VETERANS INDORSE HOTCHKISS.—
 Resolutions have been adopted by the
 administrative council of the Spanish-
 American war veterans, endorsing
 Clarence R. Hotchkiss for United
 States marshal. The resolutions are
 to the effect that the veterans under-
 stand and appreciate the services of
 the Oregon delegation that John
 L. Day has the support of the or-
 ganization. The resolution protests
 against the appointment of Mr. Day
 and wants him to submit his qualifi-
 cations and record of public service
 to be published in comparison with
 that of Mr. Hotchkiss.

ORDINANCE ENFORCED FOR CHANGES.—
 The proposed ordinance to increase
 the license fees for second-hand deal-
 ers, junk men, and many other
 licensed business establishments in
 the city was referred back to the
 city attorney yesterday for changes
 after a reading before the council.
 The ordinance was drafted under the
 direction of the license inspector and
 is designed to increase the city's
 revenue from various sources which
 are not paying a special tax at pres-
 ent as well as exact a heavier fee
 from many that now come under it.

NEGRO HELD TO GRAND JURY.—
 Arthur Drizile, 20-year-old, who was
 charged with the murder of a woman
 Monday night, attacked two other
 persons and attempted to rob a fifth,
 was held to answer to the grand jury
 by Municipal Judge Rossman yester-
 day on charges of assault with intent
 to kill and attempted larceny. Bail
 was placed at \$1000 in each case. No
 doubt was expressed as to Drizile's
 sanity but Judge Rossman said this
 could be investigated while he was
 before the grand jury.

CARE OF GRAVES GOOD

FRENCH HONOR AMERICAN DEAD WITH BEAUTY.

Ex-Commander of 91st Division Declares Bodies Should Not Be Disturbed.

That the graves of the American dead in France should remain undisturbed and be entrusted to the care and keeping of the French peasants, is an opinion expressed by Brigadier-General William H. Johnston, former commander of the 91st division, now chief of staff of the American forces in Germany, in a letter to a Portland friend.

The letter follows:
 "Colonel John G. Strohm spent several days with me here (Coblenz) last month while he was on route to Vienna to take some surgical work. While here he made a special study of the medical training center which was very instructive and of which he sent a report to the surgeon-general.

"Having been recently detailed to represent the army at Belleau cen-
 tery, I took my daughter with me to Paris, obtained a car from the Graves registration service and drove back through Chateau Thierry, Meuse, Argonne and St. Mihiel. I followed the entire route of the 91st division from the day we entered the Forest de Hesse to the hills north of Coblenz, reached by the 181st brigade September 29. Romagne cemetery is just northeast of those hills about a mile.

"I walked through the cemetery and saw the graves of Liege Worsham, Leslie Toose, Major Miller and Far-
 well and dozens of others of our officers and men. It is a pity that some relatives asked for the return of the remains of their deceased. The four cemeteries to be maintained in France are beautiful places and well cared for. The French peasants de-
 corated all of the American graves, even though the graves of the over-
 dead were generally unknown and unmarked.

"I was relieved of duty as chief of staff on May 15 and have been waiting orders from the war depart-
 ment. I hope I may be able to remain with these forces as I now have com-
 pleted less than ten months during the present tour.

"Give my kind regards to all members of the 91st division."

TROUT "PLANTING" BEGINS
 Millions of Fish to Be Distributed
 in Oregon Streams.

The annual season for distribution
 of trout in the fishing streams of
 the state begins today, according to
 M. L. Ryckman, state superintendent
 of hatcheries, with the planting
 of a million black spotted and rain-
 bow trout in streams in Josephine
 and Douglas counties. Trout will be
 distributed in southern Oregon first
 and later in the central and eastern
 parts of the state.

Eastern brook trout are to be put
 in the lakes at the heads of the Wil-
 let and McKenzie rivers. All the
 eastern brook variety are being
 sent out from the Elk lake hatchery
 near Bend, while the rainbow trout
 are from the hatchery at Fort
 Klamath in southern Oregon. The
 black spotted trout are being sent

from the hatcheries at Siuslaw and
 Tidewater on the coast.

This year an actual count will be
 made of all the trout liberated in
 the various streams of the state, and
 a statement on distribution will be
 given out by Superintendent Ryck-
 man at the end of the season, in
 September.

 ing to ascertain the value of various
 sections of land owned by the Wash-
