CIVIL SERVICE RATINGS ANNOUNCED

Ratings attained by successful applicants in Portland civil service examinations held during April were announced yesterday by W. E. Marion, clerk of the board. For the position of deputy building inspector Carroll F. Kuris, an ex-soldier, headed the list with an average of 96 per cent. Walter A. Trout was second highest with an average of 89.4 per cent, and Edward A. Dunlap, third with 83.9 per cent. John H. Stewart, Orrin D. Whiteman, John G. Spence and Artie Starr were also successful in passing the examination. Three applicants passed the examination for plan and desk clerk. They were Walter A. Benard, 86.4 per cent; Rolfe A. Berry, ex-soldier, 81 per cent, and Walter C. Lynn, 75 per cent.

BRIDGE DAMAGE FEARED—Fear that the scouring action of the flood waters of the Columbia may have endangered the piling supporting the Interstate bridge was expressed in a communication from G. T. Forsyth, engineer to Multnomah county commissioners yesterday. The engineer reported the condition of the fills to be good, saying that what erosion had occurred there was not dangerous and might have been expected by reason of the fact that the fills never were intended to serve as dikes. Examination of the bridge foundations by divers may be made shortly to determine if there has been any damage.

JOY DECLARED JUSTIFIED

ALL RIGHT TO GET "LIT UP,"
SAYS GERALDINE.

"Times Have Changed Since You Were Young," Declares California Girl to Police Judge.

Geraldine DeWitt, with a wealth of rouge and a dearth of eyebrows, told Judge Rossman in police court yesterday that she thought it perfectly proper for a girl to get "lit up" on "Dago red," smoke cigarettes and go on automobile parties with "the boys," providing they picked their company.

Geraldine, who is but 18 years old, and the daughter of a Red Bluff, Cal., druggist, came to Portland about eight months ago, she said, because the home town was "too slow" for a girl of her tastes. She told the judge that times had changed vastly since she was a youth and that things which were frowned upon then now are considered quite the proper thing. She likewise admitted to the court that she thought she was the herald of a new era for womankind in this country.

The girl was arrested on a charge of disorderly conduct. The last automobile party she attended ended disastrously when the girls became intoxicated and staged a free-for-all fight in the automobiles. The other girls await hearing in the juvenile court as a result of the fight. Judge Rossman delayed passing sentence until the case is further investigated. He said he probably would arrange to have the girl returned to her parents.

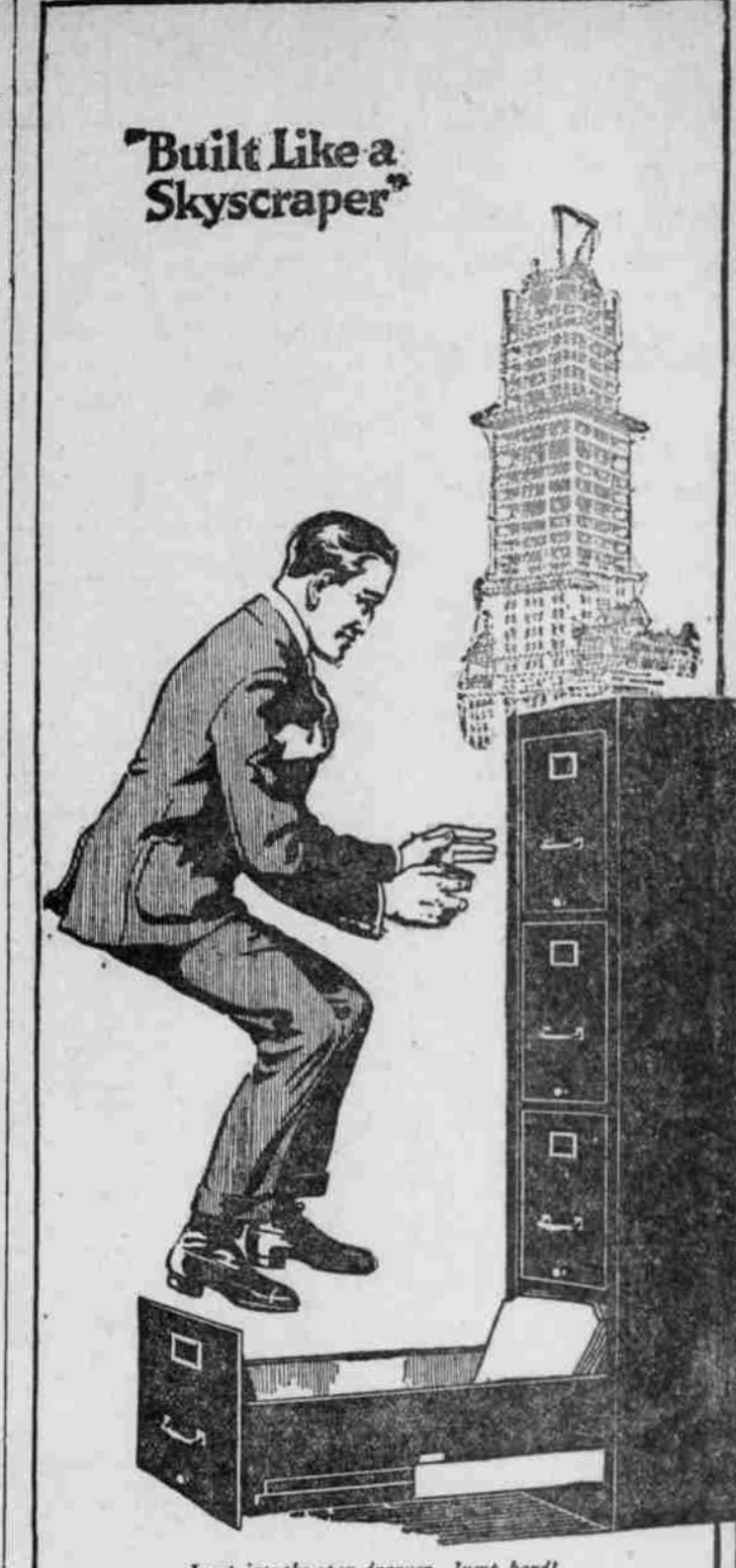
