SUICIDE DIES AT HOSPITAL.—Miss Elsa Carlson, a stenographer, 34 years old, died yesterday morning at St. Vincent's hospital. She had been suffering from a self-inflicted gunshot wound directed below the heart. Miss Carlson shot herself, apparently with suicidal intent, last Friday night in the law office of Raftery & Pickett in the Title & Trust building, where she was employed as a stenographer. No reason for her act could be given by friends of the young woman. The body was removed to the morgue, and officials are seeking to communicate with relatives in Colorado.

The automobile was badly damaged. Mrs. Sadie Watts and Mrs. Pearl Shields, occupants, were charged with being drunk, and the fourth member of the party, John J. Polke, was charged with disorderly conduct. He was the only member of the party who was not under the influence of liquor, according to the arresting officer.

CREDIT MEN TO CONFER.—There will be a special meeting of the Portland Association of Credit Men in the crystal room of the Hotel Benson Saturday night at 6 o'clock for the purpose of entertaining visiting credit men on their way to the national convention in San Francisco. WAYMAN LOW BIDDER.—Oscar Wayman proved low bidder on the proposed fireboat dock and firehouse at the foot of Randolph street among 11 contractors who submitted bids. Wayman submitted three bids depending on the type of construction involved. His lowest figure was \$25,358. Other bids ranged as high as \$34,320. The firehouse will be of concrete construction resting on cement piers. Under the specifications 120 days are allowed for completion of the building after the contract is signed, but under favorable conditions it is expected that the work will be completed in about 90 days.

FISH COMPANY SUE FOR \$741.—Cheese Bros. of New York are asking for \$741.25 interest and court costs from the Readspoor Fish company, in a suit filed yesterday afternoon in the United States district court. The plaintiffs allege that the fish company owes this sum of money on fish shipped in refrigerator cars to New York. The New York company sold the fish on a commission basis, states the complaint, paid the expressage and advanced drafts to the fish company, which is now indebted to it to the extent named.

BUILDING CONTINUES ACTIVE.—The construction of residences, which has almost assumed boom proportions in the city this year, shows no signs of declining, according to the number of building permits taken out the first week in June. Records up to the close of business June 6 show that 52 permits for new residences have been issued in the five business days of the month. The largest number issued was 16, on June 6.

GRAND JURY.—Is Starnes—John Robinson, a grainhandler, 39 years old, was sent to Emanuel hospital with a knife wound below the left shoulder, and Jack Collins, 39 years old, was arrested as the alleged assailant as a result of a cutting affray at 410 River street, Albina yesterday afternoon. Collins was held on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. The police did not learn the cause of the affray.

FERRY VEHICLE TRAFFIC OFF.—On account of the high water it has become necessary to suspend vehicle traffic over the St. John's ferry, which operates between St. Johns and Linton, W. A. Zatchell, county road inspector, announced yesterday. Traffic will not be resumed until the water recedes to a stage of 22.8 feet.

POLICE INSPECTION TODAY.—Chief Jenkins' annual inspection of the police department will take place at 10:30 o'clock this morning on Multnomah field in the presence of the city officials. Following the inspection and drill the police will march through the business streets to the police station. The Red Cross band will furnish music for the occasion.

The official publication of the club announces that it was decided to hold no luncheon in order that club members might better entertain visitors. BURGLES ENTER CHURCH.—Prowlers, who broke into the Fifth Scientist church, 1234 Sixty-second street, southeast, Monday night, procured nothing more valuable than an old typewriter, according to a report filed with the police yesterday. A desk was broken open and an effort made to get into a strong box, without success.

TWO BOOTLEGGERS FINED.—Vic Cujak and Mike Deich were fined \$250 each yesterday by Federal Judge Bean for bootlegging. They were arrested April 19, after they had sold a round of drinks to some government informants at their restaurant and soft drink establishment.

ORDINANCE TO CURB FAKERS BREWS ROW

Spiritualist Church Plans Organized Opposition.

CITY COUNCIL IS WARNED

Measure to Regulate Abuses Under Guise of Mysticism Regarded as Attack on Religious Liberty.

Strong opposition which may result in a postponement of action on the proposed ordinance to license and regulate fortune-telling, palmistry, phrenology, spiritualists and other kindred practices is expected to develop in council meeting this morning through the action of the First Spiritualist church of Portland, backed by the national headquarters of the spiritualist church at Washington, D. C.

The ordinance is opposed on the grounds that it is interference with religious liberty. Dan Powers has been retained as attorney for the First Spiritualist church and is prepared to fight the ordinance to the supreme court of the United States if need be, he declared yesterday. He is retained jointly by the national organization and the local church.

Mr. Powers is representing the spiritualist church only and has no objection to the measure in so far as it applies to fortune-telling, palmistry, and even spiritualists, so long as it does not attempt to curb the freedom of the church.

Spiritualists Oppose Fakery. "The spiritualist church will welcome an ordinance that will drive out fakery and fraudulent practices," Mr. Powers said. "The membership of the church, however, is drawn from persons whose honest conviction is embodied in their belief and whose interests in the community are similar to those of other religious organizations."

It is probable that the opposition raised against the ordinance will result in postponement of action, and probably in changes that will make the measure acceptable to the spiritualist church and at the same time curb the abuses against which it is aimed.

Gilman Project Scheduled. A mass of other important matters will be taken up by the council. Included in the number will be the matter of widening Gilman street, between Third and Fourth streets, to allow more direct entry to the west approach of the steel bridge.
