AUDITORIUM CLAIMS UP

SUPREME COURT WILL HEAR MANDAMUS SUIT JULY 7.

Effort to Be Made to Force City Auditor to Pay \$36,702.84 to Builder's Bondsmen.

City Attorney Grant and Deputy City Attorney Latourette will appear before the Oregon supreme court July 7 to argue a mandamus suit brought by bondsmen of Hans Pederson, contractor to force City Auditor Funk to pay \$36,702.84, recognized by the council as a moral obligation to the builder of the auditorium. The decision by the court will mean the settlement of a matter which has hung over the city since the completion of the auditorium in war times. Many complications arose after the awarding of the contract to Pederson in 1918 for \$217,400. It was first contended that Pederson had made an error in his bid and the city allowed an increase of \$15,000 to cover this. Pederson later claimed that delay in obtaining brick caused an additional loss. According to the claims submitted in behalf of Pederson, it was contended that he actually expended \$416,481.82 in carrying out the contract which called for only \$238,925. The resultant loss not only forced Pederson into bankruptcy but involved Portland bondsmen and creditors to the amount of thousands of dollars. Pederson's claims were checked by a committee appointed by Mayor

Baker, and the recommendation that he be made to the payments already made by the city was the result. The council met with bondsmen compromised by voting a moral obligation of \$36,702.84. It was understood at the time that the obligation was moral, and must be established in legal before payment would be made. City Auditor Funk refused to draw a warrant for the amount, and the present suit was brought by J. C. Bayer, trustee, on behalf of the bondsmen. It will come directly before the supreme court under a rule of law which gives the supreme court jurisdiction over the city. The ordinance obligating the city as morally obligated for the sum was passed March 23, 1921.

WHEAT CROP EXCELLENT

Harvest Soon to Get Under Way in Walla Walla District.
WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 30.—(Special).—Though the rainfall of the growing season is one-sixth normal, conditions of the wheat throughout the valley is excellent, according to ranchers. The reason is that the temperature has been under normal and the grain has thrived despite the drought. Harvesting will start Monday and crews are now being organized for work in the vicinity of Touchet and on Eureka Flat. Barley harvest already is under way. While wheat is being normally quoted at around 98 cents today, it is declared impossible to get this figure, the old wheat being lower. The price is nearer 95 cents. DOCTORS URGE PUBLICITY

MEDICAL ASSOCIATION FOLKS PLEAD FOR CO-OPERATION.

Closer Contact With Public Great Essential to Aid for Sick, Delegates Here Assert.

Several visitors attending the tri-state medical association convention at the Multnomah hotel were guests of the progressive business men's club at their weekly meeting in the Benson hotel yesterday. Dean Lewis, professor of surgery of the Rush Medical college of Chicago; Robert E. Farr, surgeon, of Minneapolis; and Frederick Green, Chicago physician, and secretary of the council of American Medical association, addressed the meeting and laid special stress upon the need for closer contact between the public and the medical profession. Dean Dillehunt, of the University of Oregon medical school, was also one of the speakers. He pointed out the work which the medical school does and made a plea for better hospital facilities in Portland, especially the need for a children's hospital. Dr. Green declared standardization of hospitals is now of utmost importance. Dr. Celestine J. Sullivan of San Francisco, executive secretary of the California league for the conservation of public health, who was to be one of the speakers at the luncheon, was unable to be present. T. Homer
