CANOE FETE IS SUCCESS

GAMMA IOTA SORORITY TAKES
FIRST PRIZE WITH FLOAT.

Junior Week-End Closes With
Gorgeous Display of Small
Craft on Mayrs River.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 31.—(Special.)—Originality and beauty were evident in every one of the 32 floats competing for prizes in the canoe fete held Sunday afternoon at the close of junior week-end. Gamma Iota, a sorority, took first prize with a blue, flower-covered canoe, with a huge butterfly poised for flight on the bow. The entry was named "The Butterfly Blues." Jessie McDonald of Portland was in the canoe, appropriately costumed.

A tie for second prize between Pi Beta Phi and Alpha Rho sororities was announced. The "Pi Phi" entry was called "The Joy Ship." Confetti, balloons and streamers gave a holiday appearance to the four co-eds in the canoe. Alpha Rhos had a statue called "The Wanderer," significant because of the disappearance of the statue "Hebe," commonly called the "Iron Lady," from the campus last year. A co-ed was standing in the center of a large round basin in exactly the same posture as that maintained by "Hebe" when she is in place.

"Noah's Ark" took third place, and was pronounced by many spectators the most original of all entries. Stuffed animals of every description were on the decks of this craft. Honorable mention was given several entries but judges mentioned a lack of attention to small details in carrying out the effects desired, as being the chief difficulty with which to contend.

The Oregon Agricultural college band gave a concert lasting a full hour. Nearly every student in college and hundreds of visitors and townsfolk were lined up on the banks of Mayrs river, and on the bridge overhead. "Hap" Kuehn of Portland gave an exhibition dive from the bridge.

Prizes consisted of a silver loving cup, first; box of cigars, second (men's); box of candy, second (women's). Judges were Professor Beatty, Norma Olsen and William Ball.

AUTO HUNT PREMATURE

Grandson Borrows Car and Owner
Notifies Sheriff.

HOOD RIVER, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Howard Cooper an Oregon Agricultural college ex-student and naval ensign, set the stage for county wide excitement today when he appropriated his grandfather's automobile to show friends the Columbia river highway. W. F. Laraway, the grandfather, left his car on a street here, and the grandson, motoring in from his father's east side ranch, was forced to leave his own machine east of the city because of highway paving. Sheriff Johnson was notified of the supposed theft.

Mr. Cooper arrived in town, and the disappearance of the machine was explained, but not before Sheriff Johnson had notified all surrounding cities and had requested the Portland police to apprehend the thief.

SPOUSE CALLED JEALOUS

Woman Suing for Divorce Declares
Husband Followed Her.

But twice since her marriage last February has Lucy May Thompson ventured into the business district of Portland alone and on both occasions her husband, George Thompson, followed her and contrived to meet her somewhere to make certain she had not planned a clandestine meeting with a man friend, she complained in a suit for divorce filed in the circuit court yesterday.

On one occasion he called a man on the telephone and accused him of meeting Mrs. Thompson, she said.

Dead Man Blamed for Accident.
ABERDEEN, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—A coroner's jury Sunday decided that Fred Fredrickson, who was killed in a collision between his motorcycle and an automobile on the entrance road here Saturday, was riding at an excessive speed, thereby exonerating the driver of the car. Services were held Sunday for Fredrickson, and the body was sent last night to Olympia for interment.

ENGINE AIR WRECK CAUSE

Joe A. Reese Tells Theory
of Accident Monday.

Lack of Power to Keep Machine Up
Declared to Have Resulted in
Injury of Three Men.

Failure of the engine to pick up was given by Joe A. Reese of the Palace hotel as the cause of the airplane accident at the Rose City speedway Monday afternoon in which three men were injured and an airplane wrecked. Reese was a passenger, and suffered slight injuries. Reese denied that the tripod of the camera with which he and G. E. Sanderson, 536 East Fifty-first street, were preparing to take pictures of the motorcycle races, had got entangled with the control. He said that a report that someone in the machine had put a foot in the control so that the pilot could not right the machine was also untrue.

"It was merely that the engine failed to pick up and consequently did not have the power to sustain the machine in the air," said Mr. Reese.

This theory of the accident was upheld by C. S. Piper, who is associated with G. E. Sanderson. Mr. Piper said that he was at the take-off and noticed that the engine failed to exhibit the proper power. Both men said that the engine had not been warmed up before the take-off, owing to the desire to get pictures of the races, which had already started.

The injured men were said to have told hospital authorities Monday afternoon that they thought the interference of the tripod leg had caused the smash-up.

RESIDENCE IS DESTROYED

Fire Burns Large Home in Morton
and Damages Another.

MORTON, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—A few minutes before 4 o'clock Sunday morning fire broke out in the 13-room house of Mrs. Hans Hugh, known as the W. W. Keene place. The building was destroyed. The loss was about \$2500.

The Robert Orr family lived next door and but a few feet away. Their house was afire in dozens of places, but the fire department saved it. Mrs. Orr had given birth to a boy Friday morning and the situation was

critical for her and the baby. She was taken to the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. LaChance, while the household goods were moved. Mr. Orr's loss was about \$400.

DIVE MAY PROVE FATAL

Newberg Youth's Back Broken in
Plunge in River.

NEWBERG, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Willie McVey, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam McVey of this place, may die as the result of an accident while diving in the Willamette river Sunday. He was diving from a log, and, although a good swimmer, exhibited signs of distress when he came up. His companions went to his rescue and pulled him out.

He was taken to the local hospital and examination showed that he had broken his back near the neck. He has been paralyzed from the arms down since the accident, and a specialist from Portland declared there was little hope for his recovery.
