LARGE CROWDS AT OAKS

Independence Day Attendance Estimated at 19,581 Persons.

Large crowds packed the Oaks amusement park yesterday to celebrate Independence day. At 5 o'clock last night the management said that 19,581 persons had passed the gates of the park.

As early as 7 A. M. people began to arrive. By noon the merry-makers had filled every picnic table and bench. Automobiles were so congested that many of the owners had to find parking space outside the grounds. So many cars packed inside were the cars in the afternoon that many who wished to leave were unable to do so on account of being flanked on every side by other machines. The trolley lines were taxed, as was the boat service from the city.

The big Oaks auditorium was packed to overflowing with an audience that came to see the new attraction, the Pathé Picture Palace. At afternoon and evening performances many were turned away for lack of greater seating capacity.

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SENATE SUSPECTS EUROPE IS TRICKY

Parade Is Interesting One.

There will be disputes for quite a time, probably, over the number that turned out to demand that Volstead's legislation be torn from the law books. Those who managed the parade declared, at the start, there would be more than 100,000 and brought down the figures at the march's end to 50,000.

The World's observer estimated about 15,000, based upon the fact that about 6000 persons an hour can comfortably pass any particular spot, and this march lasted just two hours. William H. Anderson, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league, hired a firm of accountants with "numerators"—tallying machines—and their "absolutely official" count was 14,922, which included everyone walking or riding, even the bandmen, who, the accountants said, numbered 322, and the police, who were 24 strong. The count was probably right.

No matter what its numbers or actual significance, however, it was an interesting parade and the spectators were well repaid for their attendance.

COUNCIL DOES LITTLE

ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY APPARENTLY PIGEONHOLED.

Most of Dominion Representatives, However, Prefer to Leave Issue to Mother Government.

LONDON, July 4. — (By the Associated Press.)—The British public, with the Anglo-Japanese treaty apparently pigeonholed pending the attempt to bring about discussions with the other Pacific ocean powers with the view of reaching some agreement respecting that part of the world, is wondering what the premiers attending the imperial conference will find to talk about until July 23, when they are to finish their work in London.

Some of the newspapers suggest they should take up the Irish question, but most of the dominion representatives prefer to leave this responsibility to the imperial government. It is argued that the general foreign policy, which is the next subject on the agenda, must await a settlement of the Pacific question.

Premier Meighen of Canada, among others, is urging a postponement also of the discussion on dominion cooperation in the naval and military defense of the empire until after the constitutional conference, the date of which the present conference is expected to fix, which is to define the status of the obligations of the various parts of the empire.

Premier Meighen's view is that the international situation should be cleared before the question of defense is taken up and that the politicians should await some definite conclusion of the naval experts before discussing matters of state.

On the other hand, the British premier, Mr. Lloyd George; Winston Spencer Churchill, minister for the colonies, and Lord Lee of Fareham, first lord of the admiralty, are using an immediate decision on the dominion contribution at least to the navy, which they say is becoming a heavy burden for the United Kingdom to carry alone.
