

ESTACADA ELECTS SCHOOL DIRECTORS

George Weatherly and Dr. Morse Are Chosen.

MRS. BELFIS NEW CLERK

Conservatism and Keeping Down of Expenses Keynotes of Whole Contest.

ESTACADA, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—There was an exceptional interest manifested last night at the school election for directors. The high school auditorium was almost filled, and the ballots showed nearly 200 votes.

Dr. Morse, the retiring director, was re-elected to succeed himself by a vote of 122, his opponent, Mrs. Mac Reed, receiving 56 votes.

As another member of the board has resigned, his place was filled by the election of George Weatherly, who received 126 votes as against 51 votes for his opponent, Dr. R. G. McCall.

The school clerk, Mrs. Susie Carver, having declined re-nomination, Mrs. Myrtle Belfis was unanimously elected for the position.

The new board is conservative and this was the chief reason which determined the election. The people are calling a halt on the absolutely necessary expenditures.

TWO DIRECTORS ARE ELECTED

Dardenell and Foothills Districts Consolidate With Gold Hill.

GOLD HILL, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—At the annual school meeting held today in the Gold Hill district, Charles N. Shuman was elected director for the three-year term. William H. Miller director for the one-year term, succeeding Martin S. Johnson, resigned.

The consolidation of the Dardenell district, adjoining Gold Hill on the south, with Gold Hill, carried with only one negative vote, while two negative votes were cast against the consolidation of the Foothills Creek district with Gold Hill.

W. R. Putman of Salem, Or., has been engaged as superintendent of the Gold Hill schools for the ensuing year. He had previously been already engaged by Mrs. L. E. James, high school; Maude Coy, seventh and eighth grades; Lucile Oatman, third and fourth; and Alice L. Harper, first and second.

Heavy Vote at Willamina.

WILLAMINA, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The school election yesterday proved a surprise to many voters and the heaviest vote that has been recorded for some time was cast at the high school building. Mrs. M. E. Kennedy was elected to succeed J. E. Sherwin and R. H. Yates was elected to fill the second vacancy on the board. Clerk of the board, J. E. Sherwin, resigned.

Vote on the budget probably will take place in November. The newly elected board plans to rush the building of a gymnasium.

Albany Re-elects Sears.

ALBANY, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—James D. Sears was elected a director of the Albany school district for a term of three years in the annual school election held here yesterday. He won out by an overwhelming vote in an election in which a large vote was cast. Mr. Sears defeated Owen Beam. A good many voters wrote in the name of Dr. W. H. Davis, the retiring director, who had declined a re-nomination and the vote placed him in second place in the race. The hold-over members of the local school board are: J. K. Weatherford, Alfred C. Schmitt, Dr. J. H. Robinson and Virgil L. Calavan.

Sandy Holds Its Election.

SANDY, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Sandy grade school election yesterday resulted in J. M. Miller being elected to fill the vacancy of A. C. Mattingly, outgoing director, and Mrs. J. M. C. Miller for clerk, taking the place of Charles Sharnke, who has held the clerkship for a number of years. Election of five directors and a clerk also was held for Union high school No. 2. Returns are not yet in. At its last meeting the present board nominated itself for re-election.

Dark Horse Nearly Chosen.

SEASIDE, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—At the regular school election of school district No. 10, held Monday evening, A. N. Johnson was elected as director to serve for three years. An unusually heavy vote was cast. A. L. Haley, a dark horse in the race, lost out by a few votes. Bert Thompson was re-elected clerk. The board was authorized to allow 20 feet on the east end of the school grounds for an alleyway in lieu of an alleyway in the center of the grounds.

Eugene Shows Little Interest.

EUGENE, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—Comparatively little interest was taken in the annual election of school directors here yesterday, only 680 votes being cast. Dr. P. J. Bartle, member of the board of the last year, and Mrs. E. V. Ford were elected, only one other candidate, Dr. N. C. Nelson, being on the opposing ticket. The vote for Dr. Bartle was 234, that for Mrs. Ford 284 and for Dr. Nelson 62.

Halsey Votes \$4000 Tax.

HALSEY, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—At the annual school election yesterday Halsey school district No. 41 elected Bert S. Clark director and B. M. Bond clerk. A tax of \$4000 was voted to help on the running expenses. A new heating system will be installed during the summer.

Officers Are Re-elected.

CONDON, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—At the annual school election held here yesterday for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year, the following were selected: J. J. Jackson, to succeed himself as director, and H. P. Schilling, to succeed himself as clerk.

MILK PRICES HELD FIXED

Absolute Monopoly of Business in Los Angeles Charged.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 21.—The Los Angeles county grand jury today returned indictments against 18 firms, corporations or individuals charging violation of the anti-trust law in that they fixed milk prices at unreasonable figures here. Indictments were also returned against 14 creamery companies.

Allegations of the indictments were that the accused shut off competition, forced small producers out of business, exacted unreasonable profits from consumers and established a monopoly of the milk business in Los Angeles.

PIRATE THEORY SUPPORTED

Message Found in Bottle—Now Is Counted Genuine.

PORTLAND, Me., June 21.—The theory that pirates are afloat in the North Atlantic has found credence here. Belief in the existence of the state of recently missing ships has grown with establishment of the fact that the message in a bottle found by the crew of the Deering, a five-masted, Bath schooner, Carroll A. Deering, mysteriously disappeared in Cape Hatteras, purporting to explain the disappearance of the crew of the Deering, was written by Henry Bates of Islesboro, Me., a member of the Deering's crew.

The question of the legitimacy of the message was settled by handwriting experts, who compared it with letters written by Bates.

The unsigned note said that the schooner had been captured by an oil-burning craft, something like a submarine chaser, the crew handcuffed, and that everything was being taken off.

REDS BELIEVED RESPONSIBLE

Woman Whose Son Disappeared Convinced He Is Prisoner.

OAKLAND, Cal., June 21.—Francis Bogan of Oakland, member of the state of the Deering, was a captive in Russia, according to the belief of Mrs. Mary Bogan, his mother, expressed today when she learned that the vessel was one alleged to have been stolen by bolshevik sailors and turned over to the Lenin government.

Since the Hewitt was reported overdue in February, Mrs. Bogan has clung to the belief that her son was alive. If bolshevik members of the crew stole the ship, she said, they may be holding her son captive to keep him from revealing the details of the ship-stealing programme in the United States.

Water was turned on last night and the huge tank was ready for plunges today. Painting work has been done and all ladders have been installed. Registration to date included 35 women, 80 men and 68 little boys and girls.

Woman Accused of Forgeries.

DALLAS, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—For the last few months Dallas and Falls City merchants have been victimized by a woman check forger, who would make small purchases at their stores and give in payment checks ranging in amounts from \$5 to \$20. This morning Sheriff Orr arrested Mrs. L. E. White, wife of a farmer living between this city and Falls City. She was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Court in this city and she made a partial confession after she had been identified by a number of her victims. Her case was continued until next Monday.

Bigger Fund Expected.

MILLIONAIRE'S HEIRS CALL WILL BOGUS

Handwriting Experts Rap Signature of Murphy.

EXECUTOR DENIES CHARGE

Fight for Huge Fortune Extends to Several States as Dispute Gains Impetus.

BUTTE, Mont., June 21.—A new angle has developed in the Murray will case through the statement published in San Francisco that, in the opinion of handwriting experts, the instrument is a forgery. James A. McGovern, a student of criminology, whose estate is estimated to have a value between ten and fifteen millions, died recently at his home in Monterey, Cal.

Daniel A. Ryan, San Francisco lawyer, retained by kinship of Mr. Murray to represent them in contest proceedings, has employed Chauncey McGovern, said to be a handwriting expert. The latter has said Edward O. Heinrich of the University of California, a student of criminology, has been examining the signature of the will on file at the Salinas, Cal., courthouse to testify in the proceedings.

"One-third of the Murray will is in pencil and the other two-thirds in ink. I have found what I believe to be discrepancies in the signature."

Signature Called Bogus. "Photographs enlarged to many times their original size show me that someone has tampered with it. I am not prepared to say to what extent and I accuse no one. I believe a part of the signature has been gone over a second time and I have evidence that lines were drawn so there would be no mistake in the size of the various letters."

State Enters Fight. These include the action brought in the name of the state of Montana to establish the residence of the late Mr. Murray in Butte so the state can claim inheritance tax. The latest contest was brought by the widow in Seattle, where the Murray estate is said to include property having a value of \$4,000,000. The widow has filed a petition there asking for the removal of James P. Gleason, administrator of the estate in Washington.

The claim is made that these notes have a value of \$12,000 and represent funds belonging to the estate. Marcus Murray of Butte, nephew of the late Mr. Murray, has begun proceedings in this city to contest the probating of the will. Former Associate Justice Henry C. Smith of Helena has been named as special administrator of the estate to take charge of the Murray property here. He was suggested by counsel for the widow and appointment was not opposed by the Murray claimants in Butte.

WIDOW FIGHTS FOR RICHES

Superior Court to Hear Details in Estate Clash.

SEATTLE, June 21.—Hearing on the petition for the removal of James P. Gleason as special administrator in the state of Washington of the estate of James A. Murray, a wealthy western capitalist, which was to have been held in superior court here today, was continued until June 29 by stipulation of counsel. Mr. Gleason's removal was asked by Mrs. Mary H. Murray of Monterey, Cal., widow of James A. Murray and W. E. K. Brown, named executor in a will filed in Salinas, Cal. They charged him with acting in the interest of relatives who are contesting the will.

NEW RATE SCHEDULE OUT

ALLOWANCES FOR INJURED WORKMEN FIXED.

Summary Issued by State Industrial Accident Commission Effective July 1.

SALEM, Or., June 21.—(Special.)—The state industrial accident commission, in a statement prepared here today, set out the new rates to be paid injured workmen who are protected under the workman's compensation law. The new schedule will become effective July 1, under a new law enacted at the last session of the legislature.

The new rates, as summarized by the commission, follow:

Single man, minimum per month, \$20; maximum per month, \$55.
Man and wife, minimum per month, \$40; maximum per month, \$85.
Man, wife and one child, minimum per month, \$40; maximum per month, \$75.

Man, wife and two children, minimum per month, \$40; maximum per month, \$81.
Man, wife and three children, minimum per month, \$40; maximum per month, \$89.

Man, wife and four children, minimum per month, \$40; maximum per month, \$97.
If the wages are lower than the minimum rates, actual wages apply as a minimum rate.

Intermediate rates are: Single workman, 40 per cent; married workman, 48 per cent; married workman with one child, 53 per cent; married workman with two children, 63 per cent; and married workman with four children, 66.25 per cent.

GIRL DENIES MURDER

Convicted Slayer Says She Lied to Save Mother.

ST. LOUIS, June 21.—Mrs. Daniel E. Miller, 17 years of age, before her recent marriage Ursula Broderick, confessed slayer of her father and stepfather, did not kill the former, it was announced in juvenile court today. Judge Hartmann made this announcement in paroling Mrs. Miller, who was under ten-year sentence for the death in 1913 of her stepfather, Joseph Woodcock.

"This woman has told me she did not kill her father, Thomas Broderick, in 1916, but confessed the crime in defense of her mother," the judge said.

Mrs. Lillian Woodcock, the mother, is under ten-year sentence in connection with Broderick's death.

The girl was exonerated of her father's death on testimony that she shot in defense of her mother. She said she shot Woodcock to defend her honor.

MR. RICH'S WILL FILED

Brother of Murdered Man Gets \$3000 Under Testament.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 21.—(Special.)—The will of Benjamin Rich, American Legion member and councilman of the Ridgefield, murdered in his home June 5, was filed for probate today by Charles Rich, a brother, who lives at Woodland. The will leaves property valued at about \$3000 to Charles Rich, with the provision that the mother, Mrs. Sarah Rich, be provided for in her old age in case her resources are lost.

Sheriff Thompson and J. E. Hall, county attorney, went to Chehalis last night on a clew that may lead to the capture of the mysterious tall man who was last seen with Mr. Rich before he was killed. Sheriff Thompson has worked intensely on the case since the body was discovered.
