"RED" RUPERT ON WAY TO McNEIL'S ISLAND—In the custody of federal officers, Clyde "Red" Rupert, who has completed a three-year sentence in the state penitentiary, arrived in Portland yesterday en route to McNeil's island where he will start a three-year federal sentence. Rupert was convicted in the state and federal courts for the theft of liberty bonds from the Northwestern National bank, and he was sentenced to a special officer. Two years ago he escaped from the penitentiary and was at large for several weeks, ultimately being captured in California.

The decision upholds the law passed last legislative session which prohibits the selling of substitutes for butter or other products by a company bearing a dairy products name.

\$6500 ESTATE IN SUIT

Woman Declares Late William Kibberg Was Her Son.

Karl Norgren, whose residence has been and still is in Sweden, sought in a suit filed in the circuit court yesterday to be declared sole heir to the \$6500 estate of the late William Kibberg, who, she said, was her son, born out of wedlock.

The action is brought against Ole Kibberg, natural father of the deceased, his wife, Kristine, and S. C. Catching, administrator of the estate of Kibberg. The plaintiff contended that she is the true mother of the child and that the father of the child intended to defraud her when he had himself declared sole heir to the estate.

William Kibberg died August 12, 1920. Catching was appointed administrator and obtained the appointment of Catching as administrator of the estate. Kibberg "willfully refused to tell her the truth of the death of her son, she charged."

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The plaintiff in the suit desires to enjoin Kibberg from spending any of the money in the estate and demands recovery.

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FORGERIES ARE ALLEGED

WHITNEY BOYS' CHORUS EX-TREASURER ARRESTED.

Issuing of Spurious Contracts for Agents with "World's Fair Association" Charged.

Because, it was alleged, he forged the names of Julius Meier, president of the 1925 exposition committee, and A. Clark Selby, treasurer of the Whitney boys' chorus, to spurious contracts with agents for the "World's Fair Association," A. R. Chance, ex-employee of the Whitney boys' chorus, found himself in the city jail last night facing a charge of forgery.

The arrest was made yesterday by Police Inspectors Coleman and Collins on complaint of Michael Barnes and T. A. Chapman, who alleged they were lured out of small sums of money by Chance. They were taken into custody at Broadway and Washington street.

According to the two complaining witnesses, Chance contracted with them to serve as advance agents for the "World's Fair Association" at salaries of \$100 a week, together with \$70 a week traveling expenses. Chance, it was charged, entered into contract with the two young men, agreeing to pay them the foregoing salary and expenses. The contract specified they were to begin work August 15. They were to go out in advance of the boys' chorus, the complaining witnesses said Chance told them to be a forgery.

The contracts were said to contain the signatures of Julius Meier and A. Clark Selby. Mr. Meier said his signature was a palpable forgery, while Mr. Selby's signature also was alleged to be a forgery.

POLICE RECOVER AUTOS

24 OF 26 MACHINES STOLEN IN JUNE ARE FOUND.

Lieutenant Thatcher Reports That Four Cars From Other Cities Were Retaken Also.

Out of 26 automobiles reported stolen in Portland during June 24 were recovered in the same month, according to the report of Lieutenant Thatcher of the auto theft bureau in the course of a series of talks with the press.
