BANK CARRIER TOURS CALIFORNIA.—Maynard Redmond, cashier of the State bank of Portland, has just returned from a vacation trip driving to San Francisco over the Pacific highway. He came back via the Coast route and reports the roads still muddy, rough and almost impassable in many places. Mr. Redmond reports that a large number of California machines are seen in Oregon, but very few Oregon machines are going to California at this late season. California is considered far ahead of Oregon, however, in the matter of road signs. With a map a tourist can travel practically anywhere in California and always know where he is going because practically all roads are indicated by official signs. Outside of the main highway in Oregon very few signs appear. Crop conditions are backward all along the way owing to the late season, he said. While in San Francisco Mr. Redmond attended the convention of the National Association of Credit Men.

BOY ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.—Experimenting with his father's Remington-Union 16 years old, 392 J. Jessup street, in Good Samaritan hospital yesterday in critical condition with a bullet wound through the abdomen. The boy, who is a dresser, says the lad will recover. While his father was away Sunday morning the boy entered his room and took a 38-caliber revolver from a dresser drawer together with a number of cartridges. In his own bedroom he loaded the weapon and had just closed the door when it accidentally exploded, the bullet entering below the left breast, passing close to the lung and lodging close to the spine.

STEAM-COOKED MEN ASK \$65,673.—Damages aggregating \$65,673 are demanded from the Peninsula Lumber company in two suits filed in the circuit court yesterday by workmen who were virtually cooked with live steam while employed in riveting a boiler on May 14, 1920. The men ask \$54,150 for the injuries received and P. E. Hicks seeks \$11,523. The men assert they will never recover entirely from the effects of the accident. They declare that while they were working in the boiler other employees connected a steam pipe, thinking the boiler was empty. The pipe was heated to 320 degrees Fahrenheit about the men.

HUSBAND WHIPS YOUTH, POLICE FIND.—While going home from a party late Saturday night, according to a story told Detectives Horack and McCulloch by Victor Ward, 19 years old, of 4121 Ninth avenue southeast, he was accosted by two men who attacked him, beat him severely and stole one dollar. The detectives on investigating found the story to be partly true, but that Ward was walking home with a married woman when her husband met them. The beating consisted of one wallop to the jaw which made Ward look as though he had been beaten up. It is presumed that the dollar was knocked loose by the blow.

PENINSULA LEAGUE ELECTIONS.—J. H. Fairbrook, was elected president of the Peninsula civic improvement league, at a recent meeting. H. West is vice-president, Mrs. E. Corbett, secretary, and Louis Carlson, treasurer. The league is now considering the improvements for Columbia park and the block's bottom tract as a world's fair site. An open-air meeting of the league will be held in Columbia park sometime in July or August.

ACTO HITS STREET CAR CONDUCTOR.—C. LaPointe, 512 Montgomery street, a streetcar conductor, was struck by an automobile yesterday noon at the corner of Twenty-first and Washington streets. The machine drove away before witnesses could get the license number. LaPointe was taken to St. Vincent's hospital and treated for bruises on the right arm and a severe cut over the left eye.

ATTEMPTED KIDNAPING REPORTED.

A second unsolved case of what is supposed to be attempted kidnaping was reported to the police yesterday by Lucille Vanderburg, 172 West Webster street, an operator at the Woodview telephone exchange. Miss Vanderburg told the police that about 1 o'clock Sunday morning a man who appeared to be about 22 years of age, with dark hair, wearing a suit and tie, came to her door. When she answered it the man seized her and attempted to drag her from the porch. The girl struggled desperately, she said, until the man cornered her and began to throw porch furniture at her. She finally managed to reach the door and escaped. The police believe that this is the same man who entered the home of Vivian Howe at 205 Tenth street about the same time and tried to drag her from her bed.

SHOULDER BROKEN IN BOUT.—Dr. Earl Smith, county coroner, is carrying his right arm in a sling as a result of a breaking his shoulder in a boxing bout with Denver Ed Martin at the Olympic club. Martin is a 250-pound negro boxer who at one time was a contender for the heavyweight title. He and Dr. Smith met several times before in the ring without serious mishap. Dr. Smith apparently was all right except for bruises when the club after the eighth round, but severe pains in his shoulder caused him to have an X-ray taken of his shoulder and it developed that the bone had been fractured and the ligaments severely torn. The injury will keep Dr. Smith out of the ring for six weeks or two months.

CLAIM FOR WAGES IS LOST.—The case of C. A. Green, former janitor for the school department, who sued school district No. 1 for \$238.85, which he alleged was due for overtime work, was thrown out of the Jefferson county circuit court yesterday by Circuit Judge Duffy of Prineville, who found that the complaint alleged insufficient facts to form a basis for the action. Permission to amend after the case had begun was denied. Failure of Green to allege presentation of his claim to the school board and the refusal of that body was the technical ground for the nonsuit.

DR. MACKIE TO BE BURIED.—Funeral service for Dr. G. A. Mackie, who died at his home at 196 Penney street, in this city Sunday, will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Miller & Tracey chapel, 178 Ella street, off Washington. Dr. Mackie was a specialist in cancer diseases and had a large practice in the city, coming here four years ago from Canada. Death resulted from paralysis. The deceased was 59 years old. Interment will be in the River-view cemetery.

SAILORS TO APPEAR IN COURT.—The seven sailors who participated in a riot at Lincoln last Tuesday night, which resulted in the fatal shooting of Nostor Varrio, will be brought before Federal Judge Wolverton at 10 o'clock today on a charge of contempt. The government will be represented by Assistant United States Attorney Lusk and the sailors' union of the Pacific coast will be represented by W. S. U'ren.

UTAH GUARDSMEN RETURN HOME.—With the Utah national guard officers, men, horses and other equipment aboard, a special train of 21 cars, carrying the troops back to Salt Lake city after training at Camp Lewis, passed through Portland early this morning. The train was scheduled to arrive from Camp Lewis over the Northern Pacific at 1 A. M. and leave over the O. W. R. & N. road at 1:20 o'clock.

DR. SCHURMAN INVITED HERE.—Dr. Jacob Gould Schurman, newly appointed minister, for to China, has been invited to visit Portland en route to his post at Pekin. W. D. B. Dodson, executive manager of the Chamber of Commerce, sent Dr. Schurman an invitation on the part of the city and the state as a whole. No reply as yet has been received from Dr. Schurman.

ROPING STREETS COSTS \$17.—The city expended \$17 in roping streets along the line of march of the Rose Festival parade, according to a report filed by Chief of Police Jenkins with the city auditor yesterday. The amount comes from a special appropriation of \$25, which was set aside for the purpose. The \$178 remaining can be used for a similar purpose.

FAMILY AT CHURCH; HOME ROBBERED.—Another burglary was added to the series which have occurred recently in the vicinity of Hillside when Henry Worth, route No. 1, reported to the police that his home had been robbed. Worth and his family had gone to church and during their absence the house was entered, silver worth \$20 and \$30 in currency stolen.
