BOOTSLEGGERS SUSPECTED.—Deputy Sheriff Christofferson, Schirmer and Beeman cruising along Skyline boulevard early Tuesday night in search of a home which had been robbed saw a familiar figure in an automobile drawn up at the roadside. It was Joe Dodak who was fined \$250 and received a suspended sentence of 30 days for bootlegging last week. The officers turned back and looked in the machine occupied by Dodak and Henry Hofron. They found five gallons of fresh moonshine. Hofron said he would show the officers where the still was located. He started into the woods with Deputy Schirmer. Suddenly he broke and ran. Shots fired over his head talked him into the car. The officer finally overtook the fugitive. Bail was fixed at \$500 for the pair.

HOPE FOR DR. FENTON GIVEN UP.—Notice that relatives of Dr. J. D. Fenton who dropped from sight March 17, 1921, have abandoned hope of finding him alive was given yesterday with the disappointment of Henry W. Sifton as administrator of the estate of Dr. Fenton by Circuit Judge Fairwell. The appointment was made on the petition of daughter, Margaret Lucille Fenton. The daughter and a son, James, are the only children. The estate consists of personal property and is valued at about \$1500. John P. O'Hannon appeared as attorney for the estate.

SEIZURE DECLARED ILLEGAL.—More belief that there was liquor on the premises without knowledge that its possession was unlawful was insufficient basis for issuance of a search warrant, ruled Circuit Judge McCourt yesterday when he threw out of court the appeal case of Duio Rector, fined \$50 in the municipal court for alleged unlawful possession of intoxicants. Walter Gleason, attorney for Rector, argued to the court that the wine in his client's home, 633 Uphur street, was seized without proper authority. Road to One Oregon road is the lowest bidder to submit to the United States forest service bids for the construction of a highway to the Oregon caves in Josephine county, according to tabulations just made by forestry officials. The bid was \$118,862. The bid will be referred to the secretary of agriculture with a recommendation that it be accepted. The road will make the far-famed Oregon caves accessible to tourist travel.

BOULEVARD ACTION DEFERRED.—Final action on the offer of the Paving Loan Company, through Frank L. Shull, to deed to the county a right-of-way through a tract adjacent to Taylor street, between Boone's Ferry road, or extension of the boulevard, was deferred yesterday on motion of County Commissioner Hoyt. An estimate of the cost of survey has been asked. The road, if built, would be a link in the Portland-Cowwago route.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES TO DANCE.—The federal employees' union No. 1 will hold a dancing party for the members and their friends and relatives on the dance barge Swan Tuesday evening, July 12. Proceeds from the affair will be used to send delegates to the New Orleans convention in September. J. C. Grady, president of the union, is in charge of arrangements.

BUYERS' WEEK ATTRACTION.—Wide is the fame of the annual Buyers' week, held under the auspices of the Chambers of Commerce every recurring summer, and this time is spreading, as witness an inquiry received yesterday from a merchant in far-away North Carolina. He asked all the details about the event and announced he would be here to help celebrate it. Moreover, he will buy some of the things for which Oregon industries are known to be superior throughout the country. Last year there were representatives in attendance at the Buyers' week events from Texas and Kansas. The latest inquiry from Carolina indicates the fame of Portland's merchandising event has spread far to the east.

POSTER SEWER DELAYED.—Award of the contract for the construction of the first unit of the Foster road sewer was deferred by the city council on July 6, when the city council, sitting at the budget committee, will begin work on the compilation.

YOUTH STEALS LOGGERS' TROUSERS.—John McCredie, 70-year-old logger, who says he is the father of Walter McCredie, manager of the Portland baseball club, complained to the police yesterday that he had been robbed of \$100 in cash, a gold watch and a pair of trousers. The man whom he had befriended Tuesday night, he said he became acquainted with the youth and invited him to his room in the Raymond hotel. McCredie awoke yesterday morning he discovered the young man was missing, along with McCredie's trousers and valuables. He was compelled to borrow wearing apparel to get to the police station to report his loss.

CITY TO INVENT OR BUILD.—The city will fight the effort of the Southern Pacific to remove the warning bell at the Gibbs-street crossing in South Portland. City Attorney Grant yesterday was authorized by the council to appear before the public service commission on behalf of the city to oppose the granting of the application made by the Southern Pacific company for permission to remove this bell. The city officials contend that the bell is necessary to warn operators of fire apparatus of the presence of a high-voltage electric line.

STATUTORY CHANGE PASSES.—James Sydel was ordered held to the state grand jury under \$500 bonds on a statutory charge after a preliminary hearing before Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday. He is alleged to be the husband of Mrs. Marion Banister, mother of eight small children. Police attention was called to the case when an 11-year-old son of the woman went to the police station and told officers his mother was living with Sydel. Judge Rossman subjected Sydel to a bitter arraignment when the case came before him on preliminary hearing.

GIRL DIES OF BURNS.—Caroline Handland, 4-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert O. Handland, 383 1/2 San Rafael street, died yesterday at the Multnomah county hospital from burns received Tuesday when she stumbled into a tub of boiling water in the kitchen of her parents' home. Mrs. Handland was heating the water for the family washing when the little girl ran into the room and pitched headlong into the tub. She was frightfully burned. Deputy Sheriff Goetsch conducted an investigation and announced no inquest would be held.

THEFT OF ROBES CHARGED.—Everett Owens and Thomas Halt were arrested by the police late Tuesday in the alleged act of stealing robes from automobiles parked in front of the Broadway danchall, Broadway and Main street. The police say they caught the pair attempting to make a getaway with robes when they were called to the corner by the officers who became suspicious of the actions of the two.

ROOMMATE TAKES MONEY.—Harlan Hinch of Dilly, Or., learned to his sorrow yesterday that it is dangerous business to share a room with an unknown friend. Hinch played the good Samaritan some youth with out funds Tuesday night and permitted him to share a room at Sixth and Everett streets. When Hinch awoke yesterday he found his companion had gone after first picking his pockets of \$10.

COURT FEES ARE REPORTED.—Fines collected in the circuit court last month totalled \$520, according to the report of County Clerk Beveridge yesterday on his turnover of fees to the county treasurer. The major part of this sum was collected from gamblers. Circuit court-earned fees were \$285.90. Recording fees totalled \$4195.60. Fishing and hunting licenses brought in \$148.

NAVAL OFFICERS TO BE FETTERED.—Officers of the fleet of destroyers in Portland harbor will be fettered at luncheon tomorrow by the Chamber of Commerce. Fred W. Mulvey is head of the committee in charge of the function, and a real welcome will be given the nautical guests. Directors of the chamber yesterday arranged for the entertainment.

PORTLAND'S BUDGET TO BE CUT DEEPLY

Mayor and Council Agreed on Retrenchment Policy.

SERVICE TO BE CURTAILED

Executive Emphasizes Need for City to Live Within Means While Money Situation Is Tight.

Severe retrenchment in municipal expenditures, with deep slashes in many departments, will feature compilation of the 1922 municipal budget, said Mayor Baker yesterday, following a conference with members of the city council.

Budgets of the various municipal departments must be filed with City Auditor Funk on September 1 and shortly thereafter the city commissioners, sitting at the budget committee, will begin work on the compilation.

"Increasing taxes is the big problem everywhere," said Mayor Baker. "The people have been taxed to the point where they can stand it no more. Occupation taxes and additional taxes on various industries are not being adopted elsewhere. Federal taxes of various kinds have proved to be a drain on the finances of business everywhere."

"Real estate cannot stand higher taxes and so the only thing that remains is to curtail service, which the city council is ready to do. But in so doing, the citizens of Portland must be ready to accept these cuts in service."

"The council must take the position of the parent and insist that Portland live within its means. There is a constant demand for improvements of all kinds and increase in city service. But at least during the present financial depression and until such time as the people have found themselves, the city council is going to attempt honestly to expend the people's money, saving wherever the opportunity presents itself, even to the extent of curtailing some necessary service."

In Chicago, the finance committee last week of the city and county municipal budget, proudly announced that it would ask the taxpayers for only one per cent more money in 1922 than was asked in 1921.

Wants Must Be Laid Aside.—"This shows what the cities are up against. Large delegations of citizens come before the council and demand improvements. But under the retrenchment policy, which must be carried out faithfully, these must be laid aside until such time as the people can afford to pay for them."

The budget session is certain to be interesting under a retrenchment policy such as announced by Mayor Baker. Every department head feels that his recommendations are necessary and that the department cannot be operated for 1 cent less than has been asked.

People's Support Needed.—Mayor Baker said he felt that in most cases the departments are being operated as cheaply as is possible with the present service. "But cuts must be made and they will be made, so it will be up to the department heads to adjust themselves to the conditions and cut service accordingly," he said.

There are many things that would be nice to have and there are many things that we feel should be installed but these things must wait. The city of Portland is going to step through a real retrenchment policy, providing the people will support the council in such a campaign."

GRESHAM BERRIES ARRIVE

FIRST DAY OF PORTLAND SALE PROVES BIG SUCCESS.

Stocks Will Be Replenished Each Day to Meet Heavy Demand by City Housewives.

Five hundred crates of loganberries and raspberries were sold by noon yesterday on the public market by the Berry Growers' Co-Op, an association of Gresham, which started selling berries yesterday in Yamhill, between Front and First streets. The sale was not so brisk in the afternoon, since the truck with the supply of fruit for afternoon selling was delayed.

A plentiful supply of loganberries and raspberries will be on hand this morning, according to announcement. Loganberries are more in demand than raspberries at present, judging from yesterday's sales.

The berries are sold by the crate only and no deliveries are made. The prices, as established by Market Master Eastman are: Loganberries, \$1.15 a crate; Marlborough raspberries, \$1.25 a crate; Cuthbert raspberries, \$1.50 a crate.

Blackberries are expected to be placed on sale today and there will be blackberries in about ten days or two weeks. Some cherries are also being sold, but not many at the present time, since there is a sale for the cherries around Gresham.

The city council granted authority to the berry growers to utilize space on the public market.

EX-PARTNER STARTS SUIT.—L. C. Sims Wants Part of Profits of Real Estate Deal.

At the same time L. C. Sims was urging his partner to wind up the partnership and agree to a dissolution of the partnership, he filed a suit in the circuit court yesterday claiming a share of the profits of a real estate deal.

Keith asserted that he agreed to dissolve the partnership, but that on finding that his partner had made secret negotiations with the aim of securing a share of the profits, he demanded an accounting and payment of half the commission received. The Sims-Keith company was organized February 22, 1921, and dissolved June 17, 1921.

He said he would confer here with several men who have been suggested to him by the American steamship owners' association and the ship operators' association as possible heads of the division of operations.

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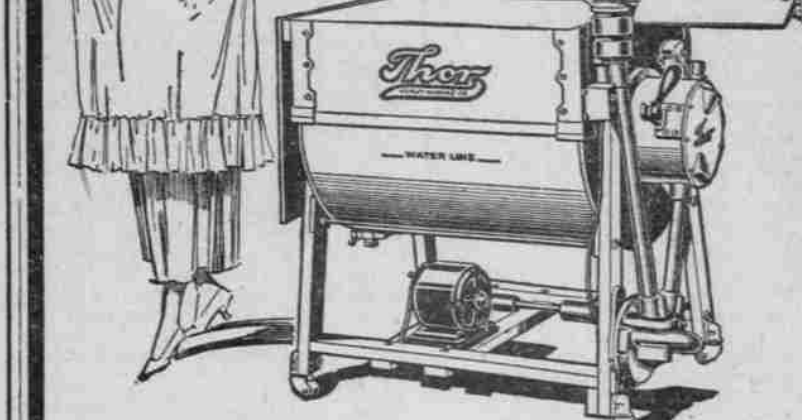
