FOOTLOCK WANTS ACCOUNTING.
 Some idea of the value of a shoe shining establishment in a busy part of the city may be obtained from the assertion of Nick D. Koronis, a suit filed against his partner, Dan Linos. In the circuit court yesterday, that an offer of \$1500 for his half interest in a stand at 383 Washington street in "an absurd figure." Koronis asks for a dissolution of the partnership and an accounting. He says that Linos has not allowed him to check up receipts, has tried to "freeze" him out, is insolent and sulky and "refuses to greet him with 'good morning' when he arrives at work in the morning."

HOUSING ESTATE \$25,000.—The late Walter Jervia Holman left an estate valued at \$25,000, according to the petition for probate of will filed in the circuit court yesterday. The will, drawn July 1, 1917, Love and affection were bequeathed to his sons only in the expressed knowledge that proper provision for them would be made later by his widow. The sons are: Walter Edward, 19; Herbert M., 16; Howard B., 14, and Kenneth W., 12. Mr. Holman died June 23 at the age of 46 years.

CLOCK WRECKED BY TRUCK.—The large four-faced clock with cast iron pedestal which stood in front of the Crescent Jewelry store, Washington street, was broken off and thrown into the street yesterday morning when it was struck by a Swift & Co. truck, driven by Crane. The truck was backing up to a stop in front of the jewelry store intending to get some lunch at a nearby restaurant. The rear of the truck skidded into the clock. A piece of the clock was thrown through the plate glass window of the Stalger shoe store as a result of the accident.

STAGES REQUIRED TO GET TERMINALS

Ordinance Regulating Inter-urban Buses Adopted.

STREETS TO BE CLEARED

Month's Time Given Operators to Establish Business Places; Park-ing Plans Up Tomorrow.

All interurban stages operating out of Portland must establish terminal facilities in the city within a period of 30 days, according to the terms of an ordinance adopted yesterday by the city council. The ordinance was a direct outgrowth of the attempt to remedy the parking situation by regulating stages, for-hire cars and taxicabs which have been accustomed to make use of the city streets for stands and terminal points.

The special traffic committee appointed by Mayor Baker will now turn its attention to the for-hire car and taxicab men and it is probable that they will also be required to furnish a central station. It is expected that they will be entirely off the streets as far as stands are concerned, by fall.

Council to Approve Sites.
 The ordinance providing for stage terminals requires the operators to obtain the approval of the city council for the site. It also establishes a zone within which no terminal can be located. In addition to requiring all lines now operating to establish terminals in 30 days the ordinance provides that any person entering the stage business after this date must comply with the ordinance before he begins to serve the public.

The special traffic committee under Commissioner Barbur has approved a terminal site proposed by a Stage Owners' Co-operative association at Ninth and Burnside streets. It is probable that this station will be designed to accommodate all lines operating out of the city for the present. The zone established by the ordinance provides that no terminal may be located within the area bounded by a line drawn from the Willamette river west on Pine street to Sixth street, north on Sixth street to Burnside, west on Burnside to Eleventh street, south on Eleventh street to Yamhill street and east on Yamhill to the river. It provides that no terminal may be established on Broadway, between Madison street and the bridge. The proposed terminal location is just outside the zone.

Parking Up Tomorrow.
 The parking ordinance, drafted by the special traffic committee appointed by the mayor, will come before the council tomorrow, but will not come up for a public hearing until July 8. At that time Mayor Baker and the council will go over details and take into consideration any protest against it.

Little opposition has been encountered. The ordinance has been approved by members of the city planning commission and other bodies interested in traffic problems. A protest was received last week from some of the doctors of the city point.

CHICKEN THIEF FINED.—Charles Toole, bootmaker living in the St. Johns district, was fined \$25 yesterday by Municipal Judge Rossmann on a charge of stealing chickens from a store. Edward Carey, boy caretaker, three of the dead chickens which were found in Toole's possession were exhibited in court. Toole was traced to his home by a trail of blood and feathers.

MUSIC CONSERVATORY CLOSED.—The American conservatory of music will remain closed today. It was announced yesterday, because of the death of Professor W. R. Beatty's mother, at Woodburn, Or.

WILL CONTEST CLOSSES.
CASE OF HENDRICKSEN HEIRS IS UNDER ADJUDICATION.
 Attorney Testifies Tent Manu-facturer Changed Will Because of Partner's Objections.

Circuit Judge Tazewell yesterday took under advisement the will contest through which the heirs of the late Thomas E. Hendricksen, half owner of the Pacific Tent & Awning company, seek to set aside his testa-ment on the ground that he was in-fuenced unduly in the settlement of his \$112,000 estate by his partner, David Dahm.

Three wills were made by the late Mr. Hendricksen, the first in Sep-tember, 1919, leaving \$107,000 to his relatives, a sister, Mrs. Nettie Jacob-son, and her children, and \$2500 each to two faithful employees. On April 21, 1920, he changed his will leaving his partner, Mr. Dahm, a fourth in-terest in his share of the tent busi-ness, valued at \$12,000.

On April 22, 1920, Mr. Hendricksen went to the office of Attorney Jerry E. Bronaugh and prepared another will, which was signed April 23. This third will gave to Mr. Dahm property worth \$65,000 and about \$47,000 to the relatives. Eugene Oscar Hendricksen, the nephew filing for contest, asserts that Mr. Hendricksen signed the second and third wills under duress at the instigation of Mr. Dahm, and against his own wishes.

The second will was signed in the office of Emil Slovapr, attorney, who testified in the hearing before Judge Tazewell that Hendricksen had told him he was changing his first will because "Dave was raising hell about it." Mr. Hendricksen died of cancer May 4, 11 days after signing the last will.

The contestants are represented by Attorneys Arthur H. McCurtain and William G. Hare, the estate by Bart C. Bronaugh and Jerry E. Bronaugh.
