

VALERA IS ARRESTED AND THEN RELEASED

Either Error or Overzeal by
Officials Blamed.

LORRY IS ATTACKED

Two of Bombs Land in Machine.
Five Civilians Are Wounded
in Heavy Firing.

DUBLIN, June 23.—(By the Associated Press.)—Eamon de Valera, the Irish republican leader, was arrested Wednesday night near this city and later released. It was definitely established today that there had been earlier attempts to arrest him. It appeared certain that de Valera was arrested either in error or through overzeal on the part of officials concerned.

The arrest, it was understood, was made at Black Rock, county Dublin. The prisoner was detained for the night and, his identity being learned, he was released yesterday afternoon.

As a matter of fact, it is declared here there was no intention on the part of the authorities in Ireland to arrest de Valera.

A military lorry was attacked this afternoon at the junction of North Frederick and Dorset streets, bombs being thrown at the lorry, two of which landed in it.

The casualties to the military have not been reported, but five civilians were wounded when the rifle firing which followed the attack.

TROOP TRAIN IS BLOWN UP

Four Persons Killed and 20 Are
Injured in Explosion.

BELFAST, June 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Four persons were killed and 20 were injured when a train carrying troops homeward from Belfast, where they attended the ceremonies of the opening of parliament Wednesday, was attacked with mines and bombs.

The attack on the train was made at a desolate spot one mile north of Abercrombie, near Dundalk. Two trains previously had passed safely over the spot. Most of the cars of the wrecked train were sent toppling over a steep embankment by the explosion. All of the telegraph and telephone lines north of Dundalk had been cut before the explosion was set off.

An official account of the disaster says that a portion of the railway track was removed and a number of bombs were placed in the gap.

Railway employees working near the scene of the explosion prior to the arrival of the troop train were held up by an armed band and herded into a nearby cottage, where they were detained until after the troop train had been blown up.

MIND IS DECLARED ON WAR

Honor of Five Free Nations Is Said
to Be Involved.

DUBLIN, June 24.—Tonight's issue of the Daily Eireann's official organ, the Irish Bulletin, said:

"At the opening of the imperial conference the mind of the British cabinet is still bent on war, but the cabinet is not immortal, and the British commonwealth contains five free nations whose honor is involved in a war they have not authorized and for which they nevertheless cannot escape the responsibility. If the issue were clear and the historical sequence of events of the past lustum understood, it can hardly be doubted that they would endeavor to bring about peace on the only terms of peace possible."

The Bulletin then narrated the events of the last five years, including the establishment of the Irish republic.

CANADIANS LOSE CAPTIVE

Plea for Extradition of Farmer
Denied in San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24.—A petition of the government of the province of Saskatchewan, Canada, to extradite Adam Philipchuk, a farmer, to answer a charge of larceny in connection with breaking and entering at Perdue, was denied today by United States Commissioner Krull. The commissioner held that the breaking of such a contract was not an extraditable offense.

Philipchuk was a member of a Russian colony at Perdue and planted 440 acres to wheat on a crop of 1919. He sold half of his grain on a falling market and abandoned the other half, according to the Canadian authorities.

SCHOOL COSTS INCREASE

rated at 266,300; the number of pupils belonging was 23,186; there were 1129 teachers and the average was 23.8 pupils per teacher. This was the smallest number of pupils per teacher in the record of the schools. In 1918 the population was 191,700; the number of pupils belonging was 20,835; there were 1152 teachers and the average was 28.5 pupils to each teacher.

The population figures are the estimates made by the school board in the reports, save where the official census figures of the government were available. The estimates varied, and on occasion there was a heavy decrease.

The output for salaries for teachers has also climbed. In 1901 the average was \$200.48; in 1917 it was \$1177.31; in 1918, \$1234.76; in 1919, \$1242.47; and in 1920 the average was \$1292.16.

There has been a great decrease in the number of pupils to each teacher in the 20-year period and an even greater increase in the salary averages for the same time. In 1901, \$208,745.10 was enough for the teachers' payroll, while in 1920 it required \$2,244,885.76 to meet the payroll.

When the taxpayers made the school levy in 1901 they fixed 4.5 mills on an assessed valuation of \$42,359,070 as sufficient for all the expenses of the district. In 1916 the levy was 6.6 mills on a valuation of \$25,121,760, which raised in taxes for the school district \$1,359,227.97. In 1917 there was a slight decrease in the assessed valuation, not very much, but a little less than a 6.8 levy on \$23,025,315, raising \$1,372,151.80.

\$18,065,930 ADDED TO NAVY BILL TOTAL

House Estimates Increased in
Joint Conference.

SENATE ITEMS DROPPED

Equipment for Submarines, Publication of Bulletin at Cost and Survey Eliminated.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—A total of \$18,065,930 is carried by the naval appropriation bill under final figures completed today by senate and house conferees. This is an increase of \$18,065,930 over the original house appropriation and almost \$80,000,000 less than the senate provided.

The house is expected to act Monday or Tuesday on the conferees' agreement and the Senate disarmament conference amendment.

In final conference form the bill shows the increase of \$6,135,000 for new naval aircraft cut to \$5,161,000.

A senate item of \$2,000,000 for re-equipping six L-type submarines was stricken out, as were senate amendments authorizing issuance of the general "shipping bulletin" at cost; proposing a general survey of naval bases and a report whether they could be abandoned; prohibiting navy officers from having any connections with armament manufacturers and prohibiting retirement of naval officers below the grade of captain.

The senate amendment to give disabled members of the naval reserve corps full retirement benefits will be voted on by the house, but the senate ration allowance of 60 cents a day was cut to 50 cents, subject to a house vote.

SCORE TAKEN IN CLEANUP

Aberdeen Police Make Many Arrests on Liquor Charge.

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 24.—(Special.)—Aberdeen police yesterday concentrated on "mopping-up" campaign, following the county and city vice crusade which started Sunday and which, until yesterday afternoon, had resulted in more than a score of arrests on liquor violations and disorderly resort charges. IDAHO GUARD TO EXPAND

Northern Towns Apply for Battery of Artillery.

BOISE, Idaho, June 24.—(Special.)—Authority was received today by Colonel L. V. Patch, adjutant general of the state national guard, to form a number of additions to the national guard after July. He has received notification that one battalion of light artillery, one battalion of infantry, one hospital corps, one wagon company and one division headquarters, which will be located here, will be included in the regimental headquarters, with colonel, commanding and regimental staff. A number of applications already have been received by the adjutant-general for the location of the various batteries. Communications have been received from Idaho towns asking that they be allowed a battery of artillery.

A large number of ex-service men in Idaho were with the 148th artillery during the recent world war and it is believed no trouble will be met in filling up the batteries quickly.

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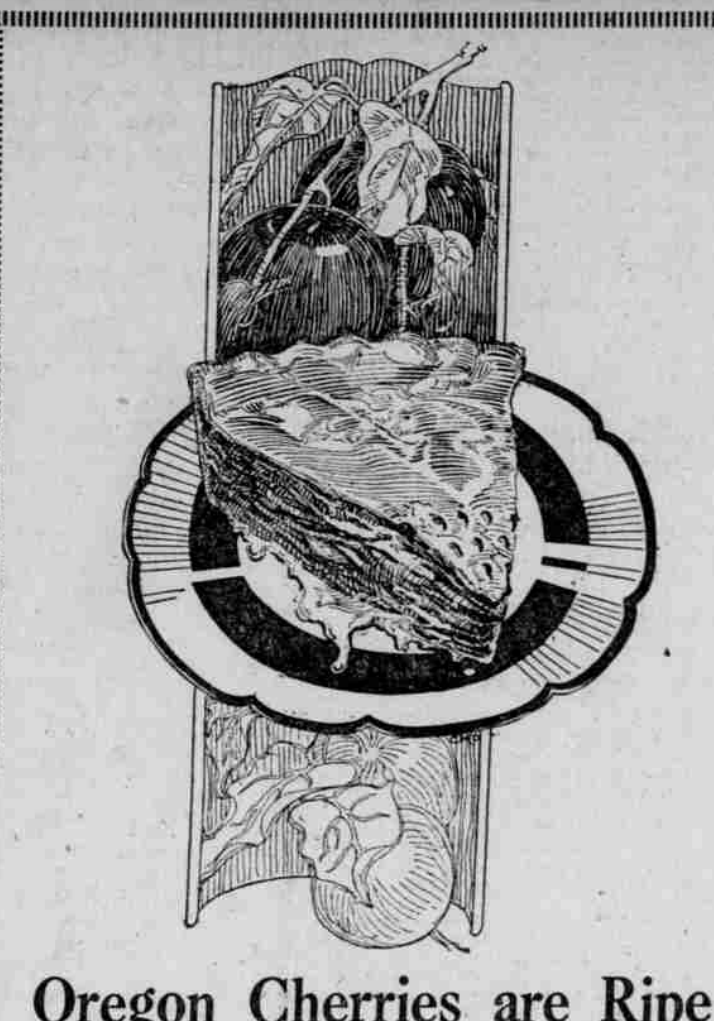
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WALLA WALLA GRAIN HURT

REPORTS MADE ON DAMAGE BY HAIL STORM.

Small Fruits, Especially Cherries and Raspberries, Also Reported to Have Suffered.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 24.—(Special.)—The wind, rain and hail storm yesterday was heaviest over the southeastern part of Walla Walla county, according to reports reaching the city today. It passed over the state line west of the Milton road and damaged wheat in the Weston and Adams vicinity.

James Mackin, a farmer on the Cottonwood, said his farm seemed to be in the storm center. Wheat which he said would yield 40 bushels to the acre will not yield ten unless it straightens up considerably before harvest, he declared.
