

J. R. McCARL NAMED TO BE CONTROLLER

Position Is Created Under
New Budget Law.

TERM TO BE 15 YEARS

Secretary of Republican Congressional Campaign Committee
Gets \$10,000 Position.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—J. Raymond McCarl of McCook, Neb., secretary of the republican congressional campaign committee, was nominated today by President Harding to be controller-general of the United States, a position created by the new budget law which becomes effective Friday.

Mr. McCarl is about 40 years old and has been secretary of the congressional committee for about three years. He was secretary to Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, for a number of years.

Fiscal Affairs to Be Handled.
As controller-general, Mr. McCarl will have charge of government finances, expenditures of appropriations, auditing of all expenditures, settlement and adjustment of claims of and against the government and management of all fiscal affairs with the exception only of postal accounts.

Many government activities will be co-ordinated under the controller. He will inherit the duties, personnel, staff, documents and offices of the controller of the treasury, whose position and those of his auditors for various government departments are abolished by the new act.

Term of Office 15 Years.
The controller's term of office is 15 years and he is made ineligible for reappointment. His salary will be \$10,000 a year and he will be subject to removal for improper conduct by joint resolution of congress, requiring the president's approval.

The nomination of Charles B. Warren of Detroit to be ambassador to Japan was sent formally to the senate by President Harding. Announcement of his selection for the place was made last week.

S. Parker Gilbert Jr. of New Jersey was nominated for the newly created post of under secretary of the treasury.

Mr. Gilbert, who is 29 years old, is now assistant secretary of the treasury in charge of fiscal affairs. His home is in Bloomfield, N. J.

Joseph T. Booth was nominated to be register of the land office at Evanston, Wyo.

Donald McAllister was named receiver of public moneys at the same place.

YOUTH HELD RESPONSIBLE

LEON V. STARR, 17, EXAMINED
AFTER ATTACK ATTEMPT.

Boy Found to Be Capable of Knowing
Nature and Consequences of
Acts Although Sub-Normal.

LEON V. Starr, 17-year-old youth accused with Leonard Wilson of an attempted attack on Knox last week, will not escape prosecution in the circuit court through his appeal to the juvenile court. He was found yesterday through an examination by Dr. S. C. Kohs, psychologist of the court of domestic relations, to be responsible and capable of knowing the nature and consequences of his acts, though retarded both in intelligence and moral development.

As a result of the examination, Judge Kandler remanded the youth to the circuit court to stand trial with Wilson.

The tests used by Dr. Kohs were the Stanford-Binet intelligence test and the Kohs ethical discrimination test. On the former he obtained a mental age of 13 years 4 months, giving him a mental power of 85 per cent. In view of the fact that his life age is 17 years 7 months, he was classified as dull normal in intelligence. The limit of his intelligence growth has been reached, was the report.

On the ethical discrimination test Dr. Kohs obtained a score of 77 per cent, which is equivalent to the performance of a 12-year-old.

Starr and Wilson were accused of persuading Mrs. Knox to enter the automobile Starr was driving on the pretext of taking her from the coast side to the business district, instead of which he tried to drive her to the outskirts of the city and insult her. She escaped by leaping from the moving machine.

GRAIN SALES PLAN WINS
ASSOCIATION GETS HIGHER
PRICE THAN OTHERS.

Washington State Cargo Reported
Sold at Figure in Excess
of \$1 a Bushel.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—The Washington State Wheat Growers' association already has sold a cargo of 1921 wheat at a price "materially higher" than the prices offered by coast dealers, according to an announcement made today by Walter J. Robinson, state manager, at the opening session of the second annual convention of the association.

More than 50 delegates attended the sessions of the growers. Tomorrow the directors of the association will hold a meeting and Wednesday the Northwest wheat growers' association will hold a convention.

"Reports from various parts of the state show that farmers outside of the growers' association are contracting 1921 wheat for prices ranging from 95 cents to \$1," said Mr. Robinson. "We have sold a cargo of this year's crop at a price which will net the farmers considerably more than this amount."

Most Betting 2 to 1.
Hopper speaks French, so he will do the honors when it comes to the conversation. This 2-to-1 betting on Dempsey seems to be a snare and a delusion. One of the boys in a New York newspaper office told me that Dempsey followers do not seem willing to give better than 2-to-1 odds.

He explained that he already holds \$2000 there and wanted to bet on Carpenter at anything better than 2 to 1 and so far he has been unable to place a bet.

George Weedon, one-time manager of Nat Goodwin, and himself an old-time fight manager, called to mind today the 5 and 3-to-1 odds on Sullivan that went begging before the match in which Jim Corbett upset traditions and he believes that Dempsey will win. He added that history might repeat itself.

Tex Rickard is advertising in the New York papers that there are plenty of seats ranging in price from \$10 to \$40 to be had. Evidently the public is not responding as liberally as desired and the promoter wishes to counteract the belief that his house is all sold out.

HIRAM GILL'S SON DIES
Mother Witnesses Sudden Death
After Operation on Youth.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—Marshall Gill, youngest son of the late Hiram G. Gill, dropped dead in the office of Dr. E. J. Stubbs, oculist, after a brief operation, Saturday morning and was cremated yesterday. It was learned today that death is said to have been due either to a small blood clot on the brain or an air bubble in a blood vessel. It occurred following an operation for removal of the tonsils.

Mrs. Maude Gill, widowed mother of the patient, was present during the operation and was a helpless witness of his death.

Marshall was 18. As a student of architecture at the University of Washington he was considered at the head of his class. He recently won several prizes in architectural designing. Some of his work won meritorious recognition at the Beaux arts exhibit in Paris.

A. H. RUGG, AGED 89, DEAD
Civil War Veteran and Umatilla Resident Since 1885 Passes.

PENDLETON, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—A. H. Rugg, 89, resident of Umatilla county since 1885 and a veteran of the civil war, died at his home here yesterday after a brief illness.

He was born in Massachusetts August, 1831, and moved to Wisconsin when he was 21 years of age.

Together with his family, he came to Oregon in 1852, first settling in Douglas county. Three years later the family came to Umatilla county by ox team and made their home at Pilot Rock.

Mr. Rugg and his wife have been residents of Pendleton for 28 years. They recently celebrated their 61st wedding anniversary here, when all members of the family were together for the first time in many years.

His widow, he is survived by six children and a number of grandchildren.

Vancouver Bond Election Today.
VANCOUVER, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—A special election to vote a proposal to issue \$90,000 school bonds will be held here tomorrow, the polls remaining open from 8 o'clock in the morning until 5 P. M.

These are not additional bonds, but were voted once before, but through a technical error the election must be held again.

Beach Resorts Scrutinized.
SALEM, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Operatives of the state fire marshal's office left here today for the various summer resorts of the state, where they will make a careful survey of all structures used in housing visitors. These investigations will extend to practically all sections of Oregon. They were ordered by A. S. Barber, state fire marshal. Reports reaching the state fire marshal's office indicated that a number of beach resort hotels were not equipped with fire escapes and other protective devices required.

11 DEATHS MYSTERY YET
FRAGMENTS OF BODIES ARE
BURIED IN ONE COFFIN.

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OREGON IS CHEATED IN QUOTA OF JOBS

State, Entitled to 224, Has
166 Employees at Capital.

DISMISSAL IS PROTESTED

Congressional Delegates Delve Into
Records After Hearing Appeals
of Northwest Women.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., June 27.—Heads of government departments in letting out surplus employees hereafter will have before them the cold facts showing that federal employees claiming residences in the Pacific coast and northwest states should not be molested.

As the result of appeals of many northwest women and girls who had received notices of dismissal the congressional delegations from the Pacific coast have been delving into the records, which show that Oregon has only 166 on the government payroll and is entitled to 224; Washington has only 227 and is entitled to 562; Idaho has 96 and its quota is 173; Montana has 131 as against a quota of 227, while California has but 592 of a quota of 1420. The District of Columbia is entitled to 181 and has 1183, and surrounding states are equally fortunate.

The West Coast Lumbermen's association, through its manager, Robert B. Allen of Seattle, has taken up the cudgel for a tariff on lumber, charging that the present fight against the tariff is being carried on by a Canadian lumber lobby.

The revised reclamation bill appropriating \$250,000 for irrigation in the west was introduced in the senate today. The only changes were such as advisers to the senate irrigation committee found necessary to prevent the proposed legislation from interfering with the present homestead laws. The favorable report on the bill, authorized by the committee several days ago and will be filed by Senator McNary tomorrow.

The meridian between Pacific coast and Rocky mountain time will be established at Huntington, Or., if a bill adopted by the senate today is enacted by the house. The bill was introduced by Senator Gooding as the result of widespread protests against the present zone plan, which includes the most of south Idaho in Pacific coast time.

WOMAN HEADS BAPTISTS
NORTHERN CONVENTION ELEC-
TION SETS PRECEDENT.

Rev. W. B. Hinson of Portland Is
Chosen First Vice-President
of Mission Society.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 27.—With the election of Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery of Rochester, N. Y., as president of the northern Baptist convention today, a precedent was set among the larger denominations of the United States.

Features of the day's business included a report by Baptist delegates to the federal council of churches of Christ in America, outlining cooperative methods in many cases of church work and prevention of duplication of service.

"We must guard against the superficial," the report said. "The council should not undertake administrative functions save where it has been charged to do so by much more than a majority vote of the denominations represented."

It was voted to allot \$35,000 as the Baptist share of the expenses of the council.

Goals set by northern Baptists five years ago have been far exceeded, despite the war, Shailer Mathews of Chicago, reported.

The American Baptist Home Mission society elected Charles R. Brock of Denver vice president for the coming year. Others elected included the Rev. W. B. Hinson of Portland, Or., first vice president.

Mrs. G. W. Coleman of Boston was elected president of the Women's Baptist Missionary society; Miss Ruth Shipley of Wyoming, O. third vice president; Mrs. H. W. Foster of Seattle, Wash., fourth vice president.
