

WOMEN NOT WANTED ON MRS. KABER JURY

Six Seated Temporarily Per-
emptorily Challenged.

TRIAL MAY START TODAY

Another Special Verdict of Names
to Be Drawn—Murder of
Husband Is Alleged.

CLEVELAND, July 5.—Chances that even one woman is going to sit on the jury trying Mrs. Eva Catherine Kaber here for the murder of her husband were exceedingly slim tonight.

Eleven men were in the tentative panel. Six women, who were tentatively seated earlier in the day were later excused on peremptory challenge of Mrs. Kaber's counsel. The defense had six peremptory challenges left when court adjourned for the day and the state two. Of about 40 prospective jurors from which to draw to complete the panel, there were left only two women. Another special venire of 20 names was ordered today by the court.

Jury Completion Expected.
Judge Bernon announced tonight that he expected the jury to be completed tomorrow and the taking of testimony started.

Prosecutor Stanton declared that the first state witness would be an ex-assistant coroner, by whose testimony he will prove that Daniel F. Kaber is actually dead.

Judge Bernon, to expedite matters, himself undertook to make the preliminary inquiries. A sample of the instructions asked by the judge was: "Do you feel that you could give both sides a 50-50 deal?"

Experts Are to Be Called.
Attorney Poulson, Mrs. Kaber's personal counsel, said he would call a number of prominent experts in an attempt to convince the jury that Mrs. Kaber was insane when she planned the murder of her husband.

A woman's worst enemy is woman—they are full of spite and hatred toward each other."

Thus wrote one woman to Mrs. Kaber.

Counsel for Mrs. Kaber exhibited numerous letters, mostly from women, offering sympathy and advice in the trial. They came from all parts of the country. Several urged that women should not be on the jury.

Alleged Slayers Are Held.
Mr. Kaber, a wealthy publisher, died two years ago under mysterious circumstances, which later resulted in the arrest of his wife and married daughter. Men who were said to have confessed killing Kaber at the behest of his wife were held under indictment.

Unless other women are seated, Mrs. Kaber will be tried by a jury of men.

Attorneys for Mrs. Kaber vigorously fought to prevent women from sitting on the jury and succeeded in having all of those accepted removed.

Mrs. Kaber's Demerol Same.
At the outset of the trial last week Judge Bernon overruled a motion by Attorney Corrigan for the defense to strike the names of women from the venire list on the ground that women were not constitutionally eligible for jury duty.

Three alienists for the defense have examined Mrs. Kaber in her cell since the trial was adjourned last week. Reports on the examination will not be made known until the alienists take the witness stand in Mrs. Kaber's behalf.

Mrs. Kaber assumed the same demeanor today as she did last week. She also was dressed the same.

HIGHWAY FUNDS AUDITED

Coos County to Determine Quota of Its Expenditures.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—Under authority of the Coos county court, an audit was being made of the expenditures the county has made on the county highway between Coquille and Myrtle Point, a distance of between 10 and 15 miles. The audit was being made by W. H. Wann and the data to be produced were for use in determining what the division of expenditures should be from the state fund, and from Coos county, in carrying out the surfacing of that part of the Coos and Douglas county state highway work.

The state commission made appropriations to be used on the highway from Coquille eastward to the county line. After this audit was completed, it was expected the state commission would ask for figures between Myrtle Point and the line of Douglas county, through Bridge and Remote.

BURNS MYSTIFY POLICE

Men at Hospital Refuse to Explain Injuries.

Joe Skada, 23, and Joe Faber, 25, are in Good Samaritan hospital with serious burns about the head and body, which were caused by an explosion. The two men arrived at the hospital in the same automobile early yesterday morning, but both refused to discuss the cause of their accidents.

Skada at first said he was burned in an automobile explosion, and Faber said he got into a tub of boiling water by mistake. All efforts of detectives to get at the truth were unsuccessful. Although both men are in a serious condition, hospital attendants believe they may recover.

ADJOURNMENT IS BEATEN

Lodge Resolution Defeat in Senate Is Victory for Farmers.

at all kinds of curious ends. There are some who say, for example, that we can take the ground that our old treaty with Prussia written in 1878,

is now automatically revived, and that since that old treaty is prior in time to the Versailles treaty, then we can ignore the latter.

This is far-fetched reasoning and would never occur to anybody except in a frantic and legalistic attempt to avoid engaging under the Versailles treaty.

Whether President Harding will choose the course of reviving the Versailles treaty no person can tell. The two facts of record are that President Harding, by his speech in April, believes that to be the best course, and Secretary Hughes, by the document he and 30 others signed last October, also believes that to be the best course.

If President Harding and Secretary Hughes do not take the course which they believe to be best it will be because of political considerations. It will be because they fear the senate would rebel and that the old rancor of the irreconcilables against the Versailles treaty would blaze up again in this matter. Time fights for the Versailles treaty. With every passing month the intensity of the old passion against it tends to subside by degrees.

FEWER ARMY POSTS, PLAN

MEXICAN BORDER COMMAND TO BE REDUCED.

Abandonment of Coast Artillery Positions in South Planned by Military Chiefs.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 5.—Plans for effecting the reduction of the enlisted strength of the army from 223,000 men to 150,000 by October 1, as directed by congress, will be presented to Secretary Weeks within a few days. It became known today that it will be necessary to abandon a number of military posts, including several in each branch of the service, and to reduce materially the commands at others.

One of the most important commands to suffer reduction will be that on the Mexican border, it was said. Abandonment of practically all of the coast artillery posts in the south with the exception of that at West and a few others at important points is being considered, it was said.

Recent reports to the department showed 223,000 men in the army, and it was estimated that 5000 had been discharged since that date. All corps and divisional commanders were asked today to submit reports on their enlisted personnel July 10 and every ten days thereafter until August.

4-STORY FALL SURVIVED

Victim, Unhurt, Is Incensed When Rushed to Hospital.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 5.—Four stories from the roof of a downtown building to the pavement, and the plume Fred Watson, a painter, took when his foot slipped here today. Horrified autoists rushed and picked him up, despite his struggles, and hurried him to the receiving hospital.

"Can't you guys let a fellow be?" he said. "Make them let me go, Doc. I don't like to have my work interrupted."

Commutation of Ruiz followed enactment of legislation at the last session of the legislature which provided that Ruiz case and designed to prevent execution of minors, it was said at the governor's office.

The father said: "The boy is not bad when sane, but has times when he is off and not responsible. I buried my wife, his mother, last spring, his trouble then being one of the main causes of her death."

First 1921 Wheat Shipped.

JONE, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—What was believed to have been the first shipment of 1921 wheat was sent from here this morning, consigned to the H. W. Collier Grain company. It was the first of the crop of Dwight Miner's 2000 acres and the average yield was better than 22 bushels the acre and of high grade.

U. S. AVIATORS PLAN TRAILS FOR AIRMEN

Continent to Be Mapped Out for Fliers' Benefit.

BOY SCOUTS WILL HELP

Landing and Emergency Fields Are to Be Built and Markers to Be Constructed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 5.—A system of model airways covering the entire continent has been planned by the army air service for the use of all operators or owners of aircraft. It contemplates various chains of well-organized landing fields, supplemented by frequent emergency fields and identification markers connecting the principal cities. Because of the lack of federal appropriations, air service officials said today it was their purpose to appeal to the chambers of commerce, aerial clubs and civic organizations to assist in creation of the airways. The Boy Scouts' organization already has pledged its cooperation. It was stated, and will construct identification markers, guard wrecked planes, submit monthly reports on the non-potential field conditions and generally assist aviators in trouble.

The plan calls for the first of the model airways between Washington and Dayton, Ohio, with five main stations, 10 subsidiary stations and 20 emergency fields.

Each main station will be provided with a municipal landing field, wireless and telephone equipment, and a meteorological station, which will forecast weather conditions and wind conditions and disseminate such information to the fliers along the route.

Other airways tentatively approved by the service to be included in the national system include one from New York City to Langley Field, Va., connecting the principal cities between the two terminals; one from Jacksonville, Fla., to San Diego, Calif., along a general line of Mobile, Ala., San Antonio, Tex., and Tucson, Ariz.; another from St. Paul and Minneapolis to Seattle, to be known as the Yellowstone trail, along the general line of Aberdeen, S. D., Miles City, Billings and Butte, Mont., Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, and Spokane, Wash., and proposes to connect New Orleans, La., and Chicago, Ill., taking the Mississippi Valley route.

KU KLUX SCARES LEAGUE

NON-PARTISAN ORGANIZATION HEAD ASKS PROTECTION.

South Dakota Governor Asked to Fight Klan Preparing to Battle Political Leaders.

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., July 5.—Tom Ayres, state master of the non-partisan league, late today telegraphed Governor W. H. McMaster asking protection for the league. The chapter of which has been organized in South Dakota for the purpose of fighting the league.

"I am informed that the Ku Klux Klan, a secret, oath-bound organization with a record of assassination and arson, has effected an organization in South Dakota to fight the non-partisan league and other progressive organizations. It is to be presumed, in spite of its professions to the contrary, that it will pursue its customary methods in this state. I demand that you protect the property and lives of South Dakota people from this criminal conspiracy against the peace and dignity of this state and use your peace officials to bring the organizers of this criminal gang to justice."

FIRST WAR DEAD HOME

Bodies of Gresham, Enright and Hay Are at Hoboken.

HOBOKEN, N. J., July 5.—Bodies of the first three American soldiers to fall on the field of battle in the late war, will be sent with 7309 others to their native cities next Sunday after a military funeral service at the army piers here.

The body of Privates Thomas E. Enright of Pittsburgh and Merle D. Hay of Giddens, Ia., arrived with 5222 others on the United States Army Transport Wheaton last Saturday. That of Corporal James D. Gresham of Evansville, Ind., was among 1487 arriving on the transport Somme today.

All three fell the night of November 3, 1917. They were members of the 16th Infantry, 1st division.

EXPLOSIVE IS AVAILABLE

Picric Acid to Be Distributed to Farmers of Northwest.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., July 5.—Land owners in the northwest who desire explosives for blowing out stumps or building roads and trails may obtain picric acid from the government by applying through state agricultural colleges or other state agencies to the United States bureau of public roads, department of agriculture, the chief of the public roads bureau advised Representative McArthur of Oregon today.

The explosive for distribution is picric acid, of which the department of agriculture has 12,500,000 pounds. The acid is now stored in bulk and must be carted before it is transported. The landowners have been asked to pay the costs of carting, while the freight charges, make the total cost delivered to the north Pacific coast approximately 12 cents a pound. Washington is entitled to about 250,000 pounds of the explosive, Oregon 160,000 pounds, and Idaho 100,000 pounds.
