

THOUSANDS GET AID AT HEALTH BUREAU

Government Relief Station Is Boon to War Veterans.

WORKERS' DUTIES MYRIAD

Artificial Limbs, Medical Attention and Care of Teeth Among Various Benefits Given Patients.

Medical relief was furnished 2983 ex-service men and women at the United States public health bureau in the Medical building here during the year ending June 30, according to a report of the bureau completed yesterday. The cases included everything from furnishing artificial limbs to those wounded in the service to the caring for soldiers who had been gassed, who contracted tuberculosis and who were sent to hospitals within the state and to California sanitariums.

Artificial limbs and appliances furnished totaled 125. These include arch supports and minor appliances. Discharged soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses have taken advantage of the treatment at the local offices, and in addition to the medical treatment a modern dental hospital has been installed, in which 415 patients have been examined and 169 cases treated since the opening of the office on May 1.

The ex-service men and women are treated under the war risk insurance and federal board of pension and compensation clauses, and require an examination by a board of physicians and the health officers of the bureau before the medical aid is furnished to the applicant.

Federal Workers Treated.

Not only the ex-service cases have been treated at the local office, however, as the total number of cases handled includes all branches of service for the government, such as civil service employees, seamen of the merchant marine and federal employees. In all 19 groups of employees there were 316 cases. Of this number 263 were surgical operations.

With the increase in shipping from and to Portland during the last year, there has also been a greater demand for quarantine procedures necessitated by the clearing of ships and for the procedures necessary at a port of entry. Port sanitary statements have been issued to 272 ships, 881 ships have received sanitary statements, seven ships have been fumigated before entering the port and 48 aliens have been examined by the local office, with 23 being certified.

Sanitary Inspection Urged.

Routine sanitary inspection along the waterfront here is being urged by the bureau, and the health officer is being held necessary. The problem along the waterfront caused by the high water in the food periods is believed to be sufficient reason for this inspection. At present there is no sampling of these rats for the presence of the pest, with the oriental and South American connections with the port and the lack of inspection of the bureau. He believes that inadequate protection against plague is now in force.

Every effort will be made by the bureau to install the proper protection and the matter has already been taken up with the various business men's organizations by the officials of the local bureau.

Dr. N. E. Wayson is the medical officer in charge of the local office of the bureau, which includes a personnel of two regular commissioned medical officers, one reserve medical officer, four nurses, one dental surgeon, two acting assistant dental surgeons, nine attending specialists, one nurse, one pharmacist, one chief clerk, one compensation clerk, one dental mechanic and nine sub clerks.

MRS. EDELMAN CLEARED

Tangled Marital Skin Features Trial for Embezzlement.

Tangled marital relations were a feature of the hearing of Mrs. Zola Edelman, charged with larceny by bailor of some furniture, before District Judge Deich yesterday afternoon. The case against her was dismissed, the judge not considering evidence strong enough to warrant holding her to answer to the grand jury.

Mrs. Alice M. Barrett, complaining witness, testified that she had lived in the same house with George F. Newbain, and that when Newbain married Mrs. Edelman he assigned his interest in some furniture to Mrs. Barrett. The marriage was of short duration. Testimony was that Mrs. Edelman had made seven matrimonial ventures and that Newbain obtained an annulment on the ground that the marriage to him was before the legal limit of six months had intervened between that time and her divorce from a preceding husband.

The Newbain used the furniture which Mrs. Barrett asserted an interest in was sold at the complaining witness charged that Mrs. Edelman sold some of the articles. Substantiation of the charges was not sufficient to satisfy Judge Deich.
