

CONTRACT IS LET ON \$327,500 SCHOOL

Lawthorne-Buckman Building Authorized by Directors.

BOARD DEFIES NEW LAW

Publication of Magazine Will Be Continued by Benson Polytechnic Students.

After seven years of suspended activity in building permanent school buildings, the board of directors yesterday resumed work by letting the contract for the new Hawthorne-Buckman building, at a total cost of approximately \$327,500.

The building will be a creditable one for the district, as modern in every respect as could be desired. Director Woodward remarked it was pity that so much money had been spent on portable school buildings, which are erected so fast that they are discarded before they are worn out.

In rather a heated moment at yesterday afternoon's meeting, the directors went on record as declaring their intention to violate one of the state's newest laws, that passed at the recent session of the legislature which forbids students of schools to engage in the printing business, here it would in any way cause impulsion with commercial print.

This made it impossible for the Benson Polytechnic students to issue "Tech," the school organ, from the Benson printing shop.

Law Is Defied. Directors expressed themselves as opposed strongly to the law. They decided to have the "Tech" printed at the school and let the authorities try to prevent them if they wished.

Differences existing between Superintendent Churchill and the state education department and the Portland board over the division of the vocational training fund came to the surface again, and Clark Thomas was directed to write another letter to Churchill insisting upon the aims of the Portland district to its share of the funds, after which he reported to the board.

District Cuts \$26,000. It appeared in the discussion that the Portland district contributed last year no less than \$26,000, or 26 per cent of the funds set aside for the state for vocational education.

Money to Be Borrowed. The board adopted a resolution to borrow \$100,000 when and as needed for the district, but the amount of the loan until funds shall be forthcoming in the fall from tax payments.

Request of the Holman school rent-teacher association that a vacant room in the school be fitted with a sink, gas stove and cupboard for the use of the association in the kitchen in the assembly hall be changed, met with considerable favor after it was recalled by director Woodward that the organization had contributed \$30 to help fit a wall and steps at the school some time ago.

While Present Stock Lasts. The matter was referred to a committee to see if the stock could be granted.

Request of the Americanization department for the schools of the district was again considered briefly, it was referred for future action.

F. D. WHITING FINED FOR PRACTICING WITHOUT LICENSE. Defendant Admits Selling Cancer Cure Preparation, but Denies Posing as Doctor.

The convicted man, whose offices are in the Broadway building, said he had been conducting experiments with his solution for 20 years. "Oh, my, three times that much!" insisted the pseudo-physician. His statement did not impress the judge greatly.

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Arson Suspect Arrested. ABERDEEN, Wash., June 2.—(Special.)—Tony Bullank and Phillip Kontar are under arrest here as a result of investigation of a fire at 403 Mohler street, South Aberdeen, May 25.

Whiting attempted to deny that he ever posed as a physician, though he is listed "physician and surgeon" in the telephone book, though he signed receipts as "Dr. F. D. Whiting" for money paid him by victims of a cancer cure, which two husbands told the court resulted in the deaths of their wives, and through circulars describing in glowing terms the effectiveness of the "Whiting solution" were signed "Dr. Hyde & Whiting."

On the witness stand Dr. Leon W. Hyde, with whom Whiting is associated, said that he could not tell the percentage of cancer cases which he treated, but insisted that he had been a regular physician since 1897 and had practiced as such in Oregon since 1906. He said Whiting manufactured the solution and he prescribed it.

Whiting told the court that he had never had anything to do with the cases of two women who had died, and whose husbands were complaining with witnesses against him, except to refer them to Dr. Hyde, who gave them the cancer "cure." Whiting said he furnished 40 gallons of his solution in one case, but later

CHINA RELIEF IS NEEDED

OREGON IS FOURTH IN PER CAPITA DONATIONS. A. L. Mills Declares Much Remains to Be Done as Result of New Request for Assistance.

Oregon stands fourth in the United States in per capita contributions to China relief, according to a statement received by A. L. Mills, state treasurer, from Thomas Lamont, national director, yesterday.

Oregon's contributions in money and foodstuffs totaled more than \$36,000. While many other states have far exceeded the amount in dollars and cents, yet in per capita contributions this state is exceeded by only Michigan, North Carolina and Pennsylvania.

"We have now in good pledges more than \$16,000," said Mr. Mills, "and when these are forwarded we expect that Oregon will be first in proportionate giving for China relief."
