

MARCH INTO RUHR WILL BE DELAYED

Supreme Council to Discuss New Occupation.

INDEMNITY PLAN IGNORED

Berlin Advice Reflects Readiness to Make Another Bid if It Is Washington's Suggestion.

LONDON, April 29.—French occupation of the Ruhr district of Germany, it appears, will not begin as soon as was expected. Details of the plans formulated by Marshal Foch and his subordinates will be discussed tomorrow by the supreme allied council, but it appeared probable today that the march into Germany's coal and industrial regions, if ordered, would not be initiated until late next week.

FRIENDLY SETTLEMENT HOPE

Officials Confer With Foreigners on Reparations Question.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29.—The American government still is hopeful that the reparations controversy between Germany and the allies can be settled by discussion.

The impression gained ground here tonight that the next formal move in the controversy would await the outcome of the meeting at London tomorrow of the allied supreme council.

The chief problem in the whole controversy, in the view here, is to determine how much Germany can pay and make her pay that sum.

GERMAN ENVOY STAYS OUT

Dr. Von Oertzen Refuses to Attend Reparations Session.

PARIS, April 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Dr. Von Oertzen, head of the German war reparations commission, refused to attend a meeting of the reparations commission today for determination of the time and methods of the German payments.

ALBERS' RELEASE PROTESTED

5-HOUR ROW RAGES ABOUT ARMY BILL

Taking Troops From Germany Is Mooted Question.

KAHN WANTS MORE MEN

Other Representatives Say They Will Try to Cut Total Lower Than 168,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29.—The army appropriation bill was shot at from ambush and the open during a five-hour fight in the house today on some of its provisions, especially one which was admitted to mean early withdrawal of American troops from Germany, regardless of action by congress on the Knox peace resolution.

In the midst of the fighting Representative Garrett, Tennessee, acting democratic leader, introduced a resolution requesting President Harding to inform congress, if not incompatible with public interest, whether he intended to order the troops home immediately upon passage of the Knox peace resolution.

Asked pointedly by Mr. Garrett whether rumors that an amendment would be offered directing the president to withdraw troops from Germany, Chairman Anthony of the subcommittee on appropriations, in charge of the bill, declared he had never heard of it.

"But if the secretary of war administers this bill as written," Mr. Anthony added, "he will be forced to withdraw the troops from Germany and decrease other forces outside the territorial limits of the United States."

The peace question bobbed up again while Chairman Kahn was pleading for his amendment to increase the appropriation set aside for the army infantry service for the ground that the whole world was of his balance and no man could say how soon trouble might break.

Mr. Garrett pressed Mr. Kahn, asking if the remark was cryptic. Mr. Kahn declared the secretary of war had based his plea upon early passage of the Knox resolution. In the end the house rejected the Kahn amendment, leaving the total about \$109,000 less than requested.

KNOX RESOLUTION IS UP (Continued From First Page.) We suggest that before this resolution is passed we request the president, through the state department, to enter into communication with the German government and negotiate a treaty by which it will agree to adjust all differences fairly to its own selves and our associates and allies, along the lines set out in the pending resolution. If Germany will not enter into a treaty along these lines of war is in effect, it will not do so when the resolution is repealed. If Germany does not enter into such treaty, we believe it will do so more expeditiously with this war resolution on our statute books than if it is repealed. Nothing can be lost by this course. Much may be gained. In any event, we will have the advantage thereby in our negotiations."
