MONARCH MOTOR COMPANY SUEB.
 H. C. Anderson, trustee of the Monarch Motor company and its directors yesterday for the return of \$2000 invested in stock in the concern, it being alleged the deal was made by virtue of bad faith and false representations of the defendant company officials. The company is alleged to have been depicted as thriving, owning its own building and doing a prosperous business. These representations were declared in the suit to be fraudulent.

FIVE OR \$250 PAID.—T. A. Peterson, manager of the Barbours Supply company yesterday paid a fine of \$250 to the United States marshal for violation of the prohibition law. Peterson's chief clerk Monday paid a fine of \$100 which was imposed upon him. Both men were convicted some time ago on evidence showing that they sold a large amount of the alcohol they were permitted to obtain for the manufacture of bay rum.

REMODELING TO COST \$25,000.—Announcement was made yesterday by the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway will expend about \$25,000 in remodeling the Chamber of Commerce building which it recently acquired and which it is now operating. One feature already in operation is the Lotus Innside inn, located in the lobby and conducted by the W. F. Rogers Hotel company.

BREITENBUSH BURN PLANTED.

Walter Leve, forest examiner, returned yesterday to Portland from the Santiam national forest, where he has been in charge of planting operations on the Breitenbush burn. The forest service planted 15,000 trees on the burn during the past month, covering 350 acres. The trees are principally Douglas fir and western white pine. Mr. Leve had 25 men working under him doing the planting. This burn, which has been swept by fire three times, has been the scene of planting operations twice before, in the fall of 1915, and the spring of 1920. A total of 356 acres had been covered before the work was begun there again this spring.

MORTSON DECLARED OUTSIDE PRINTERS' ASSOCIATION.—R. Fennell, secretary-manager of the Employing Printers' association, declared yesterday that J. H. Mortson, indicted by the federal grand jury for printing whisky labels, is not a member of the association. "The association in December, 1919," said Mr. Fennell, "adopted a resolution that no member would print any literature or other matter on conflict with a policy of the government. Since the resolution was adopted we are responsible in two instances of having labels printed for the Mortson, of nature which the offenders had ordered."

AD CLUB PROGRAMME TODAY.—A big double bill is promised Ad club members at the regular weekly meeting at the Benson hotel at noon today, with Edward S. Jordan, president of the Jordan Motor Car company and formerly advertising manager of the Jeffrey Motor Car company, to deliver the principal address on advertising and the "Problems of Today" and Clara Kimball Young, motion picture star who is visiting in Portland, who will talk on "Marvels of the Movies." The programme will be under the direction of the inactive membership committee, with A. R. Gephart as chairman.

CHARGE FILED AGAINST GROCER.
 Charges of receiving stolen property were filed yesterday against C. E. Testerman, grocer at 113 Russell street. He was arrested Saturday as a result of a search of the Burns crowd, who were accused of the responsibility for the murder of "Buck" Phillips, railroad detective. Bills of sale, the handling of Burns showing that Testerman had received property stolen from box-cars, were said to be in the hands of the federal officers. Testerman was unable to give \$2000 bail and was taken to the county jail.

SUMMER SCHOOL OPENS.—About 20 Episcopal clergymen are attending the sixth annual Oregon clergy summer school, which opened at St. Helen's hall, on Vista avenue, yesterday morning. The visitors are from various northwest churches. A series of lectures in which Dr. F. W. Moore of San Francisco, Dr. H. H. Gowan of the University of Washington and Dr. Brainerd of New York will be the principal speakers has been arranged. Bishop Sumner of the Oregon Episcopal church opened the sessions of the summer school with an address yesterday morning.

O-W-R & N. SUEB BY GOVERNMENT.
 The O-W-R & N. was charged with failure to comply with the federal 28-hour law requiring that livestock of all kinds be removed from cars at least once in 28 hours for exercise while in transit, in a suit filed yesterday by the United States attorney Lusk. The suit was for \$500, the penalty for failure to comply with the law. The court specified a shipment of 19 horses and 22 mules from Kansas City, Mo., to La Grande, Or.

ST. HELENS DESIRES MORE SPEED.
 The St. Helens chamber of commerce has asked the Portland Chamber of Commerce to assist in obtaining an amendment to the city traffic ordinance that will permit of a speed greater than 20 miles an hour between Linnton and the Forestry building. The president of the St. Helens chamber, speaking for the people of that town, wrote that it is believed a greater speed would not endanger anything and would facilitate business greatly.

ALLEGED DYNAMITER ON TRIAL.
 Trial of Archie McCoy, alleged dynamiter of the Troutdale State bank on the night of April 26, was begun yesterday in Judge McCourt's department of the circuit court. The building was wrecked and McCoy was picked up later in a field some distance away, apparently overcome by some sort of poison and helpless. It is the theory of the prosecution that McCoy's confession, which accounted for the dynamite, was a confession.

SLEEPING SICKNESS FATAL.—Two deaths from sleeping sickness were reported to the city health bureau yesterday. Robert A. Greene, aged 49, 294 Tenth street, died at St. Vincent's hospital Sunday after an illness of nine days. William Gray, 56, died at his home, 358 Third street, Sunday. He had been ill since June 1, and had been attended by a physician since June 5.

CLIMATE HERE IS PRAISED

FILM STAR SAYS LOS ANGELES WEATHER IS INTERIOR.

Clara Kimball Young Merely Lives "Down There" While Her Heart Is in Rose City.

Portland has better weather than Los Angeles, according to Clara Kimball Young, a resident of the southern California city, who is visiting in Portland for a few days and who addressed the members of the Rotary club at their luncheon in the crystal room of the Benson hotel yesterday. She said she was willing to be quoted to that effect and also said she merely lives "down there" while her "heart is in this grand city."

Miss Young's statement as to the weather created some surprise, for she is the first resident of Los Angeles ever known to admit this self-evident fact, so far as the records of the Oregon Historical society reveal, and they date back quite a while. This feature of her speech, therefore, was a "knockout" and immediately following J. R. Ellison, presiding, adjourned the meeting for one week.

Miss Young also praised this community for its quick grasp of business opportunities and expressed pity for the "effete east," the people of which, she said, "never can know what they're missing until they come west to live."

"Then," she declared, "they begin to realize what they have been missing and become our greatest boosters." She reiterated her intention of being the first to arrive here when the 1925 exposition opens. She also said she will be up for the Rose Festival next summer and expressed keen regret at her inability to be here for last week's pageant.
