

OLYMPIA IS CENTER FOR AUTO BUS WAR

Cases of Rival Stage Lines Will Be Heard Today.

MANY PROTESTS FILED

Permission to Take On Passengers at Camp Lewis Among Points in Controversy.

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 29.—(Special.)—The first of many important hearings before the department of public works, recently created by the administrative code, will be heard by the auto transportation department tomorrow when protests against the issuance of certificates of necessity to the Thompson-Smith company of Olympia, one of the largest stage operating companies on the Pacific coast, will be heard by the Gray's Harbor stage company, and operated between Olympia and Tacoma.

The United Auto Transportation company is protesting against the hauling of passengers between Olympia and intermediate points, namely from Camp Lewis to Tacoma, over which the United Auto Transportation company operates. Protests have been filed by the same company against five other companies that are operating from Aberdeen to Tacoma, asking that they be not granted permission to take on passengers at the military camp in Pierce county.

The four lines that run from Aberdeen to Tacoma, operated by Messrs. Fisher, Stone, Herbert and Mitchell, themselves become the protesters against the Gray's Harbor stage company, which is a subsidiary of the Thompson-Smith company, and operates between Olympia and Aberdeen. They insist that sufficient service is being given by their cars and that there is no necessity for the Gray's Harbor stage company operating there.

The Gray's harbor company asserts that adequate service is not given by the other four lines. J. C. Wood has filed a protest against companies operating to Aberdeen taking on passengers at McCleary, a half-way point between Olympia and Aberdeen, between which cities he is now operating a stage.

Because of the wide scale of the operations this case is being watched closely by the stage owners of the state, as it will be somewhat in the nature of a test case and will have considerable bearing on the cases to be heard in the future.

More than 100 stage owners are expected in the city to listen to the arguments.

RUNAWAY CAUSES DEATH

Ranch Worker Killed in Jump From Blinding Machine.

PENDLETON, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—Injuries received by Gordon Bates, 24, a worker on the Charles Serrell ranch near Pendleton, in jumping from a blinding machine, Monday morning, proved fatal. He died a few hours later in a hospital here. Bates, who was operating the blinding machine, became frightened when the horses started to run away. Despite a warning from a fellow worker he jumped from the blinding machine and became caught in the machinery. One leg was practically severed from his body and his arms were badly mangled.

He has been a resident of Umatilla county for about six months, coming from Canada, where he has relatives.

BOY UNDER STATE CARE

Youth Said to Have Troubled Family, Sent to Industrial School.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—H. L. Hasbrouck, county judge, has committed to the boys' industrial school at Salem James Hanley, aged 16, who is alleged to have given his family and officers continued trouble and who was declared incorrigible. Judge Hasbrouck recommended Robert Brock, aged 17, who was committed to the institution last winter, but released on parole contingent on his joining the army or navy. The young man left here and it was reported that he was in service. He returned recently. The young man was charged last winter by Portland merchants with passing spurious checks.

WEED BURNER ARRESTED

Charge of Insanity Is Lodged Against Eugene Prisoner.

EUGENE, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—Oscar Hansen, a transient, was arrested near here this afternoon charged with setting numerous fires on the right-of-way of the main line of the Southern Pacific railway. With a blow torch in one hand and a suit case in the other, Hansen had been walking along the track from the north for the last two days, setting fire to the dry grass and weeds. A charge of insanity has been lodged against him.

MINING SHOWS REVIVAL

Smelter at Sumpter Is Being Repaired for Coming Boom.

MEDICAL PROBLEMS WILL BE DISCUSSED

Prominent Experts Gather for Tri-State Sessions.

TOPICS ARE IMPORTANT

Leading Physicians and Surgeons From East Will Help Make Convention Big Success.

What is regarded as the most important program arranged since 1905, will begin this morning with the opening of the tri-state medical convention in the Multnomah hotel. Leading physicians and surgeons from all parts of the United States are here to aid the organization in making the sessions a success.

Among the national leaders in their profession who will address the delegates are Dr. Frederick Green of Chicago, representing the American Medical association; Dr. Dean Lewis of Rush Medical college, Chicago; Judge Harold M. Stephens of Salt Lake city, who represents the American College of Surgeons; Dr. W. F. Brausch of Rochester, Minn., representing the Mayo clinic; and Dr. Vilely P. Blair of St. Louis university, St. Louis, Mo.

Prominent Experts to Speak.
The first session of the convention will open at 10 o'clock with an address by Dr. Joseph A. Pettit, president of the Oregon State Medical association. Other numbers on the program will be: "Making the Public Our Allies," by Dr. Green of Chicago; "Hospital Betterment on the Pacific Coast," by Dr. W. E. Musgrave of San Francisco; a discussion of hospital standardization, under Judge Stephens, and an announcement of plans and purposes by Dr. E. F. Tucker of Portland.

A luncheon will be given at noon under the auspices of the league for the conservation of public health, and the principal speaker will be Celestine J. Sullivan of San Francisco.

Reception Will Be Held.

Tonight the delegates and guests will gather at an informal reception in the home of Dr. Pettit, 74 East Taylor street. During the two days of the convention a division will be made in the afternoon and programs will be given by both the medical and surgical sections of the association. The annual dinner will be given tomorrow night in Waverley Country club.

CHAMBER AGAINST SHOWS

Baker Business Men Want Carnivals Barred From City.

BAKER, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—Following the presentation of a petition signed by most of Baker's business men, the chamber of commerce asked the city attorney to draw up an ordinance prohibiting carnivals and similar shows in Baker. The action was taken following the amount of disapproval of the type of carnival that showed in this city recently.

The chamber also pledged its support in landing the 1922 state convention of the American Legion for this city at the luncheon held yesterday, at which a good attendance was reported. Plans were also discussed for the entertainment of the tourists who will arrive on the home-seekers' train due to leave Omaha July 19 and who will be in Baker a day. It was decided that an opportunity would be arranged for the visitors to view the proposed Thiel valley irrigation project as one of the trips outside of the city.

CITIZENS ASKED TO WORK

Call Sent for Volunteers for Slashing on Lost Lake Highway.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—Jake Lenz, who soon after July 4 will begin with a crew to open the last mile and a half of a new road to Lost Lake, the forest service financing the highway, has invited residents of the city and valley to join him on July 3 and 4 in constructing 40 rods of new grade, for connecting a point on the new road with an old wagon road constructed to the lake more than 15 years ago. If enough citizens will volunteer their labor for slashing and excavating, Mr. Lenz says it will be possible to open a road that will carry automobiles to a place overlooking the lake. The forest road will not be completed before fall.

Mr. Lenz announced discovery of a large dike of decomposed granite on the route of the new forest highway. This, he says, will make excellent surfacing material.

ROUNDUP RIDER INJURED

Accidents Mar Riding Contests on Eastern Oregon Ranch.

BAKER, Or., June 29.—(Special.)—Two accidents marred the success of the riding contests at the Charles Ebell ranch, on Sutton creek, yesterday. The horse from which George Eubank was thrown stepped on him causing severe injuries. It was reported that Eubank is in a serious condition. He was brought to Baker and is at the home of his uncle, Frank Speelman, in Seventh street. One horse broke its leg and it was necessary to shoot the animal. A large crowd attended the roundup, many from Baker being present. First prize was given to Tuck Lawrence of Unity and second place was awarded to Cecil Ebell of this city.

ARSON CASE HELD WEAK

Chauffeur Cannot Be Convicted Solely on Mrs. Corbin's Story.

SPOKANE, June 29.—Louis E. Lilge cannot be convicted of first degree arson in the United States court burning of the D. C. Corbin home here in April solely on the testimony of Mrs. Corbin, Judge Hugo Oswald told the jury in his instruction yesterday following completion of testimony by the defense. Lilge flatly denied setting the residence on fire under direct examination.

Mrs. Corbin was recalled to the stand and denied testimony of Lilge that she had tried to embrace him or had told him that she loved him.

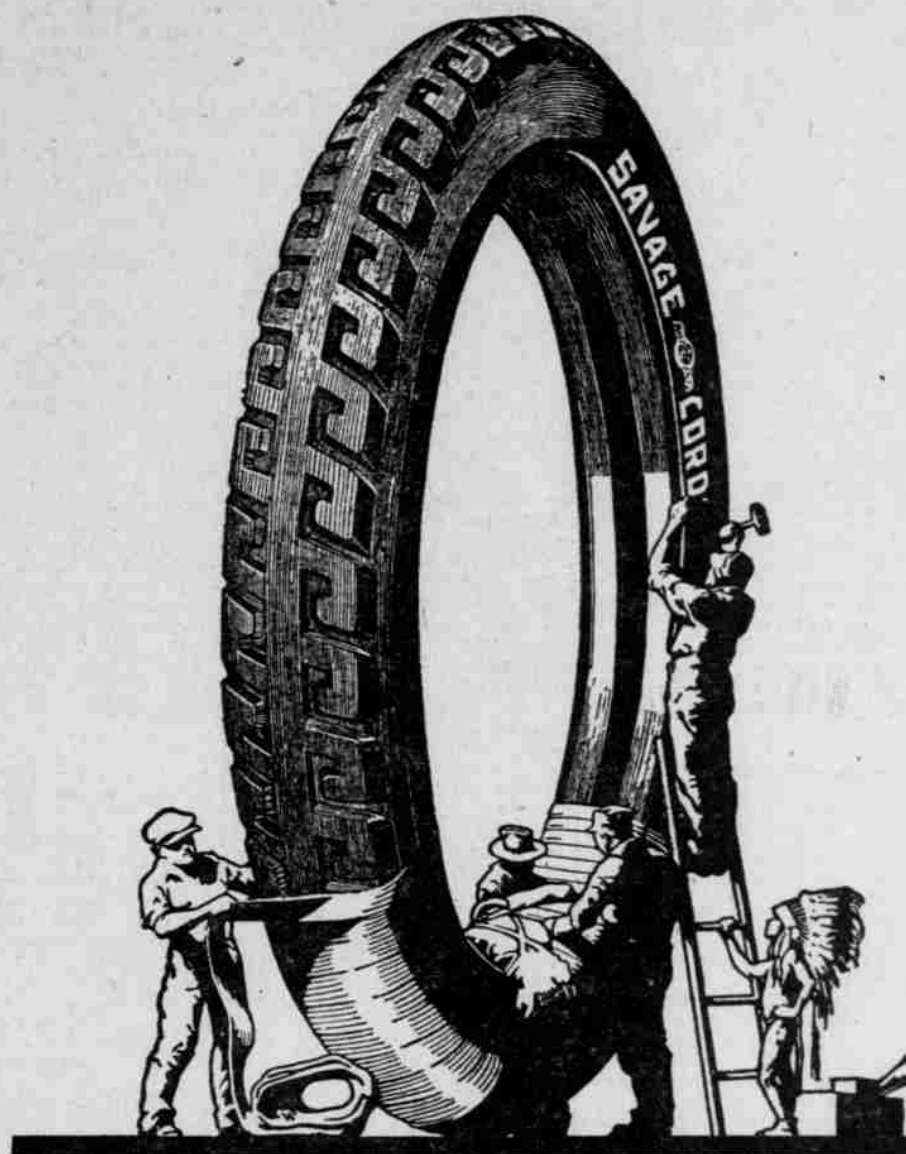
