

AUTO CRASH VICTIMS DIES OF INJURIES

Rudolph Samuelson Fails to Regain Consciousness.

INFANT HAS EVEN CHANCE

Mrs. Roy Westley of St. Johns Said to Be Seriously Injured; Investigation Is Ordered.

SALEM, Or., July 3.—(Special).—Rudolph Samuelson, one of the victims of last night's automobile crash on the Pacific highway near Brooks, eight miles north of Salem, died in a local hospital this morning at 5 o'clock.

Mr. Samuelson was unconscious when brought to the hospital, but an identification card in a pocket indicated he was a resident of Portland and that he had been employed as a salesman for Mitchell, Lewis & Stover.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Samuelson, who reside at Canby, came to Salem today and took charge of the body. The young man was 22 years of age.

Baby in Serious Condition.

Physicians today declared E. G. Osborn, representative of the Hood company, with headquarters in Portland, would recover.

Examination of Mrs. Roy R. Westley of St. Johns, Portland, indicated that she was seriously hurt.

Mrs. Westley regained consciousness this afternoon and the attending physician said she probably would recover.

Information from the scene of the wreck today indicated that the car driven by Mr. Osborn was traveling between 60 and 70 miles an hour.

The roadster turned over on its side and skidded on the road. The wreck was down clear of the ramp.

Witnesses, turned over several times and halted against a guy wire holding a telephone pole at a dislocated crossroads.

Authorities said this morning that they intended to make a thorough investigation and that it was possible that Osborn, driver of the roadster, would be arrested on a charge of manslaughter.

Mr. Osborn arrived here tonight from Portland and went at once to the Salem hospital to be with her husband.
