

MRS. KABER FACES TRIAL FOR MURDER

Wife of Slain Publisher First of Six Indicted.

HUGE CROWD JAMS COURT

Woman Accused of Plotting Death of Spouse Unconcerned as Attorneys Start Action.

CLEVELAND, O., June 28.—Mrs. Eva Catherine Kaber, charged with having plotted the assassination of her husband, Daniel F. Kaber, wealthy Lakewood (O.) publisher, was formally placed on trial this morning. She is under indictment for first-degree murder, which carries the death penalty. Mrs. Kaber appeared unconcerned as she entered the crowded courtroom and seemed disinterested in the trial.

The corridors of the courthouse were filled and the crowd in front of the building had increased to more than a thousand persons before Mrs. Kaber appeared. Attorneys for the prosecution vigorously protested against the prospect of women being placed on the jury, and immediately submitted a motion to annul a special panel of 42 laymen because five women were included. Judge Bernon promptly overruled the motion on the ground that the state constitution did not bar women jurors.

Jury Delay Predicted. Doubt was expressed whether a jury would be selected before the end of the week.

When the trial opened attorneys for Mrs. Kaber were prepared to ask for a continuance. Failing in this, it was indicated, a plea of temporary insanity would be entered, which the state announced would be vigorously opposed.

Mrs. Kaber is the first of six persons under indictment for Kaber's murder to be tried. The others are Mrs. Mary Brickell, her mother; Marian McArde, Mrs. Kaber's daughter, and three former servants. Kaber, an invalid, was stabbed 21 times while asleep in his Lakewood home July 18, 1919.

Statement Causes Arrest. At the coroner's inquest Mrs. Kaber was practically accused of the crime, but for want of evidence was dismissed. Through efforts of Moses Kaber, father of the dead man, the quest for a solution was continued.

Four weeks ago Mrs. Kaber broke down and issued a statement implicating Mrs. Kaber. The arrest of the latter and Miss McArdie in New York followed.

Salvatore Cala, also indicted for complicity in the murder and now held here, confessed following his arrest that he and Victoria Pisselli had been engaged by Mrs. Kaber to "do away with the old man." They were to have been paid \$500 each, but never have received the money, Cala said. Pisselli has been indicted, but is still at large. Cala admitted in his confession, according to the police, that he held Kaber while Pisselli did the stabbing.

Mrs. Cora K. Burg, upon preliminary examination, was accepted as a juror by both state and defense.

3-CENT FARE IS FOUGHT

PROPOSAL CONDEMNED BY SEATTLE BUSINESS MEN.

Radicals and Non-Taxpayers Declared to Be Principals in Back of Movement.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 28.—(Special.)—Roused by the drive to fasten the cost of operating the municipal railway on the shoulders of already overburdened taxpayers, through the Erickson 3-cent car-fare initiative ordinance, business men of Seattle have launched a campaign of counter-education against what they term one of the worst perils Seattle has confronted.

Describing the 3-cent-fare scheme as a "wild dream" that would prove a boomerang to homeowners, it purports to benefit, and as a measure that would cripple Seattle commercially, the city's leaders have declared that unless the public is aroused quickly to the alleged menace the initiative will be carried at the spring election next year.

"The 3-cent fare is winning support from small homeowners, out-and-out radicals and persons who pay no taxes," said C. T. Conover, for 25 years a prominent business man of Seattle, active in movements for its welfare and advancement.

"The homeowners are sincere but misguided. The non-taxpayers would benefit most. The three classes form a campaign that will saddle the scheme on the taxpayers unless something is done, and the time to act is now."

Bankers and other leaders in the economic life of the city also condemned the proposal of Councilman Erickson to charge a fare barely sufficient to pay interest and redemption charges on the \$10,000,000 bond given Stone and Webster for the lines bought by the city two years ago, paying the cost of maintenance and operation out of taxation.

FISH TRAPS ARE ROBBED

Pirates Again Ply Their Trade in Waters of Alaska.

JUNEAU, Alaska, June 28.—Fish trap pirates again were plying their trade in Alaskan waters, according to reports to the United States marshal's office here.

Officials of the Thlinket Packing company reported one trap emptied some time last week and several thousand fish taken. The robbers cut haulage lines in order to expedite the robbery. Several other companies have reported similar thefts of fish.

MRS. JOHANNA MANN DEAD

Mother of City Commissioner Passes Out at Home.

Mrs. Johanna Mann, 73 years old, resident of Portland since 1881, died early yesterday morning at the family residence, 1261 Milwaukie avenue, following a prolonged illness. Mrs. Mann was the mother of John M. Mann, city commissioner, and wife of the late Maurice J. Mann, prominent Portland business man.

Mrs. Mann was born in County Tipperary, Ireland, January 27, 1848.

and came to America at the age of 12. She was married to Maurice J. Mann at Corning, N. Y., immediately after his discharge from the Union army at the close of the civil war. They returned to Ireland after some years' residence in Corning and then sailed to Australia. They returned to the United States by way of San Francisco. In 1881 they came to Portland to make their home.

Mrs. Mann is survived by two sons, John M. and Joseph T. Mann, and four daughters, Mrs. D. J. McGill, Mrs. George Sullivan, Mrs. Henry W. Brands and Margaret Mann. All are residents of Portland.

John R. Boyd.

John R. Boyd, pioneer of Lane county, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Sarah L. Perkins, at Goble, June 19, while he was visiting them following the pioneer and Indian war veteran meetings which he attended in Portland last week. He was buried at Eugene, on June 22, members of the Grand Army of the Republic and Indian War Veterans acting as pallbearers for the funeral. Mr. Boyd was born in Missouri, May 20, 1838, crossing the plains by ox team and settling in Lane county near Eugene, in 1852. He married Margaret Schultz and nine children were born, five of whom are still living. These are Mrs. Sarah Perkins, wife of the late Mr. Boyd; Mrs. Mary Smith of Canby; Mrs. Minnie Smith of Eugene; Mrs. Myrtle Dean of Warrenton and George Boyd of Walton. A brother, George Boyd of Albany, also survives him.

Mr. Boyd was a veteran of the Rogue river Indian campaigns and also a member of the Oregon Pioneer society.

George Freeman Sharp.

George Freeman Sharp of Wheeler county died June 17 of heart disease near Mitchell, Or. He was born on December 18, 1873, in Manhattan, Kan. When he was 11 months old his family came to Portland via San Francisco. They settled on a government claim near Damascus, Or., and lived there until George was 18. They then moved to Palouse county, Washington. In 1894 he went to Wheeler county, Oregon, to work with George McKay. With the exception of one year he had lived there ever since.

In 1909 he married Grace Kemp at Santa Barbara, Cal. He is survived by his widow, eight children—Bernice, Gladys, Beulah, Malcolm, Donald, Ethel, Vaille, Wade, and Georgia; a brother, James C. Sharp of Heppner, and three sisters, Mrs. Louis Compton of Salem, Mrs. A. C. Keller of Astoria and Mrs. W. F. Withom of Everett, Wash.

William M. Miller.

William M. Miller, Portland insurance man with offices in the Gasco building, died Monday night while on a business trip to San Francisco, according to news received in Portland yesterday. Mr. Miller, who was 42 years of age, was for a number of years in the employ of the O. W. R. & N. company. He had been in the insurance business for the past 15 years. He was a member of the First Insurance exchange. Mr. Miller was also a member of the Portland Golf club. He lived at 759 Everett street. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Alice Miller, who is a sister of Louis J. Wilde, San Diego capitalist and proprietor of the U. S. C. ant hotel in that city.

It is planned to bring the body to Portland for interment.

Conrad B. Yaeckel.

THE DALLES, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—Conrad B. Yaeckel, 78-year-old resident of Klickitat county and one of the most extensive land owners in the county, died this morning at the local hospital following an extended illness. Yaeckel was born in Canada, coming to the Dalles in 1877. The same year he moved to Klickitat county, taking up a homestead near Centerville, where he lived until shortly before his death. He is survived by eight children, Mrs. Emma Crocker and Mrs. Nellie Nesher of Goldendale, Mrs. Lizzie Marquies and Mrs. Mabel Allen of Centerville, Henry Yaeckel of the Dalles, and Charles, Fred and Joe Yaeckel of Centerville. Funeral services will be held Friday from the family home near Centerville.

D. F. Osborn.

THE DALLES, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—Stricken with a stroke of apoplexy as he was sitting with his attorney as defendant in a civil suit in the circuit court, D. F. Osborn, 26 years old, Tygh valley rancher, this morning died before medical assistance could arrive. Osborn had just completed answering several questions put to him by his attorney, E. B. Dufur. The suit was over the ownership of two horses and a farm wagon valued at \$150. Mr. Osborn is survived by his widow, who is branch librarian and postmaster at Tygh Valley, and four children.

J. E. Schrimsher.

PENDELTON, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—Heart disease caused the death of J. E. Schrimsher, 44, well-known farmer of Umatilla county, who dropped dead at his home here this morning shortly after returning from a business trip downtown. Mr. Schrimsher, a native of Nebraska, came to Umatilla county at the age of 18, and engaged in farming near Weston, later moving to Pendleton. Besides his widow he is survived by two daughters, a son, grandson and eight brothers and sisters.

CONFERENCE TAKES UP JAPAN ALLIANCE

Curzon Presents Issue at Imperial Session.

BALFOUR URGES CHANGE

Need of Bringing Pact Into Line With League Requirements Is Emphasized.

LONDON, June 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—The subject of the Anglo-Japanese alliance was taken up today at the imperial conference by Lord Curzon, secretary for foreign affairs.

A. J. Balfour, representative of the league of nations, laid stress upon the necessity of bringing the alliance into line with the league requirements rather than insisting upon any special British interest or emphasizing its imperial aspect. Mr. Balfour is also chairman of the defense committee. It was understood that when the conference reassembles tomorrow, the Canadian premier, Arthur Meighen, would begin the debate with a statement on the dominions' attitude.

Immigration Is Discussed.

The premiers assembled this afternoon to discuss the question of immigration within the empire, the idea being to keep desirable British emigrants within the empire territory.

PEKING, June 21.—Dr. C. T. Wang,

one of China's delegates to the peace conference, commenting on the proposed renewal of the Anglo-Japanese alliance, said to the Associated Press that "talk of making the alliance acceptable to Britain, America, Japan and Australia, with no mention of China, sounds as though the alliance was regarded as of no interest to China."

War Declared Inevitable.

"If Mr. Hughes (the Australian premier) and others are purposely leaving China out of consideration, the only possible deduction is that they are interested only in fighting with and that they do not consider China such."

"In other words, instead of the alliance promoting peace, it is based on a consideration of war, and it tends to produce trouble. The procedure suggests that it is not the justice and right of a nation's cause and its policies, but rather its fighting strength that gains consideration."

TOKIO, June 28.—(By the Associated Press.)—The naval estimates for the fiscal year anticipate the expenditure of five hundred million yen and amount to the largest in the year. There is to be no change in the basic policy of completing the government's eight battleships and eight cruisers programme.

HOLIDAY PLANS COMPLETE

Track Contests to Feature Programme of Playgrounds.

Fourth of July festivities have been arranged for Forestry playground which will occupy the entire afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock. The programme of events will include track and field events—dashes, broad jump and other contests—and greased pole climbing, three-legged races, freak events and a group of tumbling stunts by three brothers—Bert, Lawrence and Ed Frye. The brothers are members of the playground group and are experts in gymnastic performances. Ruth Susman and George Wolfe, directors for the bureau of parks, are in charge of the celebration.

WHEAT CROP GIGANTIC

Washington Counties Report Above Average Growth of Grain.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 28.—(Special.)—"This year's crop of winter wheat promises to be the best ever had in the northwest," said F. H. McKay, farm expert of the Union Trust

company, today. "Spring wheat looks like it will be much above the average, but it is too early to be absolutely sure."

"Farmers are feeling optimistic and they have not much wheat left over from last year."

"In western Whitman county there is an exceptionally large acreage of winter wheat. In the districts beyond Lewiston the grain is remarkably fine appearing. The general soaking which that country received last week far more than offset the damage by hail."

"In the Big Bend, in the main, the grain is all right. There is not much winter wheat in that district, but the spring wheat is earlier than in other sections. In that district the grain is grading up well."

Chinese Honor Workers

Baptist Missionary Entertained at Banquet by Oriental Friends.

A banquet at which more than 100 Chinese women and an equal number of American women were present was tendered Mary E. Berkley, of the Baptist Women's Home Mission society, by the Chinese women among whom she has been working during the past 15 years in Portland, at the Kum Shun Low, 624 Second street, last night. The banquet was in the form of a surprise for Miss Berkley and was arranged entirely by her Chinese friends.

Following the banquet, in which the menu was entirely of Chinese food, a programme consisting of musical numbers and a few short speeches were given. Miss Berkley will retire from active missionary work here and will make her home in Portland, however. Her place among the Chinese women and children has been filled by Miss Velda Waters, who will continue the work which Miss Berkley began.
