

KABER CASE MAY BE CLEW TO MYSTERIES

Poison Believed to Account
for Other Murders.

VARIED DRUGS ARE FOUND

Officers Declare That No Man
Stabbed Publisher, as Wound
Shows Woman Did It.

CLEVELAND, O., June 15.—(Special.)—The tortured conscience of an old woman, played upon by police agents, was responsible for the opening up of the two-year-old Kaber murder mystery in this city and the unfolding of the details of a plot, which in boldness of conception and the number of participants has no parallel in the criminal history of this country.

Four women are under indictment for the killing of Dan Kaber and one of those, 69-year-old Mary Brickel, the mother of Mrs. Kaber, is mainly responsible for the indictments because her conscience would not allow her to keep the secret for her daughters, Mrs. Kaber and her daughter's child, Marian McCarrie. The third is Erminia Colavito who mixed with her profession of midwife a claim to witchcraft through intimacy with the spirit world.

She is who invests the case with an atmosphere of east Indian poison intrigue. Detectives are hunting for a mysterious drug, alleged to have been sold by Mrs. Colavito, in a poison search begun when it was learned that the woman has sold bottles of the liquid as a cure for "bad habits."

Several Poisons Are Found.
Mrs. Daniel Kaber was alleged to have purchased "medicine" from the Italian woman. Detectives, searching the Colavito home, poked rubber covered fingers into sticky medicine crannies of an amateur laboratory to find mixtures of arsenic, a drug which he believed was used on Kaber before he was strangled to death. Several poisons were found.

City chemists declared that numerous deaths must have been caused if the woman's prescriptions were as freely used as evidence indicated. Recent mysterious deaths here will be investigated in connection with the Kaber case.

Many Confessions Held.
The Kaber murder case is one of many angles. It has not yet been solved, although the prosecuting attorney, Edward Stanton, is in possession of a sheaf of confessions. At this time the confessions made by Mrs. Brickel, Mrs. Colavito, Marian McCarrie and a former teller, Mrs. Matthews, who has not been arrested, point to the conclusion that Kaber was murdered by two men who hid in his home.

Kaber was killed about midnight on July 18, 1919. But—and here is a point that is likely to make this case at any time more sensational than has been thus far experienced—police investigators who have followed every shred of evidence do not believe that Kaber was killed by a man. Briefly, they reason along these lines:

There was no crime element of abnormality. Mrs. Kaber, according to the confessions of persons who heard her speak of her husband, detested him for reasons which might better call for the analysis of neurologists than of an ordinary prosecutor.

Spirit Influence Wanted.

Mrs. Colavito has sworn that Mrs. Kaber asked her to exert some spiritual influence on her husband which would make him more desirable as a spouse, and that Kaber was given some sort of a decoction which Mrs. Kaber complained was ineffectual.

Kaber was aroused from sleep by persons who entered his room. He was stabbed 24 times in the lower abdomen. Only three of the punctures penetrated the intestines. Doctors certified that he died from shock and loss of blood. The wounds were not themselves necessarily fatal.

The police point of view was that if a man hired by Mrs. Kaber to kill her husband had undertaken the job he would have struck the heart or some fatal spot and hasten away. One of the policemen on the case said today that there was an element of fiendish ferocity in this crime which took it out of the class of a mere murder for hire.

Victim Accused Man.

Against this is a statement by Kaber before he died that he was stabbed by a man. Chief of Police Christensen of Lakewood, the Cleveland suburb in which the crime was committed, asked Kaber point blank if a woman had not stabbed him.

"It was a man with a cap on," said Kaber, "but my wife hired him." On the other hand, there is evidence that a woman accompanied the two hired assassins to the house and was with them in the cellar until Mrs. Brickel, Marian McCarrie, a maid nurse, and a girl guest of Marian McCarrie had retired on the night of the murder. It is pretty well established that this woman was not Mrs. Kaber, who has a pretty stiff alibi as to that phase of the murder. The only way to clear up the identity of the woman in the house with the murderers is to capture the men.

Detective Mooney of the Cleveland force, who has had unusual success in solving Italian murder mysteries, is devoting all his time to this task and a message from him that he has met with success in the case of one, if not both suspects is looked for at almost any time.

From all accounts Mrs. Brickel was an estimable woman. Her daughter, Eve Katherine, thrice married was wild from childhood. The mother stood by her even when her daughter confessed frankly that she had planned to kill her husband, and even after the husband had been killed.

VERNON KLOSTER, ONCE LISTED AS DEAD, GRADUATED.

Young Man Arrives in Salem and Joins in Closing Function at Willamette.

SALEM, Or., June 15.—(Special.)—In 1917 Vernon Kloster was a Willamette student. The war broke out and he was one of the first from the school to enlist, and it was not long until a report was received in Salem to the effect that he had been killed. YOUNGSTERS' CARE URGED

PREVENTING DEVELOPMENT
OF CRIMINALS STRESSED.

F. E. Beach Presents Facts in Report at Meeting of Boys' and Girls' Aid Society.

The importance to municipalities of caring properly for unfortunate children, subsequently saving expense to the state by preventing the development of criminals, was emphasized in the annual report of F. E. Beach, secretary of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society, read before the officers and directors of the institution at their annual meeting yesterday.

Beach showed how much can be saved to the taxpayers by taking care of neglected children before they become delinquents.

Other reports read were by Mrs. C. R. Templeton of the women's advisory board, giving facts gathered in European travel, and by Superintendent J. Teuscher Jr., who emphasized the fact that the society is not asking the state for more money and urged early and proper care of neglected children for their sake as well as for the sake of the state.
