

BOY SCOUTS LEAVE FOR SUMMER CAMP

Special Car Takes Youths to
Eagle Creek Canyon.

EIGHTY-TWO ARE IN PARTY

Study of Forestry Will Feature
Outing and Strict Discipline
Govern Daily Operations.

Eighty-two Boy Scouts left Portland yesterday morning in a special car over the O-W-R & N. for the mouth of Eagle creek canyon, from where the party hiked to the site of their summer camp, 15 miles up the canyon, overlooking the Wabum lake, and pitched their camp preparatory to spending the summer vacation there. Accompanying the party were William D. Janin, assistant scout executive; Rex L. Morse, scoutmaster of troop 19, and Leslie Oliver, scoutmaster of troop 35.

Baggage preceded the expedition several days. J. A. C. Oakes, assistant scout executive, and Clarence Smith, athletic and swimming instructor, having been at the camp a week making preparations for the arrival of the small army. The boys took their lunches and their fishing tackle and kodaks with them, and at noon a stop was made for lunch, the party reaching the camp at about 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

More Scouts Will Follow.

The detachment is by far the largest single group which has ever started from Portland for the summer camp, and, according to the registration for those who intend to go within a few weeks, the camp soon will be running at its full capacity, accommodating 150 boys. Additional parties will go from Portland every second Wednesday until the close of the camp.

James E. Brockway, scout executive, and Mrs. Brockway will go to the camp the early part of next week and remain throughout the summer. Among the visitors at the lake will be Walter Pritchard Eaton, author; M. W. Gorman, forestry authority, and William L. Finley, who will take motion pictures of the activities of the Scouts.

Mr. Brockway also has extended an invitation to Mary Roberts Rinehart, noted novelist and writer, who will visit Oregon the latter part of July, and he believes she will consent to become a guest of the Scouts for a few days.

Daily Schedules Prepared.

The daily programme will be run off on regular hourly schedule, with reveille at 6:30 and taps at 9 o'clock. A study of forestry will be taken up by the scouts and the exercises will be under the supervision of an adult each day.

The programme will be changed each day, an exemplar of the activities appearing as follows:

6:30, reveille; 7, rollcall and wide-awake exercises; 7:15, breakfast; 7:45, policing of tents and grounds; 8:45, inspection of tents and grounds; 9, woodcraft; 10, axe, etc.; 10, swimming, rafting, fishing; 12:15, dinner; 12:45-1:30, quiet hour—reading, writing home and scouting study; 2, horse and rider, etc.; flag raising; 3:30, swimming and rafting; 5, forestry, woods carpentry; 6, supper; 7, cantonment; 7:45, Indian campfire programme; 8:45, tattoo, call to quarters; 9, taps.

TINNERS' STRIKE YET ON

Efforts at Settlement Involving 10 Per Cent Cut Fail.

Efforts to bring about a settlement of the tinners' strike have so far proved unsuccessful. It was announced yesterday. Negotiations were broken off between the employers and the strikers two weeks ago following the failure to effect a compromise, and since that time steps to bring about another meeting have been unsuccessful.

Employers announced that many of the strikers were going to work at the new scale, which provides for a 10 per cent cut.

Strikers, on the contrary, declared that the only men who had gone back to work had gone back at the old \$8 scale. They said that only about 30 of their men were unemployed now.

B. Sherman Indicted.

ASTORIA, Or., July 6.—(Special.)—The circuit court grand jury today completed the investigation of the criminal matters pending before it and was excused until the further order of the court. The grand jury returned three indictments against B. Sherman, who was arrested at Redlands, Cal., a few days ago. One charged him with uttering a forged check signed by the name of the Lovell Automobile company; the second charged him with larceny in stealing Frank C. Hesse's roadster, and the third charged larceny in stealing \$20 from the Lovell Automobile company. Two secret true bills were returned by the grand jury.

Revenue From Tax Estimated.

ABERDEEN, Wash., July 6.—(Special.)—Approximately \$1500 will go into the state highway from the pockets of Grays Harbor motorists on account of the cent-a-gallon tax on gasoline, according to computations of local gas station dealers. The law was enacted at the last session of the legislature and is modeled after the Oregon law.

Centralia Elects Pastor.

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 6.—(Special.)—O. L. Oppelt last night was elected pastor of the Centralia church of Latter-Day Saints. He succeeds L. S. Rhodes, who has accepted a position with a manufacturing concern that will necessitate his moving to Spokane.
