THREE HELD TO GRAND JURY.—Mrs. Kate Deane, held in the county jail on a charge of having forged warehouse receipts and obtaining money through fraudulent representations that they were of value, was ordered held to the Multnomah county grand jury yesterday in district court. Bail was fixed at \$2500. Ben Tourtellot, charged with involuntary manslaughter because he ran down Susan Shirley with his automobile, May 27, the woman dying of her hurts, was held for grand jury investigation, as was Herman Gauthier, accused of larceny by bailie, it being charged he appropriated for his own purposes \$100 belonging to Jack Perren, and also A. H. Burton, against whom a charge has been lodged of obtaining money by false pretenses, it being alleged he cashed a check that represented no funds.

MOTORCYCLE RIDER CRASHES.—A. R. Anderson was Yamhill street was thrown from his motorcycle into a tree when he attempted to avoid an automobile at Washington and Ella streets shortly after noon yesterday and was taken to the St. Vincent's hospital in a semi-conscious condition. It is thought that he may have suffered a fracture of the skull. In trying to avoid the automobile Anderson, who is employed by the Covey Motor Car company, lost control of his motorcycle and it collided with the curb. The driver of the automobile was D. C. Resner of 691 Millie street. Anderson is 30 years of age.

TRAIN SERVICE RESTORED.—Beginning today train service to and from the Pike's Peak region, the Royal Gorge, Leadville, Glenwood Springs, Grand Junction, Salt Lake, Mesa Verde and Yellow parks, California and northwest points will be resumed over the lines of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad. Such was the information received by W. C. McBride, general agent here, in a telegram from Denver yesterday. It was also stated that all health and pleasure resorts are accessible by regular means of travel in the Rocky mountains. Service was interrupted by the Pueblo flood.

FISHERMAN RESCUES BOY.—Eldred Puckett, 13 years of age, of 354 Russell street, probably would have drowned in the river near the Victoria dolphins yesterday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock but for the timely rescue of C. A. Pearson, 468 Vancouver avenue, who was fishing nearby. When he saw the boy sink Pearson jumped into the river from his boat and took the lad ashore. The ambulance service took the boy home. Puckett was in swimming and attempted to climb aboard a scow. His hold slipped and he fell back in the water with the result that he apparently became confused and sank.

CLAIM AGAINST ELLERS ARGUED.—Another little chapter in the long litigation was commenced yesterday before Judge Tucker in circuit court when the Schubert Piano company of New York argued a claim of \$95 against the Oregon Ellers Piano House, alleged to be an unpaid balance on a shipment of pianos. The defense counted their value to the unpaid amount and that the manufacturers knew of their lessened worth on that account. The hearing was continued yesterday until a later date.

BONUS SUIT CONTINUES.—Suit of 25 employees of the Olds, Wortman & King company for the payment of a bonus promised by the late J. C. Olds, but declared to have been left unpaid, was continued yesterday by Judge McCourt after the examination of witnesses. Arguments will be presented to the court later. Mr. Olds died at the end of 1918, and Beattie A. Olds, executrix, and Chris A. Bell, administrator of Mr. Olds' estate, are made defendants in the action.

THE KELSEY PROPERTY TRANSFERRED.—A consideration of \$100,000 cash was involved in the transfer of the remaining interests of the L. Therkelsen estate to Mary C. Therkelsen and Therkelsen Investment company yesterday. The property was bought from Mrs. H. B. Van Dusen, L. Therkelsen Jr. and Dr. R. S. Fisher. Included in the estate are the southwest corner of Park and Alder streets and the northeast corner of Third and Taylor streets.

LIQUOR INDICTMENT QUASHED.—An indictment against George P. Webster, a member of the Baker Stock company, for violation of the prohibition law was quashed yesterday by Judge McCourt. The indictment was returned by Federal grand jury at the request of Assistant United States Attorney Maguire. Because the federal agents who arrested Webster succeeded in their authority in searching his apartment without a warrant, Attorney Maguire asked that the indictment be thrown out.

ARSON SUSPECT BOUND OVER.—John Slowick was held, following a grand jury on a charge of arson yesterday by Municipal Judge Rossmann. His bail was placed at \$1000. Slowick was arrested by Captain Day of the fire marshal's office after the captain found evidence that the man's house at 714 South Kellogg street had been burned down by means of a fire trap ignited by a fuse.

ED GONAU PAROLED.—After having been sentenced to serve two years for perjury as a witness in the Lottis murder trial, Ed Gonau, taxi driver, was paroled to John H. Stevenson, his attorney, yesterday by Judge McCourt. Gonau testified during the trial that he did not hear the screams of Tessie Lottis, murdered by her husband, Thomas, after having left the car driven by Gonau.

BOYS HELD ON THEFT CHARGE.—Ray Wilson and Donald Boone were held to answer to the grand jury on a charge of larceny yesterday by Municipal Judge Rossmann following their arrest charged with stripping an automobile belonging to E. G. Gross. The boys are said to have taken a fire, a wheel and a spotlight. Their bail was set at \$500.

MASHER GETS 60 DAYS.—Peter Kelly, 42 years of age, was sentenced to 60 days in jail by Municipal Judge Rossmann yesterday on a charge of disorderly conduct. Kelly was arrested Thursday night by Patrolman S. M. Ramsey at Ninth and Dav's streets after he was said to have made improper proposals to two little girls.

TEST SUIT PLANNED ON BUDGET SYSTEM

Correct Procedure for Multnomah County Involved.

POINTS TO BE SETTLED

Whether One or Both Laws Enacted by Last Legislature Must Be Followed Is Question.

A test suit to determine the correct method of procedure in Multnomah county under the budget system enacted by the last legislature probably will be filed as a result of a conference in Salem yesterday between Attorney-General Van Winkle, District Attorney Evans, Deputy City Attorney Latourette and F. W. Mulvey, key of the tax conservation committee.

Two laws were passed to institute the budget system. One applied only to counties of 100,000 population or more, while the other applied to the state at large. The question has been raised as to whether or not Multnomah county tax-levying bodies will be forced to observe both laws. Mr. Van Winkle declared that a decision of the supreme court is practically the only way to clear up the points in question. Mr. Evans suggested that the tax conservation committee call upon the district attorney to bring a friendly suit to enjoin the city of Portland from complying with the budget provisions of the state law.

All Points to Be Considered. The suit would be carried to the supreme court and all points in question would be brought in for consideration. The settlement would determine the correct procedure under the budget law for the city council, the county commissioners, dock commission, school board and all other tax-levying bodies in Multnomah county. The city council went on record yesterday as favoring the suggested suit.

In case the supreme court holds that Multnomah county need observe only the law applying to counties of 100,000 population or more, a saving of thousands of dollars in the expense of preparing the budgets will result. Under the system, the tax-levying bodies prepare their budgets and submit them to the tax conservation committee for approval. The other law requires the holding of public hearings and the publication of the proposed budget on two occasions.

Question Raised by Council. The question was raised early in the week by members of the city council who hesitated to proceed with budget preparations until everything had been cleared up. Members of the council decided not to institute a friendly suit themselves as they feared the action might be construed as an attempt to hamper the new law. The question is of prime importance, according to Mr. Latourette, as any legal action that would hold up the budget-making would make it hard for the city to dispose of its bonds, or to proceed with other financial transactions.

An attempt will be made to obtain an early settlement.

ERROR DELAYS LOT SALE

AUCTION TO SATISFY TAXES POSTPONED SEVEN WEEKS.

Date in Published Notice Wrong, but Mistake Will Result in Profit to City.

The sale of property to satisfy delinquent taxes was postponed for yesterday morning was postponed by City Treasurer Adams when an error was found in the date in the notice published. It will result in a delay of approximately seven weeks before the property can be re-advertised and placed on sale at public auction, and also will cause a loss of several hundred dollars to the publisher.

Through a typographical error the date of sale was published as "Saturday, June 24." It had been the intention to sell the property Friday, June 24. As a result of the error the publisher will be obliged to reprint the notice free for a period of 30 days, according to Mr. Adams. The publication list filled about 10 columns of space. The cost of publication is probably in the neighborhood of \$1000 at the city rate.

Through a fortunate circumstance the city will profit by the delay, as several hundred dollars in delinquent assessments were paid in the day prior to the sale. The practice of some concerns controlling a large number of lots has been to stave off the city to the last ditch but pay up the day before the sale in order to avoid the greater penalty which becomes effective at that time, according to Mr. Adams.

The list will be revised immediately and the date fixed for a new sale. The sale cannot be held before the middle of August.
