

OLD ATLAS' JOB URGED ON HARDING

President Asked to Support
Whole Universe.

EXECUTIVE IS UNRUFFLED

White House Incumbent Devotes
Careful Thought to Every
Matter on Desk.

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WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—(Special.)—President Harding is at that point in the evolution of his administration which is solicited to be not merely president, but Atlas, a catalogue of the demands and solicitations, which everybody in Washington knows are bent upon on President Harding would put him in the position of being responsible for the political, moral, and economic support of the universe.

Both temperamentally and by policy, President Harding would like to confine himself within the constitutional bounds of his official position as president of the United States, but he is besieged by a score of powerful agencies to accept responsibility for many other things.

The pressure which is just now most acute on him is in a field in which he is most reluctant to yield. Probably there has hardly been a day this week when members of his cabinet and other republican party leaders and business men have not been clamoring for him to take the leadership, which congress does not have within itself.

Lack of Speed Feared.
It is a final conclusion on the part of these advisors that unless President Harding takes leadership of it congress will more or less disintegrate into a number of groups and factions, out of which no speed or compactness of action can be expected.

President Harding is also besought to accept responsibility for the fortunes of the republican party. Many of the best of President Harding's appointments, and some of the wisest and most forward-looking of his actions, have been on a non-political basis. When President Harding spends weeks in search, and finally selects the best man he can possibly find for post after post he has to fill, the republican party organizations in the various states remain him that while these appointments are splendid, they don't help to keep the party workers in line. The local party machines, especially in some of the southern states, were particularly displeased over President Harding's refusal to throw some 10,000 post offices open to the party workers.

Business Leadership Urged.
President Harding is also besought to accept responsibility for the economic improvement of the United States. These conferences President Harding is holding with bankers are not a normal part of the president's job. They arise out of the demand that he shall accept leadership and responsibility for the economic recovery in business conditions. These conferences are a pooling of wisdom under the leadership as to what can be done toward making business better.

Along with all this, President Harding is under steady pressure and solicitation to accept responsibility for the normal and economic recovery of that part of the world which lies outside the United States. In some ways this pressure is the most powerful of all. It comes not merely from important persons both here and abroad. It also comes from circumstances again and again when something is attempted that applies to the United States alone, it turns out that our country can make no progress until the whole world is stabilized.

Problems Are Studied.
Anybody who watches President Harding as he goes through all this pressure from day to day is likely to get a sympathetic feeling for the president's unburied and untrifled patience. There is never a sign of those snap decisions with which men of a different temperament occasionally dispose of crowded affairs. President Harding is not that kind of an executive. He gives real thought to everything that passes over his desk.

He has markedly that kind of administrative ability which consists in delegating authority and responsibility to others and he around him, not merely in his cabinet, but also in the men whom he has appointed to other important positions, a group of personalities which are able to live up to a high degree of responsibility.

WOMAN'S TRIAL TODAY

MRS. EULIA INGLES CHARGED
WITH MANSLAUGHTER.

Lodging House Keeper to Plead
That She Shot A. J. Burns
in Self Defense.
ASTORIA, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—The case against Mrs. Eulia Ingles, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of A. J. Burns, whom she shot on the night of April 23, will be called for trial in the circuit court tomorrow. She will plead self-defense.

Mrs. Ingles conducted a lodging house here, and has been in Astoria since last October. Burns, it was said, had been living with her for the past two years and, according to reports, the defense will show that he lived off her earnings and had squandered considerable sums of her money since their arrival in this city.

According to the story told by the defendant, Burns had been drinking heavily on the day of the shooting and had abused her and beaten her, though he knew that she had not recovered from two major operations she had undergone. She will contend, it was said, that he threatened to get her "once for all" and that, to escape him, she locked herself in the kitchen and only shot him after he had broken the door down. She shot him through the abdomen and he died later at the hospital.

LUMBER TARIFF WAR ON
INSURGENT REPUBLICANS OF
HOUSE ORGANIZE.

Members Ready to Vote With Democrats If Necessary to Defeat Fordney Schedule.
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—(Special.)—Plans were completed by the insurgents on the republican side of the house Tuesday for a fight on the lumber tariff. They are ready to go the length of voting with the democrats, if need be, to accomplish their purpose. Reports that Chairman Fordney of the ways and means committee has enlisted the backing of President Harding, hold no terror for the insurgents.

Representatives from 15 states were called to assemble in the smagly caucus room in the morning, and at this meeting Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Nevada, Indiana, Ohio, New York, North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, Illinois and Missouri were represented.

A sub-committee was appointed to round up members to stand against the Fordney lumber duty. It is composed of Dickinson of Iowa, Fish of New York, Murphy of Ohio, Graham of Illinois, Reavis of Nebraska and Young of North Dakota.

From the office of Representative Tower of Iowa the following was issued:
"It was the opinion of those present from the 15 states that the matter should be fully considered and a protest made, not only by the representatives present, but also by representatives from states not represented at the conference."

A committee was appointed to investigate further the sentiment of representatives and report results of the investigation to the ways and means committee.

Whatever action is taken by the ways and means committee on the bill, which will be reported, will be considered by a republican conference and the subject of the duty on lumber will be considered at such a conference.

NEW RATES SUSPENDED
SALEM, EUGENE AND WEST
LINN INCREASE HELD UP.
Oregon Public Service Commission
Issues Order and Will Investigate Schedules.

SALEM, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—The Oregon public service commission, in an order issued here tonight, suspended until October 1 operation of the new tariffs increasing the fares on the lines of the Salem street car company, Eugene street car company and West Linn street car company. At the time of issuing the order the commission announced that an investigation would be prosecuted to determine the reasonableness of the rates included in the proposed new schedules.

The Salem company and the West Linn company proposed in the new tariff to increase single-ride fares from 5 to 8 cents, while the Eugene company, in addition to asking an advance from 5 to 8 cents on its city lines, sought to raise its rate between Eugene and Springfield from 10 to 14 cents. The new tariffs affecting the city lines of the three companies, also included the provision that strips of six tickets would be sold for 45 cents, while books of 50 tickets, good for single rides, would be increased from \$2.50 to \$3.45. The new tariffs would have become operative July 1, had not the commission issued an order of suspension pending an investigation.

This was the first suspension of rates by the commission under a new law enacted at the last session of the legislature. All three of the companies are controlled by the Southern Pacific company.

Professor Goes to California.
UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 23.—(Special.)—George Turnbull, member of the faculty of the University of Oregon school of journalism and editor of Oregon Exchange, left last night for San Francisco, where he will spend the summer doing newspaper work. Eric W. Allen of the school of journalism is also in California, being in charge of the journalism work at the University of California for its summer term. Alfred Powers is in charge of the department.

Salmon Runs Improving.
ASTORIA, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—The catch of salmon in the lower Columbia harbor is gradually improving and a good run is expected as soon as the freshet subsides. The Columbia River Packers' association, holding ground at Sand Island is expected to begin next week. Advances received state there are good runs of chinooks at Humboldt bay, Rogue river and on the Siuslaw.

Growers Incorporate in Idaho.
BOISE, Idaho, June 23.—(Special.)—The United States Grain Growers, a non-stock, non-profit corporation, organized under the laws of the state of Delaware, has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state here. Lewiston, Nax Perce county, is designated as the principal place of business in Idaho. W. S. Shearer of Lewiston, president of the Idaho farm bureau, federation, is designated as its authorized agent.

Umpqua Post Elects Delegates.
ROSEBURG, Or., June 23.—(Special.)—Leo G. Devaney, commander of Umpqua post of the American Legion, and a member of the state assembly, elected delegates to the American Legion to be held in Eugene on July 1 and 2.

Bend Flower Show Announced.

2 ASK GARDNER REWARD

CENTRALIA WOMAN ASSERTS
TIP LED TO CAPTURE.

Remuneration for Officer Is Asked;
Postoffice Department to Decide Peculiar Case.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., June 23.—Two persons are claiming a reward, if any is offered, for the capture of Roy Gardner, escaped train robber, who was taken at Centralia, Wash., recently by Mrs. Marion Howell, hotel manager, asserts in a letter to Representative Albert Johnson that she gave the police the tip as to Gardner's presence in Centralia 24 hours before he could get action. H. E. Grimm, Centralia lawyer, claims the reward for Louis Sonny, the local officer, who placed Gardner under arrest.

There appeared some doubt at the postoffice department today that there was any reward for Gardner's arrest after his escape at Castle Rock, Wash., from the two officers who were taking him and another prisoner to McNeil's island prison.

The case is peculiar in that Gardner had been arrested as a mail train robber, tried, convicted and sentenced.

The arrest at Centralia, therefore, is said to be in a class not contemplated by the provisions fixing rewards for the apprehension of mail train robbers. The postoffice department has the matter under advisement and if it

is decided that a reward is to be paid it will be necessary to determine whether it is due Mrs. Howell, who is said to have exposed Gardner, or to Officer Sonny, who made the arrest.

in the class he was one of the 15 who received honors.

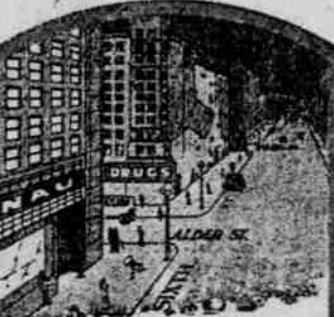
Woods' Name Sent to Senate.

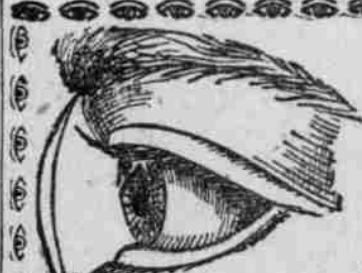
