

SENATE DOMINATED BY IRRECONCILABLES

President Faces Difficulty in Foreign Policies.

BREAK SEEN IN OFFING

White House Would Have Support of House, Might Dominate Upper Branch With Democrats.

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WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.—

(Special.)—The easiest thing to understand about our foreign affairs are the composition and the sentiment of the senate committee on foreign relations. This body in the past has shared with the senate committee of finance the position of being the most important committee in the senate.

During the two years' fight on the issue of national debt, the foreign relations committee came into the limelight to such a degree, and by its victory over the White House won such a prestige, that it now outshadows the finance committee.

It is the determination of the foreign relations committee not to surrender the prestige it recently won that accounts largely for the present tension between it and the White House. In this situation there is a factor which the public may overlook and which even the senators themselves may ignore too much. That factor is that, whereas the committee's victory last year was against a president of the opposite party, its fight must now be, if it makes a fight, against a president of its own party.

Voters Must Be Considered.

It is one thing for republican senators to win power away from a democratic president. It is quite a different matter in order to keep that power, to make a fight against a republican president. Republican senators, for their support in their home states, look to republican voters, and republican voters may well give them support in a fight against a democratic president when they would withhold it in a fight against a republican president.

The senate committee on foreign affairs consists of members, ten republicans and six democrats. For practical purposes all power is exercised by the republican majority of the committee. This republican majority, during the present session, will consist of the same senators as during the last session, except that two changes have been made. Senator Harding has gone off the committee to become president and Senator Fall has gone off the committee to become a member of the cabinet.

The republican majority of the senate committee on foreign affairs is, therefore, completely of the irreconcilable attitude in its position on the league of nations and on our foreign relations generally. If any chance McCumber and Kellogg should fall to attain with others their places would be filled by members of the democratic minority, among whom there is at least one and possibly two who, in any test vote, probably would stand with the irreconcilable republican position rather than with their own party. The entire democratic minority of the committee consists of Hitchcock of Nebraska, Williams of Mississippi, Swann of Virginia, Pomeroy of Ohio, Pittman of Nevada and Shields of Tennessee.

The irreconcilables are, therefore, completely in the saddle so far as the committee on foreign relations is concerned. Not only do they have the numbers and the powers in a formal sense, but in addition to that they have the conviction that their attitude is supported by the republican voters in the states from which they come.

Senator New Reflects Sentiment.

For example, the other day when Senator New of Indiana made a statement strongly favoring the Knox resolution, he had just returned to Washington from a three weeks' stay in his home state. Can anyone doubt that Senator New would not have taken that position if he did not feel that it would be acceptable to the republican voters of his state? Senator New comes up for re-nomination and re-election next year. Within barely a year he must fight his political life. His opponents it is expected, will be ex-Senator Beveridge, who is one of the original and most earnest advocates of the league of nations for America. Under the circumstances it is inconceivable that Senator New would have taken the position he did unless he felt it was the best politics.

In the same way, Senator McCumber also is serving the last two years of his term and has therefore, like politicians call the "two-year pulse" of responsiveness to conditions in his state. The irreconcilable feel the degree of opposition to the league of nations, and to relations with Europe in a broad sense, that was reflected in the election last November has been intensified by the wide distribution of his magazine articles, in which he gave a most disagreeable picture of the league of nations, and of European diplomats, especially Lloyd George. The confidence of the irreconcilables that their attitude is supported by the republican voters in the states from which they come, is at least complete.

Business Will Make Demands.

Against this it is to be said that soon or late business conditions in the United States will give rise to a demand for some action looking toward the stabilizing of economic conditions throughout the world, as soon as the farmer and the small business man realize that their troubles are due to the breakdown of the international trade, and that breakdown may be quickly cured by co-operation with Europe, their support of the irreconcilable doctrine of isolation will be modified by the discovery.

So much for the irreconcilable strength within the committee on foreign relations, but within the senate as a whole, and within congress as a whole, it is a different matter. If President Harding should determine not to try to satisfy the irreconcilable position, if he should determine to oppose them, he would have, as things stand today, a considerable chance of winning.

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COLOMBIAN TREATY AGAIN IS ASSAILED

Johnson Group Attacks \$25,000,000 Payment.

LENROOT AGAINST PACT

Administration Leaders Inform President Harding Ratification Is Assured.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 15.—The Colombian treaty was brought under hostile fire today in the senate, as a group of senators attacked the administration's policy of ratification of the pact.

Two republican senators of the progressive group—Johnson of California and Lenroot of Wisconsin—attacked the pending pact for a period of hours as "a wrong to Theodore Roosevelt" and an invitation to every crooked politician in the world to blackmail the United States.

When they had concluded Senator Johnson, democrat, of Georgia, making his maiden speech in the senate, administration leaders supporting ratification and accused Senator Lodge of Massachusetts of having changed from opposition to support "because of an oil concession which Secretary Fall has pipelined into this treaty."

Despite the hot fire from opponents administration leaders, through Senator Curtis of Kansas, sent assurances to President Harding that sufficient votes were in prospect to bring about ratification next Wednesday, the day set for the vote.

Ratification of the treaty with its provision for payment of \$25,000,000 to Colombia for the loss of Panama with its canal rights, Senator Johnson told the senate, would be the first squander of money under the banner of economy. If the United States government has \$25,000,000 to spend, he said, it would be much better to use it for the relief of America's "starving farmers," disabled soldiers and the unemployed.

President Is Accused.

Senator Johnson charged President Harding with "preaching economy in one breath" and in another urging that \$25,000,000 be squandered and brown aways on Colombia for "a mythical purpose which is yet to be disclosed."

We cannot help but recall that a keynote of the president's message to congress only a few days ago was economy. Mr. Johnson continued, "and yet since then we have heard an answer to the president's message. How can those high in the councils of the republican party preach economy and then urge the squandering of \$25,000,000 from the United States treasury?"

Nation Declared Wronged.

Senator Johnson declared the present treaty did more "than wrong" the United States, he added, "it wrongs and dishonors a great nation. The name of Theodore Roosevelt is secure and the Panama canal stands as a great monument. I decline to write on that monument dishonor to my country and infamy to me."

Continuing the attack launched by Senator Johnson, Senator Lenroot declared that the treaty "if ratified will be a stain on the honor of the United States."
