

BILL BARRING BEER AS MEDICINE AILED

Real Enforcement of Prohibition Held Aim.

MEASURE IS UP TO HOUSE

Author in Report Dealing With Supplement to Volstead Act Pleads Necessity.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 2.—Chairman Volstead of the house judiciary committee in a report today dealing with his bill to supplement the Volstead act, declared it presented only such essential legislation as was deemed necessary to bring about a fair and honest enforcement of prohibition.

The report held that the chief purpose of the bill was to prevent use of beer and wine as medicine, which would be permitted under an opinion by former Attorney-General Palmer. "The effect of that opinion," it said, "is to take from the commissioner of internal revenue control of permits and prescriptions and lodge that control in those who would profit by their abuse."

Declaring that evidence presented showed beer never had been recognized as a medicine, the report quoted the attorney for the Anheuser-Busch company, Inc., to the effect that if beer was permitted as a medicine "it would be impossible to enforce the prohibition law."

Discussing the provision which would prohibit importation and manufacture of liquor while the present stock holds out, Chairman Volstead said that on January 1 the stock on hand was 49,216,873 gallons, while at the end of March it had been increased by 109,000 gallons, most of it being turned out by three distilleries.

The report explained that the bill was designed to prevent manufacture of medicine at certain periods, which could be used for beverages. The bill, the report showed, would give the attorney-general concurrent power with the commissioner to revoke permits.

The bill was formally reported to the house today.

LIQUOR GOES INTO CESSPOOL

230 Quarts Dumped by Jackson County Authorities.

MEDFORD, Or., June 2.—Under the direction of the guard 230 quarts of various liquors, ranging from the crude moonshine of amateur distillers to historic Old Crow, were destroyed late Wednesday afternoon being dumped into a cesspool at the courthouse. The destruction of the forbidden beverages was in accordance with court orders to destroy all confiscated liquor at certain periods.

During the operation the air was heavy with the scent of liquor and as the news spread Jacksonville enjoyed a rush only equaled in its pioneer gold days. Some of the firewater dumped into the sewer was seized on the Saturday night and some of it was the product of home stills, but Sheriff Terrill stood guard and none of it was salvaged.

CARLOADS OF WHISKY FIRED

Seized Liquor Worth \$150,000 Destroyed at Blaine, Wash.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., June 2.—The largest funeral pyre to the memory of John Barlow since national prohibition went into effect, according to customs officers, was celebrated at Blaine yesterday when whisky estimated at "bootleg prices" to be worth \$150,000 was burned by L. F. Flanagan, deputy United States marshal, by order of Judge Neterer of the federal court in Seattle.

The whisky had been seized in carload shipments from Vancouver, B. C., to points in the United States.

much giggling and handclapping from the feminine contingent of the audience. Later President Harding carried the suggestion forward into a eulogy of the part women play in the world.

"The measure of highest achievement is the measure of nobility," he said, "and when I say that I mean also the noblest womanhood. Because after all nothing has been wrought in this country, never a striving for a high ideal, that was not somehow inspired by the love of mother, wife or sweetheart. I shall not venture where the admiral and secretary have gone in dealing with that subject, but I warn you of one thing, you need not avoid the married state, but you will command less after you enter it than you did before."

Denby Is Commended.

The president commended Secretary Denby and drew from his experience an object lesson for the young midshipmen.

"I was very much interested," he said, "when the secretary made reference to his service as an enlisted man and an officer in the marine corps and as an enlisted man and officer in the navy. That is why he is secretary of the navy. A man who can get all the viewpoints in the man fitted to lead, so I commend to you young gentlemen to try to get all the viewpoints and always bear in mind that he always fights best who always fights justly."

"A good deal is said now-a-days," said Mr. Harding, "about preparing for defense. I know nothing nobler in this world than the defense of one's own country. That is an inherent

thing in man, planted in the human breast by God almighty. There wouldn't be any civilization today if men were not willing to give their all for its preservation.

"But the preservation of the established order is one thing and it is highly essential, while crusading for a new order is quite another thing. Sometimes most nobly inspired, sometimes most ill-advised, I can believe the ideal for our country is a sensible blend of the maintenance of the established order and the enthusiasm of the crusader."

Unafraid America Wanted.

"I want to say to you, young men, I hope you'll never be called upon to draw a sword nor fire a gun except in the expression of the customary amity and respect. And I promise you that while I am president, you'll never be called to fire a gun except you can do it with the American conscience, with which you can answer to God."

"I do not want to be misunderstood. I want an America unafraid, but I want you to help make a republic of conscience, a republic of sympathy and a republic of high ideals."

In presenting the commissions to the class, Secretary Denby struck a new note in urging that professional attributes of the naval officer be combined with respect for the enlisted force.

Don't Be Snobs, Is Advice.

"You must so conduct yourselves that your superiors in rank shall respect you, your equals love you and those under your command obey you with a smile," the secretary said. "You must be officers, but not snobs. Your commissions are ill bestowed unless you are free from a foolish vanity of rank."

"Pride should be yours, a very just and honest pride in your uniform. That pride may be best shown by so wearing that uniform that all must honor it and you."

"No one understands better than I with what great respect the enlisted man looks upon an officer who is 'every inch a man.' The enlisted man will quickly size you up. He quite properly feels that he is too much of a man himself to want to be commanded by one lacking any essential element of manhood."

Navy's Deeds Reviewed.

Reviewing the deeds of the navy, Secretary Denby bespoke in the new officers a spiritual consecration to duty.

"If you are to be fit inheritors and transmitters of the glorious traditions of the navy," he said, "you must dedicate yourselves today to lives of self sacrifice and absolute devotion. Most particularly our country's honor and material interests are in your hands."

"When the red day comes—if come it must; when in the flame of battle your souls are taken from you under our country's flag, you will die as gentlemen should die, honest and simple and brave, regretting nothing and glad that you have so lived as to merit so worthy a death."

"I do not anticipate, however, that if you live as officers should live, and if the navy keeps up its standards of material and men," Secretary Denby continued, "that you will ever be called upon to offer that great sacrifice upon your country's flag."

You will be called upon to live for your country and that is hard because it is a matter of constant watchfulness."
