

REPORT OF SPEECH GARBLED, SAYS SIMS

Reply to Secretary Denby Is
Sent by Admiral.

NEW TALK IGNORES IRISH

Naval Officer Admits That He Has
Used Too Energetic Words, but
Vows He Will Continue.

LONDON, June 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—The reply of Rear-Admiral Sims to the request of Secretary of the Navy Denby for an explanation of his speech here Tuesday expressed the opinion of Admiral Sims that some parts of the speech, to which objection had been taken, had been garbled. This was learned unofficially but on good authority here today.

In his answer, which is not long, Admiral Sims declared he had said nothing in his address which he had not said before in speeches in the United States and in his book.

Admiral Sims did not seem perturbed by reports that the United States senate had taken action calling for an investigation of his speech, but expressed curiosity as to when the senatorial inquiry would be begun. "I am returning on June 15," he said.

Most Question Avoided.
Admiral Sims made no direct mention of Americans in sympathy with the Irish republican cause today in an address at a luncheon given in his honor by the American Luncheon club.

"Perhaps we have used too energetic adjectives on some occasions," he said, "but let us hope that will be amicably explained away."

Admiral Sims paused a moment and then added:
"But I am going on doing the same thing."

This declaration brought from the 200 guests a repetition of the uproarious applause which had greeted the remarks of Wilson Cross, vice-president of the American chamber of commerce in London, in introducing Admiral Sims.

Help Pledged Sims.
"He is stung again, but he says he will stand by what he has said," Mr. Cross told the guests. "I want to assure him that this company will stand with him, and so will all full-blooded, true, honest-thinking Americans."

SIMS AND HARVEY SCORED

Senator Describes Pair as "Gold
Dust Twins."

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—Rear-Admiral Sims and Ambassador Harvey were described today in the senate by Senator Harrison, democrat, Mississippi, as "these two gold dust twins," who now represent the government of the United States in England.

Senator Harrison, author of the resolution adopted yesterday directing the naval committee to investigate Admiral Sims' speech, and the speech of Ambassador Harvey at the Pilgrims dinner, were "an outrage to red-blooded Americans."

Senator Harrison said that Admiral Sims "ought to be got rid of from the navy," if he was quoted accurately, and he also reiterated his demand for Ambassador Harvey's "recall."

A resolution declaring Rear-Admiral Sims an "undesirable alien," and denying him readmittance to any American port, was introduced in the house late today by Representative Gallivan, democrat, Massachusetts.

The resolution offered by Mr. Gallivan referred to Rear-Admiral Sims as "a foreign-born citizen of the United States, but now connected, happily and unfortunately, with the naval establishment of this country." On other occasions, it added, he had "publicly stated that in case of a war between the United States and Great Britain, one British ship could easily dispose of four or five American ships of corresponding type," and it charged that "Sims has publicly depreciated his superior officers in the naval establishment and the character and quality of the government of this republic."

ADDRESS TERMED INDISCREET

Manchester Guardian Replies to
Admiral Sims' Outbreak.

MANCHESTER, June 10.—Under the caption "Admiral Sims' Outbreak," the Manchester Guardian published an editorial regarding the indiscretions of his little outbreak in the American admiral's luncheon address before the English-speaking union.

The editorial says:
"Among the many points forgotten by the distinguished American sailor, whom we all like even when he puts us into passing difficulties are, first, that the Sinn Fein party and the murder gangs who profess to be doing its work are just about as distinct from each other as the British government and the other murder gangs which profess to be doing its work; that the most striking point in Ireland's relation to the great war was not the insane effort of a few wild extremists to help the Germans, but the great number and excellent quality of Irish soldiers who abounded, not only in Irish, Australian and Canadian but also in English and Scottish regiments."

perpetuity of the American labor movement. President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor closed his address today before the department.

"When that end comes," added the veteran labor leader, "I hope I may be conscious so as to express to my fellow workers and here the justice and the confidence that I have in them and the respect that I have for them and the hope for the perpetuity of the great American labor movement."

President Gompers urged the metal trades unions to be optimistic as to the future, asserting that the present reaction would not be lasting. "Organized labor," he declared, "is going to hold all that it has gained and has made a successful fight against its enemies."

"The American labor movement is safe," said the labor chief. "It is progressive, it is less fanatical, but it is more practical."

A resolution was presented to the convention urging the department to call upon the civil service commission, secretary of the navy, and secretary of war, immediately to discharge all aliens in the government employ who do not immediately qualify for citizenship.

British Boycott Proposed.
Before adjourning the convention received a resolution from the amalgamated sheet metal workers demanding that steps be taken to have the organized workers of the country boycott British manufactured goods and materials until Great Britain stops its "war of reprisals, killing of people and destruction of property in Ireland."

Another resolution urged the executive council of the department to investigate the possibility of establishing a national building material supply company. This is declared necessary as it is alleged building material supply dealers have allied themselves with the different elements and associations that are trying to destroy the building trades unions.

TAX FRAUD IS CHARGED

PRESIDENT OF SEATTLE AUTO CONCERN ARRESTED.

Placing of \$76,000 Cash in Pockets to Beat Government
Cited in Indictments.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—Charged in two indictments, returned this morning by a federal grand jury now in session, with attempting corruptly to defraud the government, and income taxes for the year 1918, and with willfully suborning, instigating and procuring others to do the same, Edward R. Tooley, deputy United States marshal, was fixed at \$75,000 on the two indictments.

Indictments charge Tooley with paying \$18,848.47 as corporation and income tax on the earnings of the four companies, whereas his tax actually amounted to more than \$100,000. Discrepancy in the income on which tax was paid, and in his pockets, as alleged by the government officials to have been the actual income, is said by government officials to have been \$133,841.21 for the year 1918.

The indictments followed a month's investigation of his account books by John R. Miller and William Kennedy, special agents of the bureau of internal revenue. Federal officials allege that Tooley, in an attempt to evade his federal tax, placed more than \$75,000 in his pockets, as a result of sales of motor cars and accessories, which was not entered on the books of his companies.

FRUIT RATES PROTESTED

Growers and Shippers to Demand
Return to Old Tariffs.

YAKIMA, Wash., June 10.—Growers and shippers of fruit in Washington and Oregon, through their state public service commissions, will file a joint protest with the interstate commerce commission within the next 10 days asking for the restoration of fruit rates in force before the 33 per cent rise of August, 1919, according to W. J. Urquhart, secretary of the Yakima Traffic and Credit association. Wenatchee and Spokane districts support this move, he said.

A telegram from H. A. Adams, vice-president of the Union Pacific, to P. M. West, agent of that line here, stated that the new rate of \$1.50 a hundred to eastern territory included storage in transit privileges. This would mean a reduction of \$62 a car from the present apple rate.

4 BUILDINGS ARE BURNED

Flames Destroy Structures Near
Onalaska Wash.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 10.—(Special.)—The garage of F. J. Cavanaugh which was operated by Larson & Scott, just outside the limits of Onalaska, 16 miles southeast of Chehalis, two dwellings belonging to W. McClelland, and one owned by L. Christian, were totally destroyed by a fire last night. No fire apparatus was on hand to protect them.

Christian was the only owner who had any insurance on his property. Origin of the fire was undetermined but the fact that it broke out in a vacant building led to the belief that a cigarette stub left by someone who had been loafing there may have been the cause.

AUTO WRECK FATAL TO FRANK D. WILSON

Second Victim of Bridal Veil
Accident Dies in Hospital.

PAIR THOUGHT MARRIED

Pastor Says Mrs. Garland and Her
Companion Were Engaged and
Maybe on Wedding Trip.

The second death from the Bridal Veil automobile accident occurred yesterday morning, when Frank D. Wilson, the passenger in the machine that plunged 340 feet from the Columbia highway, died in the Good Samaritan hospital. Mrs. Margaret Garland, owner and driver of the car, was killed instantly when the car plowed its way through the guard rail and crashed to the bottom of the cliff.

Investigation by the authorities yesterday fixed the probable cause of the accident as a defective steering gear. Employees of the Bridal Veil Lumber company said that they had seen the machine swerve to the side of the road a few seconds before the plunge, but it righted itself and they thought that the driver had again gained control.

Relatives Are Notified.

A telegram was sent last night by Deputy Coroner Goetsch to Mrs. Ida Chambers, a sister of the dead woman, at Battle Creek, Mich. Goetsch also learned that Mrs. Garland's mother was living with Mrs. Chambers in the eastern city.

Earl G. Wilson, a son of the second victim of the accident, lives at 56 East Stafford street, Portland. He told the authorities that he had not seen his father recently.

Both Mrs. Garland and Wilson lived at 954 North Thirtieth street. Neighbors told investigators from the coroner's office that the machine was owned by Mrs. Garland and that she had purchased a Washington state license because it was cheaper than the Oregon license. Dispatches from Seattle yesterday confirmed the fact that the license on the wrecked machine, No. 12708, had been issued to Mrs. M. M. Garland of Portland. It was said that Mrs. Garland purchased the car with money which she earned doing fancy needlework. Wilson and Mrs. Garland lived in separate apartments at the Thirtieth street address.

Couple Thought Married.

According to the Rev. John G. Lake both of the victims were members of the church and were engaged to be married. Mr. Lake expressed the belief that the couple had been married in some upper river town and were on their way back to Portland as man and wife when the tragedy occurred.

DISARMING PLAN WINS

POWERS ARE SAID TO BE IN
FAVOR OF SCHEME.

England, France, Italy and Japan
Are Said to Have Indicated
That Idea Is Welcome.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 10.—(Special.)—Great curiosity is manifested in replies that have come from the nations queried by President Harding in his disarmament feeler.

It was reported that Japan, which in its first informal response to the informal question rather avoided committing itself, has been won around by England to an expression of sympathy.

pathetic interest in the disarmament proposals.

England, France, Italy and Japan have now indicated that they will welcome any proposition that means reduction of great war establishments. Germany was said to have indicated that on the resumption of diplomatic relations—which means at the end of the period of technical war between this country and Germany—she will be glad to join in the program.

The administration is withholding information. Outside of the White House and the state department nobody knows in what form the feelers were couched and the receipt of the replies was not even admitted.

Enough has leaked out, however, to indicate that the plan carried in the Borch amendment would be well received, and friends of that measure have urged that if the United States, England and Japan mutually agree to limit their naval programmes it will make the course of general disarmament much smoother than if the whole thing, with the complications

of army reduction and the fears of France and Poland, is gone into at the first instance.

WOOL CLIP SOLD IN BAKER

C. P. Ragsdale Disposes of 270,000
Pounds at 16 Cents.

BAKER, Or., June 10.—(Special.)—C. P. Ragsdale, who held the largest wool clip of last year and this year in this section of the state, approximately 270,000 pounds, yesterday sold it to the Portland Warehouse company of Portland, receiving 16 cents a pound. The clip was of the finest quality.

This sale is the only one that has taken place in this county this spring, and there remains a million and a half pounds in the hands of the producers awaiting the hope of a better price than has been offered. Just how long this waiting will continue is problematical.
