

SOLDIERS' BONUS SEEMS WINNER

Marriage Bill Develops Heavy Opposition in Some Parts.

ROAD BONDS FAVORED

Excitement Over Local Dance Issue Brings Out Heaviest Vote in McMinnville's History.

Vote was cast, according to election officials.

In the western part of the county, where proponents of the recall were said to be strongest in numbers, the vote was relatively heavier than in Eugene and other parts of the county.

N. Roney of Eugene was the main cause for county commissioner in opposition to Mr. Harlow.

The city of Eugene also held a special election today, two bond issues and positions being voted on. One was for \$100,000 bridge bonds and the other \$10,000 for street intersection paving bonds.

WASCO REPORTS HEAVY VOTE

Interest Centered in Bonus Bill and Road Bond Measure.

THE DALLES, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Approximately half of the registered voters in The Dalles and a third of the voters in the country districts had cast their ballots at 6 o'clock this evening. Members of the various election boards reported. Taking into consideration the fact that hundreds of farmers and working men did not vote until the evening after work, the vote for the entire county is expected to equal 100 per cent.

Little interest was displayed by the voters in any of the state measures, with the possible exception of the soldiers' bonus bill, which received the support of the local and several county posts of the American Legion.

The county \$500,000 bond issue, the pro and con of which have been argued throughout the county in a series of hot debates during the last several weeks, was the main cause of the heavy vote cast. Opposition to the bond issue developed in both Mosier and Antelope, which would not directly result in the construction of The Dalles-California highway, opponents of the bond issue have contended.

JOSEPHINE BIT INDIFFERENT

Soldiers' Bonus Bill Only Measure Rousing Interest.

GRANTS PASS, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—There was little interest in the special election today in Josephine county, and not more than half the registered vote was cast. The soldiers' bonus bill was the only measure of state importance. There were two salary increase measures on the ballot affecting the assessor and school superintendent in this county, with little support apparent for either. The only precinct that cast near its normal vote was Troutdale, where much rivalry had been shown over a herd law measure on the ballot by petition. This would prohibit stock running at large in the precinct which adjoins the city on the south.

A cow on the Pacific highway last week wrecked the Grants Pass-Medford stage, killing one man and severely injuring five other people. This was used as an argument against the liberty of stock.

BAKER INTERESTED IN BONUS

Bill Expected to Pass in County With Good Majority.

BAKER, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Early indications of the election in Baker county show a light vote with interest centering around the soldiers' bonus measure. Of the eight precincts in the county, but two showed any indication of a heavy vote, those being the second and fourth.

A large number of women voted in these precincts. Several indicated that their interest was in the soldiers' bonus solely. It was said at the polls that the greater part of the city vote would be cast after 6 o'clock tonight.

The soldiers' bonus was expected to pass with a large majority in this county. Considerable opposition to the marriage bill developed. Late indications were that every measure up would be passed in Baker.

JACKSON COUNTY APATHETIC

Medford Reports Little Interest and Very Light Vote.

MEDFORD, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Up to 6 P. M. today a very light vote had been cast in the precincts of Medford, and indications were that unless a large number of voters cast their ballots within the next two hours only about 30 to 40 per cent of the normal vote will have been cast at this election. So far there has been little interest displayed and no special campaign was made for any of the measures.

Reports from the rural districts and other towns of Jackson county late this afternoon reflect the same apathetic attitude as exists in Medford. Voters, however, were expected to be more in evidence before the polls closed.

40 PER CENT VOTE FORECAST

Cooks and Curry Counties Expected to Favor Bonds and Bonus.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Voting was light in Cooks and Curry counties today. Probably less than a 40 per cent vote will be the total in Cooks county, with a little higher percentage expected in Curry. In the Cooks Bay cities the vote was below 25 per cent at 6 o'clock. It is held here by those who have been watching the trend closely that the \$500,000 bond issue will go over by a large majority and that the bonus bill is expected to give a majority for local bonds. A heavy majority for the soldiers' bonus bill is also thought to be the correct forecast on this measure.

BONUS CARRYING IN GILLIAM

Early Returns Indicate Victory for Veterans' Aid.

CONDON, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Early returns tonight indicated that the bill to provide aid for veterans would carry by a large majority in

Gilliam county. The vote, as far as counted, was yes 40, no 22. The emergency veto measure was carried 23 to 20. The women's jury bill had a tie of 23 to 23.

Defeat of the measure providing for marriage examination was indicated by the early returns, which were 21 for and 27 against. Members of the Frank Burns post were active in getting the voters to the polls today and feeling that a heavy vote was cast.

LINN SHOWS LITTLE INTEREST

Voters Do Not Appear Fast Enough to Keep Boards Busy.

ALBANY, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Linn county today cast its lightest vote in many years and one of the smallest proportionate votes in its history. In many precincts but a handful of ballots was cast. It was estimated at 6 o'clock that less than one-third and probably not more than one-fourth of the voters went to the polls. Voters did not appear fast enough to keep the election boards busy and particularly the counting boards, which went on duty during the voting for the first time under the new law, had nothing to do practically all of the day.

The fact that there has been practically no campaigning for or against any of the measures in this county was reflected in the light vote today. Except for some activity during the past few days in behalf of the bonus measure for service men, none of the measures have aroused any interest in this part of the state. There has been no organized pre-election opposition to any of the measures here.

BEND VOTE ONE-HALF SHORT

Interest Centered in Local Issues and Soldiers' Aid Measure.

BEND, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Bend's vote, polled up to 6 o'clock this evening, indicated a total of approximately \$80, less than half that cast at the presidential elections. Interest was most keen on local issues, especially the referendum on the water works franchise recently granted to Mayor Gilson. The other local measure seeks to raise the basis of Bancroft bonds from the improved valuation of property rather than the unimproved. A close vote was expected on both measures.

The only county measure was for a \$50,000 road bond issue, and on the one hand the voters were expected to carry by a tidy majority in city and county at large was in favor of the bonds.

PENDLETON VOTE IS LIGHT

35 Per Cent of Registration Is Expected to Be Cast.

PENDLETON, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Pendleton citizens showed a light interest in the special election today. It was estimated that about a 35 per cent vote was cast, in some precincts the average running even smaller. Ideal weather prevailed throughout the day and while a last-minute activity increased to a degree the low vote noticeable in every precinct during the forenoon and early afternoon the final count was expected to reveal that it was the lightest vote cast in this city for several years.

Reports from other Umatilla county towns show that the vote was light throughout the entire county.

BONUS BILL RUNNING WELL

Measure Declared to Have Good Chance in Clackamas County.

OREGON CITY, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—With one of the highest votes ever cast in Oregon City at 6 o'clock tonight it was impossible to forecast the outcome. The soldiers' bonus bill has a good chance to pass in Clackamas county, as the ex-service men have worked hard for it and the bill was largely responsible for the few votes cast. The veterans pulled hard for their measure, and their friends voted for its passage.

The annex part of Mount Pleasant to Oregon City created little interest. The residents of that district are eager to obtain city water and asked that their property become a part of the city.

Grant County Vote Heavy.

CANYON CITY, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—The vote was heavy throughout most of this county, the \$500,000 road bond issue carrying by a heavy vote. The legislative regulation and compensation amendment apparently has lost by a majority of 2 to 1, while the bonus measure seems to be winning by the same majority. The emergency veto measure is ahead by a small majority, while the measures providing for marriage examinations and women jurors appear to be losing by a large majority. The salary bill for Grant county officials appears also to be losing by a small majority.

Light Vote Predicted.

PRINEVILLE, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—The special election here passed without a ripple of excitement to stir the dull routine of being the busy time of the year. Voters throughout Crook county have shown but slight interest in any of the measures, with the exception of the bonus bill and the marriage measure. Many have expressed themselves and were it not for the bonus bill they would not take the time off to vote. The total registration of Crook county is 1938 and it is estimated that not more than 25 per cent of that number will cast their vote.

Clatsop Little Interested.

ASTORIA, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—The special election today attracted very little attention in Astoria and Clatsop county. About the only measure on the ballot which aroused interest locally was the soldiers' bonus measure, and there was apparently no opposition to it. A little enthusiasm. The registered vote in the county is 1522 and up to 6 o'clock this evening probably not more than 25 per cent of that number had voted.

Vote Light at La Grande.

LA GRANDE, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Although the day was ideal with warm sunshine after the rains of last night, few persons today felt the call to go to the polls and cast their ballot. A canvass of the precincts in the city showed that at 6 o'clock barely 15 per cent had voted, while at 6 o'clock an average of about 22 per cent had cast their ballot. Voting in the county precincts was estimated to be even lighter.

Heppner Against Measures.

HEPPNER, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—The quietest election ever held in Heppner was in progress today. Within an hour of closing time, out of a registration of 859 in Heppner's four precincts only 228 votes had been cast, and of that number not to exceed ten ex-service men had voted. The indications were that every measure on the ballot would be heavily defeated.

Douglas Vote Light One.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—In spite of the general interest in

the election here today, the vote was very light. The two popular measures that attracted voters to the polls were the bonus bill and the road bond issue. The precincts in the city reported a light vote at 6 o'clock this evening and the county precincts the same.

VOTE AT LINCOLN IS HEAVY

Road Bond Measure Brings Out Big Percentage of Voters.

TOLEDO, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—Indications early tonight were that the vote in Lincoln county would be heavy, due to the interest in the proposed \$375,000 bond issue to aid in the construction of the Newport-Corvallis highway.

It was predicted that the bonds would carry by a large majority.

Klamath County Apathetic.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—A light vote was cast in Klamath county. In the city a local bond issue stimulated interest and workers estimated 30 per cent of the registered vote might be cast. The country precincts will show a much lighter percentage.

Dance Issue Gets Out Voters.

McMINNVILLE, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—The indications were that the heaviest vote in the history of the city was cast. Voting began early and kept the election boards busy all day. The dance question brought out nearly every voter in the city.

Few Vote in Tillamook.

TILLAMOOK, Or., June 7.—(Special.)—But little interest was taken in election here, and only 20 to 25 per cent of the votes would be cast, it was predicted.

Lights and Sidelights.

"HELLO, this is the chairman of the 11th precinct speaking." came a pleasant feminine voice over the telephone yesterday afternoon to James W. Gleason, deputy county clerk in charge of registration and elections. "I want to know what our rights are."

"Yes," inquired Gleason. "Our election boards are in a tailor shop and the men here are using so much gasoline that the smell is making us all sick. Can't we make them stop?"

"I'm afraid your authority does not extend that far," explained the deputy. "Better open all the windows and doors and ask them not to spunge clothing any more than necessary."

Many were the trivial complaints made over the telephone to election headquarters at the courthouse yesterday, but they did not compare in volume with the number at a general election. One woman complaining that the ballot box in her polling place had no screws and that there were no carpenters on the board. Another woman called to say that she ought to have another book to note results in, not seeing that a separate column was ruled off for each of the two ballots voted on. The man in charge of one polling place insisted that the state ballots should be deposited in the ballot box marked "municipal" and the city ballots in the box labeled "state."

On the whole there was little confusion. Many persons were surprised to find that their failure to register since changing addresses barred them from voting in their new precincts. Numbers dropped in the courthouse hoping to remedy forgetfulness by registering, unconscious of the fact heretofore in all Portland newspapers more than a month ago, that registration ended 30 days before the election.

LAST AD NEW LEAD—COUNTY.

There probably never has been held in Portland a more featureless election. Even school elections attract a little more attention.

Considering that the people were voting on a proposition which means about \$30,000,000 in bonds to the state, increasing the pay of legislators and extending the sessions, and were asked to act on a proposal dealing directly with marriage—which is supposed to have an interest for everyone—there was the utmost apathy displayed by the electorate.

The percentage vote cast was one of the smallest that has been recorded in a general or special election. Apparently, only the former service men and their friends took the trouble to go to the polls to mark a ballot. And, judging from the vote, not all of the former service men used the ballot box.

Day's Routine Hardly Dented.

Devoid of incident, as it was devoid of interest, the special election did not even make a dent in the day's routine, save in the banks and such public offices as were closed because the special election meant a legal holiday. There were some vacancies in the election boards of several precincts, but these gaps were filled and nearly all the precincts were organized and ready for business on time. All that the election boards needed was enough patronage to keep them from falling asleep.

There are 28,727 registered voters in Multnomah county, which number includes republicans, democrats and other parties. The special election was a non-partisan affair, for there were no candidates, but only measures to be considered.

Soldiers Win in Multnomah.

The main reason for holding the special election was to vote on the soldiers' bonus, and this measure has carried beyond doubt in Multnomah county. There were enough former service men to make this a certainty. Some campaigning was performed for the bonus bill by the former soldiers, sailors and marines, but all other measures on the state ballot simply drifted along, although there has been a mild controversy in the press over the hygienic marriage bill.

NAMES MAY GO IN TODAY

PROBABLY WILL BE MADE.

President Confers With A. D. Lasker and Necessity for Action at Once Is Said to Be Felt

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—President Harding's long delayed nominations of members of the shipping board were expected to go to the senate within 48 hours as a result of conferences today between officials here and A. D. Lasker of Chicago, who has been selected for the board chairmanship.

Mr. Lasker had two long conversations with the president and, although he said a final conclusion was to be reached, the general impression in administration circles was that he would accept. He will call at the White House again tomorrow and an announcement was expected to follow.

Names of all seven members of the board, it was believed, would be included in this announcement and all of the seven nominations would go to the senate together.

Today Mr. Lasker, who served in the advertising department of republican national headquarters during last year's campaign, was urged by several party leaders to take the chairmanship. The pot of chairman has been a stumbling block, two men having declined it and Mr. Lasker having indicated he would not take it unless virtually drafted into service.

Another White House caller who talked shipping board with the president was Senator Jones, republican, Washington, chairman of the senate commerce committee. Senator Jones was closeted with President Harding for a long time before Mr. Lasker arrived for his second conference, and the whole subject of membership was understood to have been considered.

METEORS DUE JUNE 27

Winnecke's Comet to Miss Earth by 10,000,000 Miles.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 7.—Winnecke's comet will probably not come within 10,000,000 miles of the earth, according to information received at the Harvard college observatory from astronomers studying its motion closely.

The comet will make its nearest approach to the sun June 13. Several astronomers predict a meteoric shower June 27 as a result of the comet's approach.

Wind Blows Down Trees.

KELOSO, Wash., June 7.—(Special.)—The country west of Kelso and Castle Rock was visited yesterday afternoon by one of the heaviest wind and rain storms ever known here. The storm passed about two miles west of Kelso. A cloudburst in the form of a path 100 yards in width. Telegraph wires were broken, and many trees were blown down.
