

NEUHAUSEN'S TRIP STIRS SPECULATION

Lobbyist Believed to Have
Design on Patronage.

BACKERS NOT YET KNOWN

Opposition to Anyone Supported by
Ferdinand E. Reed Principal
Creed of Worker.

Thomas B. Neuhausen's mission to Washington, D. C., is causing speculation in political circles. Mr. Neuhausen is supposed not to want a political job for himself, and the report is that he has been commissioned by someone, or several someones, to go to Washington and lobby with Senators Stanford and McNary regarding federal patronage.

Lobbying is no new experience for Mr. Neuhausen. He was the paid lobbyist of the Portland school teachers during the 1921 session of the legislature to look after the interests of the teachers' tenure. For this he was paid \$2500.

Those familiar with the political situation and the men who participate in the game are convinced that Mr. Neuhausen did not go to Washington at his own expense for the sake of trying to prevent certain appointments or to assist other candidates for appointment. A round trip to Washington consumes time and considerable money.

Senators' Campaign Helped.
Mr. Neuhausen assisted in the management of Senator McNary's campaign and also assisted in the management of Senator Stanford's campaign and, consequently, is supposed to be on very close terms with both of the senators.

It is known that he is one of the political advisers of Senator Stanford and he is said to be opposed to anyone for appointment who may have the backing of Ferdinand E. Reed, the other political adviser of Senator Stanford. Mr. Neuhausen has urged the senator to have his name removed from the office door of Mr. Reed, for the senator's Portland office is in Mr. Reed's office and the latter looks after the senator's realty affairs in this city.

Originally, Mr. Neuhausen favored Clarence Hotchkiss for marshal. Later he was an advocate of Frank S. Bramwell of Grants Pass. At all times he has failed to warm up to the idea that J. L. Day, republican county chairman, should have this job. Also he is said to think someone else than Postmaster Jones should be postmaster in Portland.

Influence Is Uncertain.
How much influence Mr. Neuhausen can exert on the senators in the patronage problem is unknown. In some respects his ideas and Senator Stanford's are more in harmony regarding certain appointments than his ideas and those of Senator McNary. If rumors are to be believed, not only the candidates for federal position, presumed to have the support of Senator McNary is favored by Mr. Neuhausen.

It was in Mr. Neuhausen's office that Mr. Hotchkiss had an interview with Senator Stanford when the latter was here a couple of weeks ago. With the renewed activity of Mr. Hotchkiss and the opposition being registered against Chairman Day from some quarters it is possible that neither will be appointed marshal and that E. C. Kirkpatrick of Polk county may be the compromise of the senators.

In the afternoon the Prunarians will stage a house party at the Newberg organization; the Salem Cherrians have challenged the winners. The Prunarians have issued a challenge to the winner of the tug-of-war between the Berrians and Cherrians. Following that will be a baseball game between the Newberg and Vancouver boosters.

The new officers of the Prunarians were installed today. Y. E. Dunbar was inaugurated as president, Dr. R. M. Andrews vice-president, J. W. Shaw secretary and Allison Burnham treasurer.

A watch was given George Simpson, retiring president.

BONUS BONDS ARE SOLD

Bid of Eastern Syndicate Accepted
by State of Washington.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 6.—The state board of finance today accepted the bid of the New York syndicate headed by E. H. Rollins & Sons, for \$3,000,000 in veterans' compensation bonds. The bonds will bear interest of 5 per cent, with a total premium of \$43,130.

The same syndicate retains until September 1 an option on the remaining \$3,000,000 of the \$13,000,000 issue authorized by the legislature.

ROTARIANS VIEW PARIS

Last Day of Visit Devoted to Sight-seeing and Inspection.

PARIS, July 6.—The last day of the visit of the American Rotary club delegates to Paris was devoted to sightseeing and inspection of French industrial plants.

The 600 delegates were received by President Millerand at the palace this afternoon. He expressed his gratitude of the French government for their visit to France.

DEFENDANT IS BERATED

\$11,850 Verdict Is Returned as
Echo of Jung Truck Case.

Little in the store of inductive possession by Roscoe C. Nelson was left untroubled at the conclusion of the suit of the North Western Finance corporation against J. S. Lebb and D. G. Lebb in the court of Circuit Judge Tucker yesterday. The trial was directed chiefly against D. G. Lebb, the attorney conceding that Lebb had experienced the bar he had never felt called upon as strongly to malign a person. He had waived argument, but

was forced to argue when the defense attorney refused to waive.

Whether or not the jury agreed with all that Nelson said of Lebb, it remained out scarcely 15 minutes and brought in a verdict in full for the plaintiff, being a judgment for \$11,850 with interest at 8 per cent from March 27, 1920, and attorney's fees of \$600. The verdict was unanimous.

The case recalled the disappearance of August Jung of Diamond T truck fame, for it involved some of the trucks which he had on display in his salesrooms at the time he fled from the city. Loans of \$8500 and \$3200 had been given by the finance company to the Lebb's secured by trucks which subsequent developments disclosed were subject to prior liens for their full market value.

The trucks were some of those involved in the shaky financing of Jung, who is a fugitive from justice in Mexico City.

COMPLAINT NOT SPECIFIC

STATE PROPOSES DEMURRER
TO HIGHWAY COMPLAINT.

Contractors Proceed With Construction Work Despite Threatened Litigation.

SALEM, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway department, announced today that he was preparing a motion asking that the complaint filed by certain residents of Independence asking that the state be enjoined from proceeding with the construction of the West Side Pacific highway, be made more definite. The motion will be filed in the circuit court for Polk county.

The original suit alleged that the county court of Polk county exceeded its authority when it designated certain sections of the West Side Pacific highway as market roads, and also that the county court had no legal authority to incur indebtedness to exceed \$5000.

Contracts for the construction of the Polk county highway were awarded some time ago, and the contractors are now at work. As yet, no formal injunction has been granted by the circuit court.

As soon as the plaintiffs file an amended complaint, should the motion of the highway department attorney prevail, Mr. Devers will file a demurrer to the entire proceedings. This demurrer will be based on the grounds that the allegations of plaintiffs do not constitute a cause of action.

Special Train Carrying 125 Others
Also Arrives en Route to Los Angeles Convention.

RUM TRANSPORT BANNED

Aliens Yet Barred From Taking
Liquor Across United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—Despite diplomatic protest, Attorney General Daugherty has upheld the ruling of his predecessor that alcoholic liquors cannot be transported across the territory of the United States, in transit from one foreign country to another.

The opinion was sent to the customs division of the treasury today and a conference of the officials was held to determine methods of enforcing it.

Protests against this interpretation of the prohibition law were filed some months ago by the British embassy in behalf of Canadian citizens and by the Italian embassy.

PHILIPPINE DEBT BILL UP

Senate Passes Measure and Sends
It to Conference.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—The house bill authorizing an increase of the Philippine islands debt limit from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000 was passed today by the senate and sent to conference.

Taxi Driver Arrested.

SALEM, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—Roy Livingston, 20-year-old taxi driver, was arrested here today, charged with the theft of automobile accessories.

After a questioning of the young man Chief Moffitt said he obtained a confession that these thefts had been going on over a period of more than six months. Livingston was arrested as he was about to board an automobile stage for Portland.

Harry White Transferred.

SALEM, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—Harry White, for several months local field representative for the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, has been transferred to Roseburg. He will have charge of the association's activities in the Umpqua valley.

Ministers and Laity Hold Annual
Conference.

ATTENDANCE IS LARGE

Sessions at Turner Are Marked by
Spirit of Zeal Unknown at
Previous Meetings.

TURNER, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—The largest attendance in many years, a spirit of zealous study, speeches by prominent ministers and bible leaders of Oregon, and ideal weather are features of the 31st annual convention of the Christian Church of State, which opened here Saturday and will continue until Sunday night.

The Turner lodge and all cottages are filled with ministers and laymen from all over the state, here with their families.

A programme has been prepared by the convention officers: Rev. E. V. Stivers of Eugene, president; Rev. J. E. Evans of Salem, chairman; and Rev. C. P. Swander of Portland, secretary.

Sermons on Sunday were delivered by Rev. Stivers who spoke on "Our Part in Christ's Programme"; Rev. J. E. Evans of Salem, who preached the communion sermon; and Rev. Clarence W. Reynolds of Corvallis, whose subject was "Prayer and Praise."

Pastors Deliver Addresses.
A forceful address on "Our Heritage of Freedom" was delivered this morning by Rev. C. H. Hilton of Roseburg. Other addresses of the day were delivered by Rev. Jesse M. Bader, national secretary of educational evangelism, of St. Louis, Mo.; Rev. J. F. Gormley, a pioneer Portland pastor, now of Kern Park, Portland, who spoke on "Preachers and Preaching Among the Churches of Christ in the Future," Rev. L. E. ENDEAVOR RALLY BEGINS

ALL PEOPLES REPRESENTED
AT WORLD CONVENTION.

President Clark Makes Appeal for
Campaign to Blanket Earth
With Christianity.

NEW YORK, July 6.—Delegations from every continent attended the opening of the sixth world's Christian Endeavor convention here tonight. There were 15,000 men and women massed in the big stone armory of the first regiment that served as the convention hall. They represented more than 4,000,000 members.

The largest foreign contingent came from Canada, the dominion sending 1000 delegates in a special train. Others came from Japan, China, Australia, India, Armenia, Persia, Egypt and elsewhere in Asia and Africa. Five South American republics were represented, and Mexico had more than a score of delegates. Continental Europe's family of nations and the various divisions of the British Isles all sent delegates. Every state in the United States has its quota.

Rev. Frances E. Clark of Boston, president of the World's Christian Endeavor union, opened the convention with an appeal for a four-square Christian Endeavor campaign to carry the principles of Christianity to all corners of the world.

Edward P. Gates, general secretary, reported that 3228 new Endeavor societies had been organized in the last two years, and the total membership was the largest in its history.

Roger Babson, statistician, who spoke on "Christian Endeavor in Business," said the present business depression was due to the failure of people to live "close enough to God to stand continuous prosperity."
