

LABOR REPUDIATES ONE BIG UNION IDEA

Delegates Refuse to Concur
in Amalgamation Proposal.

CORRUPTION IS CHARGED

Federation Pledges Support in
Drive to Organize Workers in
Northwest Lumber Industry.

DENVER, Colo., June 16.—The American Federation of Labor today unanimously repudiated the "one big union" idea.

Without discussion the annual convention of the federation sustained the action of its committee on organization in non-concurring in a resolution calling for "one body of workers through amalgamations, federations and protective agreements."

The declaration presented by J. L. Pauley of the West Virginia State Federation of Labor, urged all national and international unions to insert clauses in their working agreements whereby they can "render such assistance as is needed by any and all crafts, when called upon to do so."

It asked that all unions arrange the dates of their contracts so that they would expire at the same time. The convention was thrown into confusion when several delegates by objections denied the negro delegation permission to introduce a resolution condemning the "mob violence" of the "Ku Klux Klan of White Caps" of the south.

Ku Klux Klan Attacked.
President Samuel Gompers had great difficulty in restoring order, as nearly a score of delegates jumped from their seats and demanded the name of the delegates who had objected. He declined to give the name of the delegates. As the confusion increased President William Hutchinson of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners arose and said:

"If you want to know who the objector is, it is I."

Several delegates called his name aloud as the convention proceeded to further business.

The resolution also urged that steps be taken to have the government "abolish this unlawful organization known as the Ku Klux Klan or White Caps" and that the federation use its "best endeavors to protect organized labor as represented by the colored workers."

One of the greatest ovations ever given a speaker in a federation convention was given to the Rev. G. B. Lackland of the Grace Methodist Episcopal church of Denver, who discussed "the duty of the church to labor."

"The dense ignorance of the other side will win the fight for labor," he declared. "The pulpits of America have been pleading for the women and children of Belgium," said Mr. Lackland. "Why in God's name do they not plead for the women and children of America?"

"Three-fourths of the 300,000 babies that died last year died in the homes of workmen where the 'open shop' or American shop, so called, conditions prevailed—where they defile labor."

International Plan Repudiated.
He declared the American Legion should "get together in the fight for the masses."

The executive council of the federation has finally and completely repudiated the International Federation of Trade Unions as it is now conducted.

This announcement was made to-night at the convention headquarters of President Samuel Gompers, who made public a letter sent to the secretary of the European trade-union movement at Amsterdam.

A special committee of five to investigate unemployment and possible congressional relief was authorized by the convention. The resolution declared that "congress should appropriate money in peace times for necessary public works and when a panic develops there would be work for the unemployed."

The federation pledged its assistance in launching a campaign to "organize completely the lumber industry of the northwest."

"Unbridled wage slashing is dangerously menacing the union wage standards of all union workers throughout the northwest territory," said the resolution, which was adopted.

W. M. Short, of the Washington Federation of Labor, in supporting the resolution, said that men are being shipped from the cities to lumber camps at a wage of \$2.55 a day and forced to pay \$3 a week for board.

He declared that 80 per cent of the workers in the lumber industry have belonged to the employers' labor organization and that thousands are dissatisfied and ready to join the American Federation of Labor.

"The political situation in our state is corrupt," Mr. Short said. "The state legislature is dominated by the lumber interests. The industrial condition is demoralized."

"There isn't a union that isn't threatened with heavy wage reductions."

"We are asking that the living standards of every union organization in the state may be protected."

The Diamond A outfit, with headquarters in Pineville, has been incorporated by P. McD. Fuller, Margaret Fuller and N. G. Wallace. The capital stock is \$2000. Notice of dissolution has been filed by the Oregon Tie & Lumber company, with headquarters in Portland.

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PORTLAND SHRINERS BOOST EXPOSITION

Half Million Nobles Hear Rose City's Call for 1925.

HUGE CONVENTION ENDS

Imperial Council Adopts Plan to Establish Hospitals for Crippled Children.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 16.—(Special).—An invitation to 500,000 Shriner in North America to attend the Atlantic-Pacific Highway and Electrical exposition in Portland in 1925 was extended today by Frank S. Grant, illustrious potentate of Al Kader temple, in the closing moments of the 47th annual council session held in this city. Potentate Grant extended a written invitation which urged the nobility of North America to visit Portland during the exposition and assuring the Bedouins that Al Kader temple would maintain open house during the period of the world's fair.

An appropriation of \$10,000 to the Pueblo flood sufferers was one of the features of the closing day of the convention. The appropriation was suggested by the finance committee and adopted through a unanimous vote.

Resolutions authorizing the appointment of a board of seven trustees to erect and maintain the Shriner's hospitals for crippled children were adopted today.

A suggestion that the incorporation in the various states for the carrying on of the hospital work be done under the name of the Shriner's charity foundation was voted down and the phrase of Shriner's hospitals for crippled children.

The board of trustees is given vast powers under the terms of the resolution, being authorized to proceed with the erection of not only the central or parent hospital in St. Louis, but to select other sites and proceed with the erection of other hospitals as fast as the money is made available.

The imperial council voted to continue the per capita tax of \$2 annually assigned each member. The tax was first voted at the 1920 session held in Portland.

Charters for new Shrine temples were granted to Pueblo, Colo., Wichita Falls and Amarillo, Texas, and dispensations were granted to Syracuse, N. Y., and Bangor, Maine.

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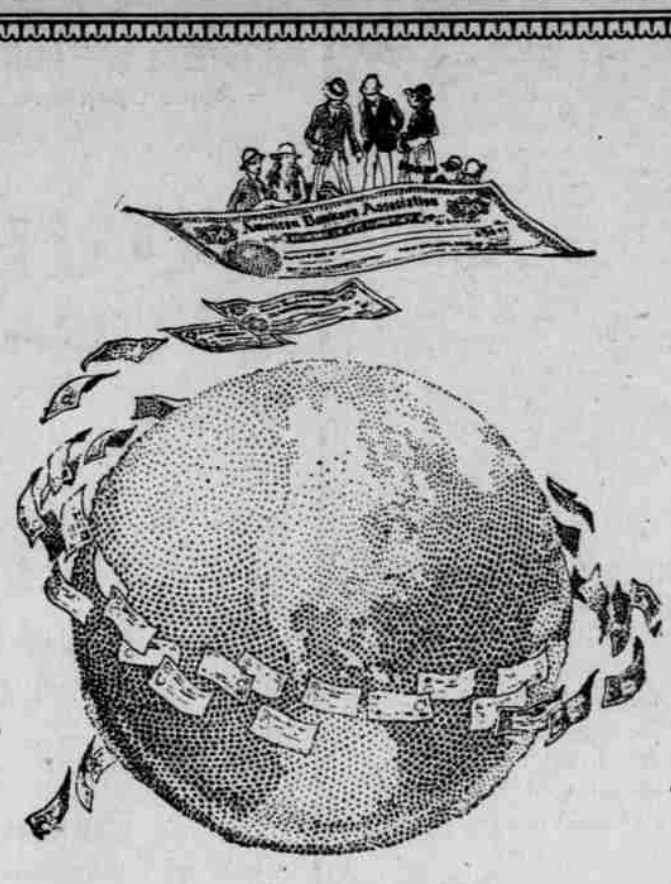
