BUSINESS CONDITIONS TO BE DISCUSSED — "Deflation and Optimism" is the subject chosen by C. M. Clark of Philadelphia, chairman of the executive committee of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, for his first address during his visit to Portland, at the regular weekly meeting of the Progressive Business Men's club at the Benson hotel at noon today. Mr. Clark will discuss the general business situation throughout the United States, dwelling on the movements at work tending toward readjustment that will bring the affairs of the country down to normal levels and he will also touch upon the prospects for improved conditions in the near future. Franklin T. Griffith, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, will be chairman of the day.

TUBERCULOSIS CENSUS UNDER WAY — Conditions in Portland and Multnomah county relative to tuberculosis are covered in statistics being gathered by the Oregon Tuberculosis association, in the intensive investigation being made by Miss R. Grace Holmes. The survey is the largest undertaking of its kind yet attempted in Oregon and when completed will be an authentic record of the number of deaths in the city and county from tuberculosis covering several years, the number of living cases, together with facts of family history, number needing hospital treatment, number of children exposed to infection and other facts needed to give a complete picture of existing conditions. Two weeks have been required to compile the records of the city bureau of health, which is co-operating with the association in this work.

PRESIDENT URGES FOREST PROTECTION — Attention to the annual waste by forest fires is called in a special proclamation issued by President Harding, who urges upon governors of the states to proclaim the week of May 22-28 forest protection week, and to request all citizens to spread such education and instruction as shall tend to minimize the present fire losses. The president's proclamation sets forth that annual loss by forest fires in the country approximates \$20,000,000 and the devastation of 12-15,000,000 acres of timber land and loss of other natural resources.

GIRLS TO GIVE ENTERTAINMENT — An entertainment will be given on Friday night in the church school by the girls' reserves, assisted by Mrs. Fred Olson, Victor Johnson, Dr. Ella Welch and Mrs. May Louise Wilson, who will present the play "The Girl Who Came to Stay." The play is a comedy in three acts. The girls' reserves will also exhibit a variety of hand specialties. Geraldine Chenoweth will sing. Helen Klinkewisch will play a solo. Nellie Leland, Dorothy MacKeine, Helen Purth and the Rain-bow chorus will provide numbers. Mrs. Maude Wickertsham will accompany the soloists. A part of the proceeds will go toward the milk fund.

DEPENDENT MAN KILLS HIMSELF — An hour after a physician had told him there was little chance for him to recover from a protracted illness, James Philippelli, an Italian, who lived alone in a shack at 568 Hood street, ended his life by cutting his throat with a razor. He was found by the police shortly after noon yesterday. Philippelli, who was 49 years old, had returned to his home directly from the doctor's office. The body was removed to the morgue. Authorities are endeavoring to get into communication with a brother who lives at Denver.

PRINTING PLANS UP — The school board will consider tonight the matter of installing additional machinery and equipment for the printing department at the Benson Polytechnic high school and supplying additional instructors there. The cost of the study will also be considered. D. A. Grout, city school superintendent, will submit the school calendar for 1921-1922. The meeting will be a conference to be held at 8 o'clock in the office of R. H. Thomas, school clerk.

PRISONER TO BE SENTENCED TODAY — Marshall Francis, president of the defunct Tour Transportation Lines, Inc., who was found guilty by a jury in Circuit Judge Gates' court last week of violating the Oregon blue sky law, will be sentenced by Judge Gates this morning at 9:30. The court held last week that although the corporation was the offender, the president and organizer could be held to answer as an accomplice.

PRINTERS' 44-HOUR WEEK ASSURED — E. H. James, spokesman for Portland land employing printers, said yesterday there was no doubt that the book and job shops would go on a 44-hour week basis next Monday. Wages, however, remained to be adjusted, but he said this would be effected peacefully by means of arbitration. Arrangements for the choosing of an arbitration board are now being made.

Arrangements have been nearly completed for a Whitney Boys' chorus concert at the public auditorium in the near future, with 500 or more voices participating.

WHITE SLAYER GETS FIVE YEARS — Daniel D. Davis, recently convicted of violating the Mann white slave act, who was found guilty in record time by a federal jury, was yesterday sentenced by Judge Bean to serve five years at McNeil's island. Davis was severely censured by the judge when sentence was passed. Davis was charged with having transported a 15-year-old girl to New York for immoral purposes.

CHIEF JENKINS GOES EAST — Chief of Police Jenkins leaves Portland this morning for New York, where he will attend a national conference of chiefs of police. The meeting is for the purpose of establishing a national bureau of police information. He expects to be gone about three weeks. Mrs. Jenkins, who has been ill at St. Vincent's hospital with pneumonia, has improved so rapidly that the chief has decided upon making the trip.

ARTHUR SMILEY ON VISIT — Arthur Smiley, formerly deputy district attorney here, was in Portland yesterday, visiting Walter H. Evans and other friends. Mr. Smiley is now an attorney in New York, with White and Case. He has been general counsel for the American International Shipbuilding corporation for several years. He made the trip to Portland this time by way of the Panama canal.

MR. DODSON IN SEATTLE — W. D. B. Dodson, executive manager of the Chamber of Commerce, was in Seattle yesterday, where he attended a conference in which he sought adjustment of the lumber rates from Portland to the coast. At present a higher rate prevails from Portland than from other coast ports and it is to escape this discrimination that Mr. Dodson went to the sound.

TERMINAL CONFAB TODAY

FINAL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD WITH RAILROADS.

Report of Committee Named to Study Problem to Be Laid Before Council Tomorrow.

The complete report of the committee appointed by Mayor Baker to study the proposed terminal question, including the vacation of streets, will be laid before the city council tomorrow morning at 10 A. M. Members of the committee will hold a final conference with railway officials today to iron out differences that remain between the city and the railways.

City officials expressed their pleasure over the attitude of the railway officials in complying with the majority of concessions sought by the city. However, several members of the city council felt that a definite agreement should be entered into by the railways for the construction of necessary viaducts to carry traffic over the terminals.

Commissioners Bigelow and Barber were appointed by Mayor Baker as members of the committee to meet with the railway officials today and it is believed that the viaduct question will be adjusted satisfactorily both to the city officials and the railway heads.

The committee appointed by the mayor on the terminal question made a preliminary report to the council yesterday, in which the council was requested to hold a meeting to receive the committee's complete report on Friday morning.

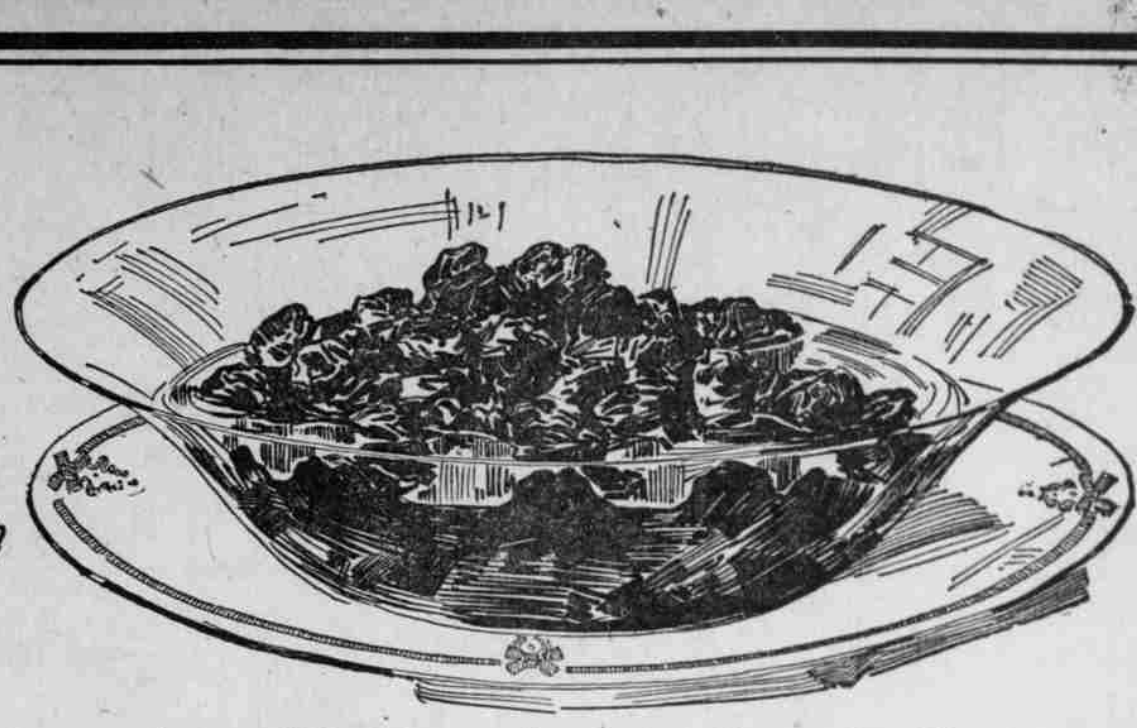
The report informed the council that the committee's negotiations with the railway executives was progressing satisfactorily. The council did not enter into any extensive discussion yesterday on the terminal question.

Traffic Regulation Subject.
 OLYMPIA, Wash., April 27. — Tentative regulations for the control of freight and passenger automobile traffic in the state will be discussed at a conference between the department of public works and motor vehicle operators to be held in Olympia May 11 and Spokane May 13, it was announced. The department of public works assumes jurisdiction of such transportation outside of incorporated cities June 10 under an act passed by the last legislature.

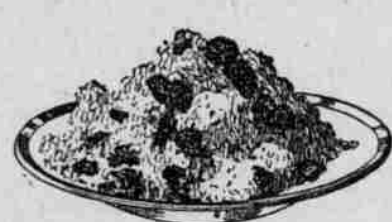

Raisin Rice Pudding

1/2 cup SUN-MAID Seeded Raisins
 1/2 cup milk 1 cup water
 2 eggs 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 may omit

Wash rice and place in double boiler with 1 cup water. Cook until water is absorbed. Add 2 cups milk, cook until rice is tender. To the remaining 1 cup milk add the sugar, spice and well-beaten eggs, combine with rice, add raisins, pour into pudding dish, set in pan of hot water and bake until custard is set.



Raisin Salad

1 cup SUN-MAID Seeded Raisins
 1/2 cup lemon juice
 2 cups coarsely chopped apples or pears
 2 cups coarsely shredded lettuce
 1 cup cream mayonnaise

Wash and dry the raisins, add to the apples and lemon juice. Line bowl or plates with shredded lettuce, pile raisins and apples in center, cover with mayonnaise; serve with Neufchâtel cheese balls and garnish top with small pieces of red, tart jelly. Shredded lettuce is a matter of taste. It will go farther and decorate better if shredded.



Raisin Pie

2 cups Sun-Maid Seeded Raisins
 2 cups corn starch
 4 tablespoons sugar
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind

Cover raisins with 1 cup water and bring slowly to boiling point. Mix corn starch, salt and sugar with remaining cup water and add to boiling raisins, stirring constantly. Allow to boil ten minutes. Add lemon juice and rind and pour into pastry-lined pie pan. Cover with pastry. Put into very hot oven, decreasing the heat after ten minutes of baking. Bake until brown.



Stewed Raisins

Cover one-half package of Sun-Maid Raisins with cold water and soak over night. In the morning add a slice of lemon or orange. Place on the fire in the same water in which they have been soaked and allow to cook slowly for 30 minutes.
