greenland will referee the bouts.

BOWLERS BEGIN TOURNAMENT

KIWANIS CLUB TEAM TURNS IN HIGHEST SCORE. Local Quintets Start Northwest International Contests, While Visitors Gather for Meet.

The annual Northwest International Bowling association tournament opened last night at the Oregon alleys with 41 teams of bowlers. The largest entry list of any bowling tournament ever held in the northwest and also sets a record for Pacific coast tournaments.

With Sergeant James Heffron making a speech of welcome in behalf of the local tournament association, the annual tournament got underway yesterday at 5:30 o'clock. Six teams were represented in the first round, which was exceptionally high and stand an excellent chance of landing in the money. Out of the 12 teams which furnished the competition in the two squads, the Kewanis club team turned in the high score, with a total of 2439 pins for three games.

The third highest score was rolled by the Oyster Leaf restaurant five, with a total of 2265 pins. Bowlers from all over the northwest and some teams from California will gather this week for the tournament. The team shooting last night were all local bowlers. The out-of-town teams will get under way the latter part of the week.

Adolph Sartor of Spokane, one of the veteran bowlers of the northwest, was the first out-of-town bowler to reach Portland. Sartor, who is bowling on the Davenport alley team of Spokane, has not missed a tournament in the history of the Northwest International association. In a practice match yesterday Sartor collected 2121 pins in nine games.

OKLAHOMA WINS IN RED RIVER CONTEST

Jurisdiction Over Vast Oil Deposits Affirmed.

STATE BOUNDARY IS FIXED

Supreme Court Ends Controversy With Texas; Lands Valued at Millions Involved.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 11.—Oklahoma won in the supreme court today the first big point in her suit with Texas for jurisdiction over valuable Red river oil fields.

The court based its findings on the terms of the treaty signed in 1819 between the United States and Spain, which consummated the Louisiana purchase. That document, it held, affirmed the original decision in the case of the United States vs. Texas, set the south bank of the river as the true boundary.
