

PEOPLE NOT BUYING ENOUGH, SAYS GARY

Too Many Declared Waiting for Lower Prices.

SOME PROFITEERING SEEN

Commodity Prices Must Come Down, Then Wages, Says Head of U. S. Steel Corporation.

NEW YORK, May 27.—Full return to satisfactory business conditions will be slow until the minority of business men and workers who have ignored the principles of common honesty are required to the necessity of sound and decent standards of conduct, according to Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation.

Speaking today before the American iron and steel institute, of which he is president, Mr. Gary said the American people are not buying enough to supply themselves fully with the ordinary comforts of life, although they have the disposition and the means to do so. This, he explained, was due to the opinion of the purchasing public that there has not been complete and proper readjustment of prices.

"There is an abundance of new business," he said, "with both ability and inclination to place it, waiting for further adjustments, which will put costs of living, selling prices, wage rates and other general incomes on a relative parity."

Better Conditions Sought.

"Patience, courage and a fair disposition will bring satisfactory conditions in due time."

Present steel selling prices, Mr. Gary declared, will not permit a reduction until wages are further decreased. It would be unjust, he said, further to reduce wage rates before the costs of living are lowered.

Retail prices for many commodities are much too high, declared Mr. Gary, adding that without justification workers' wages have been advanced through reclassification so as to designate them as skilled men.

"I think," he continued, "there has been and still is charged and collected for certain commodities unreasonable and unfair, if not extortionate, prices. They apply to particular lines and persons."

Most Men Declared Fair.

The vast majority of business men and workers are sincere and fair, but there is and perhaps always will be a minority that ignores the principles of common honesty.

He urged that the observance and enforcement of law be insisted upon throughout the world as a necessity for the improvement of the general situation.

The speaker asserted that one of the most hopeful signs of the times was the apparent disposition of the present administration at Washington to aid rather than obstruct the natural and legitimate progress of business.

SILESIA STILL IN CHAOS

ALLIED POLITICAL SITUATION LESS ACUTE, HOWEVER.

British Forces From Rhine Start to Arrive; Poles Said to Have Blown Up Rail Station.

LONDON, May 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—Although the allied political situation with reference to upper Silesia was less acute today, the re-establishment of order in the disturbed area was far from being accomplished, notwithstanding the partial arrival of British troops from the Rhine. Advice received in official circles here report an attack by Polish insurgents Wednesday in the neighborhood of Grosteln, in which there were 100 Polish and German casualties. The Germans captured 14 machine guns.

The Poles were also said to have blown up the Rosenberg railway station and other buildings, forcing the allied personnel to withdraw to Oppeln.

The sending of Under-Secretary of the Interior Freund to the upper Silesian frontier by the German government to prevent members of the free corps from crossing the border was the result of joint representations made to Dr. Rosen, the German foreign minister, by the French and British ambassadors in Berlin yesterday.

A meeting of the supreme council probably will be held early in June to consider the problem. Count Sforza, the Italian foreign minister, has submitted a compromise settlement of the upper Silesian question, which is being studied by Prime Minister Lloyd George and Premier Briand.

BERGDOLL RICHES SEIZED BY NATION

Property of Parent and Brother Also Taken.

MOTHER GETS NOTICE

"Well, When Do I Have to Move," Is Woman's Words When Government Papers Are Served.

PHILADELPHIA, May 27.—All the property of Grover C. Bergdoll, draft evader, who is now in Germany, was seized here today by Colonel Thomas W. Miller, alien property custodian for the United States government, by order of President Harding. With it was seized the property of his mother, Mrs. Emma C. Bergdoll, and of his brother, Erwin Bergdoll, now serving a sentence in the army disciplinary barracks at Leavenworth, Kan., as a draft evader.

The action was taken under a new ruling which permits the government to take over the property of those who have forewarned their allegiance. Mrs. Bergdoll was given five days to turn over an account of all Grover's property in this country, both real and personal.

Value Put at \$836,226.

If this is done the remainder of the Bergdoll property will be returned to her. If it is not, the entire estate will remain in the hands of government officials, and in addition she will be liable to imprisonment for contempt.

The value of the seized estate owned by Grover Bergdoll is estimated at \$836,226.

Bergdoll has been cut off absolutely from his financial resources in this country. If his mother tries to communicate with him she will make herself liable to a jail sentence. If he wants his property he must return to the United States and file a claim. If he does that he must go to prison and serve his term.

Bergdoll to Pay Expense.

Every cent of expense connected with the seizure of the estate will come out of Bergdoll's pocket.

Mrs. Bergdoll and her 48-year-old mother must vacate "Castle Bergdoll," Grover's home, from which he escaped when brought here to search for the "hidden pot of gold."

Mrs. Bergdoll cannot touch a cent of her own money, or of Grover's or Erwin's, until she has satisfied government authorities of the exact ownership, and until Grover's possessions have been separated from those of Erwin and her own, she cannot cash a check.

BERGDOLL IS HELD 'ENEMY'

Seizure Declared to Have Been Contemplated Several Weeks.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, by reason of his escape to Germany, is now held by the American government to be an "enemy" within the meaning of the trading with the enemy act. This is explained in a statement by Thomas W. Miller, alien property custodian, which was made public today at his office here.

"This move has been in contemplation for several weeks and has been the subject of conferences between the president, the attorney-general and the alien property custodian," the statement said. "The state department has amended the general trade board license of October 2, 1920, which permitted Bergdoll to enjoy the benefit of his property in this country."

MARINES OFFER PLANES

CRAFT TO BE USED IN TEST OF BOMBING WARSHIP.

Substitution Made When Army Refuses to Lend Land Machines for Problem.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Four marine corps Martin bombing planes will be used to test the ability of land planes to bomb warships in the problem against the radio-controlled battleship Iowa off the Virginia capes on June 28, the navy department announced tonight after the war department had served notice that no army land-type airplanes would participate.

The army, however, will use seven seaplanes and four airships, it was said. Decision to withdraw its land planes was reached, it is understood, because the war department did not consider it advisable to use them unless the Iowa was within 30 miles of the shore. Naval members of the joint army-navy committee in charge of the experiments, on the other hand, are said to hold that the tests, to be of value, should be conducted at least 60 miles from the coast.

Under the conditions of the problem the Iowa, controlled by radio from the battleship Ohio, five or six miles distant, will be from 50 to 100 miles offshore and steaming toward land when the air forces are sent out. Some details of the mechanism by which the Iowa is controlled were made public tonight. The apparatus consists of a standard radio transmitter aboard the control ship and a receiving aerial on the Iowa, with special radio receivers, amplifiers and relays for converting the signals into a form that will control the Iowa's steering gear, engine throttle and fuel oil valves. The officer in charge of the Iowa, stationed on the bridge of the Ohio, will have charge

OF THE CONTROLLED SHIP, WHICH WILL HAVE NO ONE ON BOARD.

By a gyroscopic compass the Iowa may be set on a given course and by a special radio signal the vessel may be stopped. The control system, which is American, it is said, can be shifted to aircraft.

NEW GUN POWERFUL ONE.

Weapon Fires Bullet That Will Pierce Tank Armor Plate.

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., May 27.—The United States army has developed a 50-caliber machine gun capable of firing a bullet which at 200 yards will penetrate the one-inch armor plate of battle tanks, Major Leo Wright, army ordnance department, announced today at the annual convention of the ordnance section of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers at Rock Island arsenal.

The gun is modeled along the lines of the Browning machine gun developed during the war and weighs 65

Chinese Desertions Costly.

HONOLULU, T. H., May 27.—(Special.)—Chinese, en route from the Orient to Central and South American coast ports, who prefer the sunny climate of Hawaii, have cost local steamship companies \$8000 in the last month. According to federal authorities eight Chinese voluntarily jumped ship while vessels were in port. The federal law fines the vessel allowing a Chinese to land \$1000 for each illegal entry.
