

PICTURE OF SAVIOR DENIED TO CHILDREN

Incident at Auditorium Leads
to Police Court.

RURAL FAMILY INVOLVED

Manager of Production and City
Join to Rectify Injury Done
Pilgrims to "Calvary."

Flanked on either side by Thomas Freidman and Mrs. Thomas Freidman, the seven little Freidman children, ranging in age from 3 to 13 years, stood in the audience yesterday morning to hear their father's arraignment before Judge Rossman on the charge of offering insult to a door-keeper.

The day before the Freidman family had accompanied the parents from their farm near Beaverton to Portland. For a long time they had lived in anticipation of seeing a real motion picture, for Papa Freidman had promised them that they would go to see the pictureization of the life of the Savior when it arrived in Portland.

When, after a long day of hard work, they finally reached Portland aboard the family milk cart, they encountered an insurmountable obstacle in the person of J. E. Murphy, official Cerberus of the portals of the auditorium where the picture was being shown.

Children under 6 years old were not admitted to the show. Murphy was adamant, those under six years in the Freidman party could not go in to see the picture.

Hot words were exchanged. Murphy told the court that Freidman, in his anger, spat upon him, even as the movie old. Freidman denied it. A policeman was summoned by Murphy, and Freidman was escorted to the city jail, where after several hours a friend came to the rescue and he was released under \$25 bail. Judge Rossman dismissed the charge against Freidman, and suffered him to go on his way in peace.

But unlike most police court cases, this one has a happy sequel. William T. Fangle, manager of the picture theater, who is staging the production, heard of the plight of the family.

"It's a shame," he declared, and forthwith hid himself forth after the Freidman family.

Whole "Tribe" Invited.

As a result, the whole Freidman tribe were the recipients of a personal invitation from Fangle to be his guests at any show they choose, and provide a woman to care for the younger children while the parents and older youngsters are enjoying the picture," he said. "Furthermore they will be my guests at dinner and on the return trip."

Then Fangle explained how the whole fracas came about.

"At the Sunday matinee we allowed children of all ages to attend," he said. "As a result, the theater was a bedlam of assorted child noises, and the picture which they desired to attend, 'I will pay their fare into Portland, have them as my personal guests at any performance they choose, and provide a woman to care for the younger children while the parents and older youngsters are enjoying the picture,' he said. 'Furthermore they will be my guests at dinner and on the return trip.'"

Managers White Interested.

The incident was first brought to the attention of Hal White, manager of the auditorium, yesterday afternoon through the newspapers, and he immediately busied himself with rectifying it.

The first thing he did was to sick the police department on the trail of the Freidman family. He got in touch with Captain Inskeep and asked him to exert every effort to locate Freidman. He also got into communication with the postmaster at Beaverton, seeking Freidman's address.

"Not only will we have him as our personal guest at the show," White said, "but we will bring him and his family in state, as soon as we find him we'll send the mayor's car to bring him and his family to Portland and take them back after the performance. We are all sorry that this thing occurred and we will do our utmost to make it right with the Freidman family."

NEARLY ALL MEATS HIT PRICE TOBoggAN

No Predictions Made as to
Future, However.

HOUSEWIVES ARE HAPPY

Butchers Say Better Cuts Would
Be Cheaper if Women Bought
Others Part of Time.

POULTRY DROPS AGAIN

PRICE ON MARKET NOW IS 31
CENTS POUND.

Eggs Still 26 Cents and May Re-
main There for Several Days.
Butter Is 38 Cents Pound.

Further declines in poultry from 38 cents a pound last week to 31 cents on the market today, are making it possible for many Portland families to enjoy a good chicken dinner tomorrow. The price of 21 cents for hens over four pounds has been met before this season, but not since early in April. During the last three weeks the price increased a few cents each week until it came to last Saturday's price of 38 cents. Hens under four pounds in weight will sell in the market today for 29 cents.

Now that the heavy laying season is practically over, it is expected that the prices of poultry may suffer additional reductions soon. The price of 21 cents a pound is 12 cents less than the price of hens a year ago at this same time of the year.

Eggs at 26 cents a dozen are the same price as last week on the market and may remain at this price for several days.

Butter is 38 cents a pound on the market, a drop of 2 cents since last Saturday. The decline in butter has been comparatively rapid, since on April 5, butter was selling for 45 and 50 cents a pound for the best grades. The wholesale price of sugar has dropped \$1 per 100 pounds during the past week, or 1 cent a pound, making the wholesale price at present 8 cents a pound. That this is a real reduction from what was the Saturday price of 9 cents is a fact. The price of sugar is expected soon.

Boiling Beef Is Down.
Prime steer boiling beef, which sold a few weeks ago for 18 cents a pound, is now 12 1/2 cents for the best grade. Chuck pot roasts, which brought 20 cents a pound, are now 15 cents a pound. Loin steaks are now 30 and 35 cents a pound and T-bone steaks 37 and 40 cents a pound.

"The drop on the steaks has been less than on the cheaper cuts," said one butcher. "A drop in price of 3 cents a pound, however, is a welcome one and we may be able to go lower soon."

Lamb is selling as high as 38 and 40 cents a pound several weeks ago, are now 32 cents. During the war, these same cuts were 45 cents a pound. Breasts of lamb, which were 18 cents, are now 10 cents. One dealer said yesterday that he has tagged breasts of lamb at 5 cents a pound and still been unable to sell them as rapidly as he would.

SHRINERS VISIT SEATTLE

AL KADER WILL STAGE PART
OF CEREMONIAL.

Portland Delegates of 480 to Be
Guests at Dinners and on
Sightseeing Trips.

Four hundred and eighty members of Al Kader temple, Myrtle Shrine, left late yesterday on the special train for Seattle, where the Portland Shriners will "smile with Nile" for two days.

The purpose of the pilgrimage is to show the members of Nile temple in Seattle how the famous "first section" of a ceremonial is staged by Al Kader.

The delegation was one of the largest caravans ever sent out by Al Kader temple, and consisted of the Al Kader patrol, the Al Kader band, the chancellors, the dancing girls and several hundred members.

Officials of Nile temple have made elaborate plans for the entertainment of the Portland Shriners. Special dinners will be served. Sight-seeing trips will be provided and members of Al Kader temple will be the guests of honor at the second section of the ceremonial.
