

FILM STOCK SALES CAUSE INDICTMENT

Son of Late Harvard Professor Is Arrested.

SWINDLING POOR CHARGE

Three Other New Yorkers Accused of Fraud in Connection With Motion Picture Company.

NEW YORK, July 5.—Indictments charging Elliot Norton, lawyer and author; Anthony J. Drexel Jr., of Philadelphia; Louis R. Jennings and Harry Brodski, with selling unauthorized stock of the Standard Film Industries, Inc., were returned by the grand jury last Thursday. It became known today, when Norton was arrested and held in \$5000 bail. He pleaded not guilty.

Mr. Norton, son of the late Charles Elliot Norton, professor of English at Harvard university, was named in the indictment as secretary and attorney of the company. Mr. Drexel was designated as vice-president; Jennings as president and Brodski as general manager.

Sales Declared \$200,000. District Attorney Nathan stated that the organization, incorporated in Virginia in 1916, had not been paying dividends. The salesmen had sold, he added, about \$200,000 worth of stock at a figure under par. Of this amount, he declared, about \$6000 had been paid to negro residents of New York's Harlem section, and said that the company's agents were paid 40 per cent of their sales.

The indictment grew out of an investigation into the company conducted by the New York state industrial commission. Following receipt, police said, of numerous complaints from people of small means who said they had been induced to invest in the corporation on promises of large returns, but had received no dividends.

Violation of Code Charged. The company was alleged to have reported the sale of only 200 shares of stock at \$5 each to the Virginia authorities, whereas the indictment charged stock of \$100,000 par value was actually sold at \$3 to \$3.50 a share, bringing in approximately \$400,000.

Mr. Drexel is said to be in Europe. Jennings in Chicago or St. Louis, and Brodski at Redondo Beach, Cal.

The specific charge of the indictment was violation of a section of the penal code relating to issuance of stock in excess of the amount declared. The stock of the film corporation was not listed on the curb market.

The maximum penalty provided by the law is seven years' imprisonment, \$5000 fine, or both.

BROLASKI DENIES CHARGES. Defendant Says He Is Not Manager of Film Company.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—Harry Brodski, indicted in New York in connection with the alleged sale of unauthorized stock of the Standard Film Industries, was indicted here today for conspiracy to defraud. Brodski is free on bond pending appeal of his conviction in the United States district court here as "master mind" of an alleged whiskey selling conspiracy, with transactions, the government charges, running into many thousands of dollars, and was sentenced to two years in prison.

"I never was general manager of the film company," Brodski said. "Second, I know nothing of the reported returns on sales said to have been made to the Virginia authorities. I was indicted in this same case in 1917 and the case was dismissed in New York in December, 1919, or the case against me was dismissed.

"The moment my present difficulties with the United States government have been settled here I'll return to New York of my own will, without extradition and at my own expense, to aid in settling the film case. I'll do anything possible to assist District Attorney Swann of New York in his investigations. I never was general manager of the company and I was not a director."

Brodski at one time was a department of justice agent in Chicago, mayor of Redondo Beach, chairman of the republican county central committee of Los Angeles county according to his statement, a reformed confidence man.

He was author of a book, entitled "A Fool and His Money." The book was declared to be an expose of gambling and confidence methods, at which Brodski said he had excelled for years.

PLAYGROUNDS ARE ISSUE. Council of Oregon City to Decide Whether to Buy Site.

OREGON CITY, July 5.—(Special.)—Final decision on the action to be taken by the city on the proposed new playground will be reached Wednesday night at the regular meeting of the city council.

The proposal was for the purchase of what is known as the Hugg and part of the Barnholtzer tracts, for \$7800.

DRY LAW BARS ALIEN. Citizenship Denied When Objection of Amendment Is Doubtful.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., July 5.—To August Carl Robeck, 76 years old, a subject of Great Britain, was denied American citizenship in federal court here today when he indicated that he would have difficulty in accepting the 18th amendment to the constitution, the prohibition statute.

Judge Jeremiah Neterer said the constitution must be supported or rejected as a whole.

FILM STAR CITY VISITOR. Priscilla Dean and Party on Way North for Pictures.

Priscilla Dean, motion picture star, Stuart Patton, her director, and several principals of her supporting company passed yesterday in Portland en route to Canada to make the final exterior scenes of "Confessions of a Heart Throb."

The players passed the day resting at the Multnomah hotel and left at 7:30 P. M. for a logging camp on the Bull river, just across the Idaho line in British Columbia, which will be the site of the picture-making.

NURSE FOILS JAIL BREAK. MEN POUNDING ON ROOF HEARD BY ATTENDANT.

23 Cellmates Sing to Drown Noise While Two Men Attempt to Escape From Prison.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 5.—(Special.)—While 23 prisoners in one large cell in the city jail sang "Glory, Glory Hallelujah," two men were making their way through the ceiling. They were working their way to liberty by a ventilator shaft when hospital nurses, hearing the noise, notified Jailers Brodski and Philbrick.

After being notified that the two prisoners were forced to descend, Mark McCoy, head of the jail, sent a safe keeping charge for J. Collins, traveling guard at Walla Walla penitentiary, and Charles O'Malley, who was arrested after leaving the jail.

Friday night, when the two prisoners, accused of burglary, was caught as he was escaping from the same cell in the north, but no definite plans have been made for this work.

Jailers believed that the entire contingent of prisoners in the cell hoped to escape. O'Malley and McCoy, their connivance in drowning the noise of the pounding of two men by the singing of the jail attendants to this belief.

Before the men tried to get out by means of the ventilator shaft, they escaped away from the cell and started to work on the ventilator shaft in the ceiling.

McCoy, an Oregon boot, a heavyweight, from his foot, started to work on the ventilator shaft in the ceiling. A hole large enough to admit the body of a man was made and the grating of the ventilator torn down.

O'Malley went into the hole beside the ventilator, while McCoy started climbing up the ventilator. It was O'Malley's pounding as he attempted to force an exit to the roof from the compartment that led to the detection of the attempted escape.

The ventilator shaft, into which McCoy climbed, was barely wide enough to hold a man and it extends 14 feet above the jail ceiling, its top opening ten feet above the roof, is strongly barred. McCoy has not yet started to try to force these bars when his attempt was frustrated.

NORTH BANK IS KEPT BY SAME TWO OWNERS

Northern Pacific and Great Northern Retain Pact.

OPERATION TO BE JOINT

Impending Purchase of 50 Per Cent of Stock by One of Companies Is Denied.

Equality of ownership in the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway by the two parent roads, the Northern Pacific and Great Northern, each of which hold 50 per cent of the stock in the concern, will not be disturbed, according to a joint statement issued yesterday by Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific, and Ralph Budarick, president of the Great Northern, who authorized W. P. Turner, president of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle, to make this declaration known.

This would appear to lay at rest the report, given out in St. Paul last week, seemingly with weight of authority, by a Great Northern vice-president, that the purchase of the Northern Pacific interest in the sub-sidiary line by the Great Northern was impending and would be completed not later than September 1.

Operation Is to Be Joint. At the same time the latest angle to the reported change in the ownership of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle line, as intimated by J. G. Woodworth, vice-president of the Northern Pacific in Portland, Saturday, seems to be fairly well assured—that is, a joint operation of the road by the two parent lines instead of the maintenance of a separate railroad entity as at present.

This was declared by Mr. Woodworth to be advantageous of the necessary preliminaries could be effected, in that it would allow both roads to get the full benefit of any traffic they might route over the line, whereas under the present arrangement all earnings of the North Bank road would be 50-50 basis between the two owners.

Joint Statement Issued. The two railroad presidents, in their joint statement yesterday, declared that the company had not yet that any change in operation of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle property would be made, but in any event, equal holdings by the two northern lines would remain as at present.

President Turner, of the railroad property whose destiny has been so much discussed since the report was made last week, foresees a radical change in ownership, was advised by telegram from the two railroad presidents yesterday afternoon that the statement was misleading. They directed that the following declaration be made: "The Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway company is jointly owned by the Northern Pacific and Great Northern, and the two owners are equal in ownership."

The story that the Great Northern had been making a move to acquire the interests of the Northern Pacific railway company in the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway company is entirely incorrect and unfounded.

Sale Held Not Considered. "The Northern Pacific has never at any time considered selling its interest in this property, nor has the Great Northern considered purchasing it. It is not at all certain that any change will be made in the operation of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway company's property, but it is absolutely certain that the equality of ownership of the road, which is now a fact, will remain as it is."

At the city yesterday were L. C. Gilman, vice-president of the Great Northern, with headquarters at Seattle, and George T. Reid, assistant to President Donnelly of the Northern Pacific, with headquarters at Tacoma. They presumably discussed the proposed joint operation of the North Bank road with President Turner, but the gist of the discussion or the result of the conference was not given.

Meanwhile it is believed that some what involved preliminary arrangements for joint operation of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle line by the two owning roads are either already under way or are in course of preparation.

The council also decided to pave Ninth street from Broadway to Main street, one block, and from Washington street to Columbia street, one block.

Condemnation proceedings to open Broadway from Twenty-sixth street to the Pacific highway were discussed, but the question was not taken. The council appeared favorable to the plan. Broadway now extends from Fifth street to the Pacific highway. The new plan was to add about five more blocks to the street, so that the city on Broadway.
