

STATE CLUBWOMEN MEET IN PENDLETON

Mayor Hartman Welcomes
Visitors to City.

MANY DELEGATES ARRIVE

Judge Lowell Delivers Address on
"The New Matriarchate"; Re-
ception Is Stated.

PENDLETON, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—The 21st annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs opened tonight in the Umatilla county library. Twenty-one years ago tonight the first state convention of the federation was held here. Mrs. C. B. Wade was the first president. Mrs. John Halley, who made the address of welcome to the club women of Pendleton, was president of the first federated club.

George Hartman, mayor of Pendleton, today bespoke the welcome of the city and turned over the keys of Pendleton to Mrs. Ida B. Callahan, state president.

Mrs. Charles H. Castner of Hood River responded for the clubs. Band Meets Delegates. The afternoon train from Portland with delegates from that city, Roseburg, Medford, Newport, The Dalles, Prineville, Hood River, Tualuma, Bend and way points was met at the depot by the boys' band of Pendleton and a reception committee. The state officers rode to the library in an old stage coach with Mrs. Alexander Thompson sitting with the driver. The delegates were cordially received by waiting hostesses and the fine homes of Pendleton were thrown open to the visitors.

More Delegates Expected. Several other delegates will arrive in the morning. Mrs. Thomas G. Winter reached here late today. She will be the principal speaker Wednesday night and guest of honor at a reception. Early tomorrow morning a breakfast will be given for Mrs. Winter at the home of Mrs. John Adams.

Prineville has nine delegates here and Roseburg, nearly 400 miles away, has eight.

Newport Seeks Convention. Newport Woman's club, the most recent acquisition to the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, is bidding for the 1922 state convention. The club is represented by Mrs. L. C. Smith and Mrs. C. C. Presley who are enthusiastic Newport "boosters."

They have some attractive badges which they are distributing and Newport is sending up some handsome rhododendrons to the Pendleton meeting. Tillamook, it is rumored, is willing to invite the federation to their city.

Medford is anxious to entertain the federation but may step aside in favor of Newport and make a plea for the 1923 convention.

Eugene Also Is Ready. Eugene, too, is ready with an invitation to entertain the federation and if it goes to Medford may cooperate with southern Oregon.

J. H. M'LACHLIN IS SHOT

VETERAN FEDERAL DEPUTY
MISTAKEN FOR BANDIT.

La Grande Posse Opens Fire When
Veteran Peace Officer With
Gun Ignores Command.

LA GRANDE, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—J. H. M'Lachlin, veteran peace officer of eastern Oregon now a deputy federal officer, was shot in the back early this morning by members of a party from the sheriff's office who were searching for holdup men. Previous to the attack, a motor party returning to La Grande through the canyon near Hilgard, reported that unknown persons had appeared in the road with certain orders, which, because of the noise of the car, they were unable to hear.

The driver, J. G. Holm, local groceryman, backed his car onto a bridge and planned to rush at the men should they open fire. However, the alleged holdup man, after seeing who was in the car, disappeared and the party came on to La Grande, reporting to the sheriff.

Soon afterward a small posse left La Grande, and on arriving near the scene saw a man sitting on the river bank with a gun across his knees. The party ordered him to throw up his hands, but not heeding the command M'Lachlin paid no heed and a shot was fired. As soon as it was discovered that it was M'Lachlin, the man who led the party which captured two of the slayers of Sheriff T. L. Taylor, the injured man was hastened to La Grande, where he received medical attention. It was said the wound was not serious. M'Lachlin was waiting for a car to come through from Pendleton, which he believed carried liquor.

Later, two men, giving the names of Julian Benenich and Joe Arrat, were arrested in the canyon driving an automobile which carried a load of bonded whisky. The car came from Pendleton, but the men said their home was in Idaho.

Fire Destroys Logging Camp.
DALLAS, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—

Fire that had been set to burn slashings on the lands of the Willamette Valley Lumber company above Black Rock, got beyond control, due to the high wind, and burned fiercely for several days, spreading over several miles of logged-off land. It did not get into standing timber, however, and the only damage done was the destruction of seven bunk houses of the company at one of its logging camps.

BERRIANS TO HAVE QUEEN

Newberg Also Will Enter Float in
Portland Rose Fete.

NEWBERG, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—A popular voting contest was under way here for the berry queen to ride in the Newberg Berrian float at the Portland Rose Festival. More than a dozen candidates have been entered, and a keen interest was anticipated, as each community is vying for the honor of naming the queen. Plans for the float have been received from the artist in Portland and are on exhibition in a local store window.

The Berrians have made arrangements with the local band whereby should they open fire. However, the Berrian band and will march in the Rose Festival in connection with the float and display being entered by the Berrians. Five hundred windshield banners were being printed and will be put on every automobile available. Badges also were being printed and will be sold to everyone going to Portland for the Rose Festival. Both the banners and badges will bear the name "Berrians of Newberg" and a berry design.

Adventists, Camp Meeting to Open.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 31.—Seventh Day Adventists in the upper Columbia conference, which comprises all of eastern Washington, the Idaho "panhandle" and five of the northern counties of Oregon, will hold their annual camp meeting here June 2 to 12. More than 800 visitors are expected to attend. One hundred tents, each large enough to lodge one family, have been pitched and rooms will be provided for others. Meals will be provided by the cooking department of the Walla Walla college. A huge pavilion, capable of seating 1000 persons, has been erected.

\$56,617 SUIT IS FILED

RAYMOND VENEER COMPANY
ALLEGES PAY SHORTAGE.

Dant & Russell, Inc., Declared to
Have Broken Contract for
Washington Lumber.

Damages of \$56,617.20 for alleged breach of contract and recovery of \$6,518.03 said to be due on goods delivered were demands in a suit of the Raymond Veneer company of Raymond, Wash., against Dant & Russell, Inc., of Portland, filed in the local circuit court yesterday.

On February 24, 1920, Dant & Russell agreed to purchase from the veneer company 225 carloads of fir, spruce and hemlock rotary cut veneer at \$80 per thousand board feet, it was alleged. On October 19, 1920, after 148 cars had been shipped, an order to stop shipments was received by the mill. An order to resume shipments was made last February, and in February and March four more cars were delivered.

It was alleged that the veneer in the last four cars was unpaid for and that there is owing \$6,518.03 on that account. The further charge was made that only 133 cars were shipped, though the plaintiff was ready and willing at all times to deliver the 225 cars contracted for. The remaining 92 cars would have delivered 1,708,760 board feet, on which a total profit of \$50,099.20 would have been realized, it was asserted.

An insight into profits being made during the period of inflation was given in the figures by which this profit was estimated. The veneer was sold for \$60 a thousand board feet. The Raymond Veneer company estimated that it would have cost the company \$30.68 per thousand feet to manufacture, leaving \$29.32 profit on every thousand feet sold.

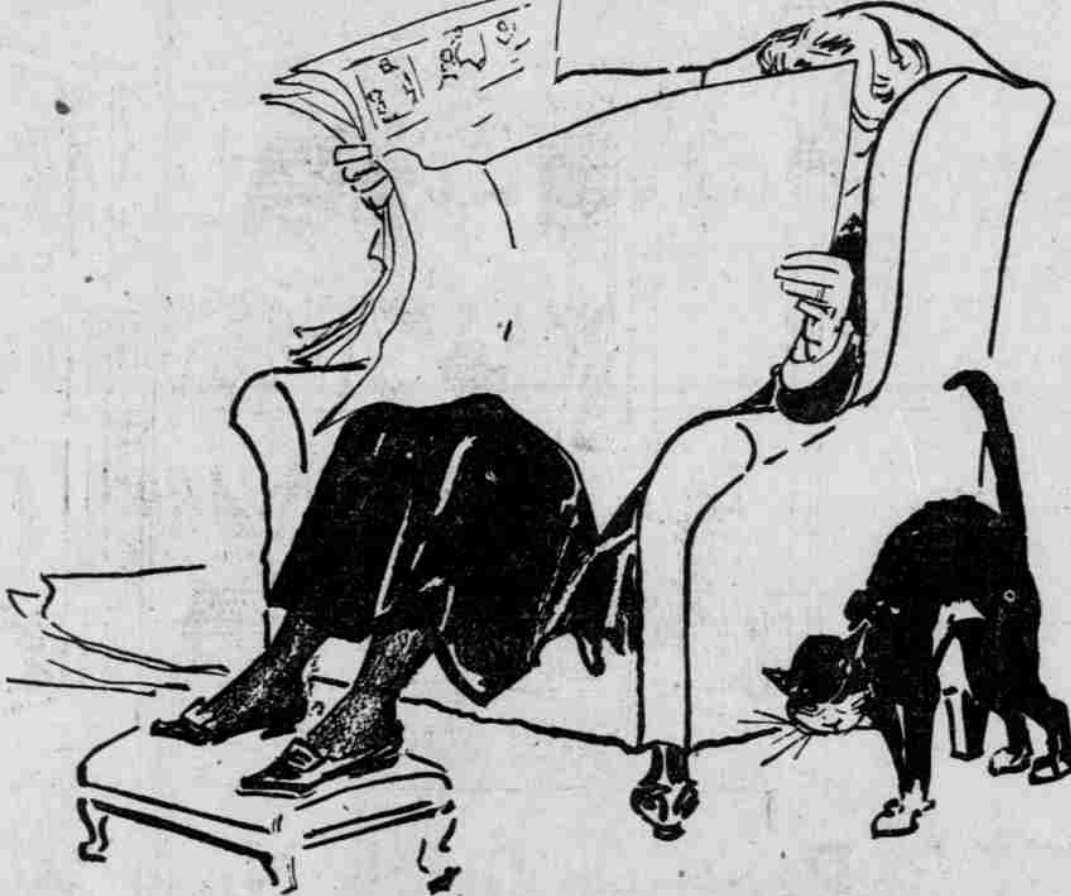

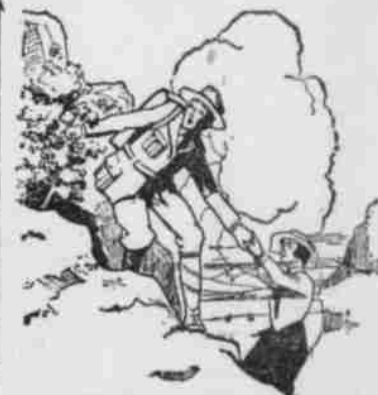
