Five automobiles loaded with armed possemen were dispatched from here late this afternoon, when a farmer living five miles north of Kelso telephoned that a man answering Gardner's description had called at the farmhouse shortly after 3 o'clock and a rebbery near Port Orford in which bought bacon and other food supplies.
