OUTSIDE AUTO TRAVEL HEAVY.—A total of 763 machines from various other than Oregon (Washington) passed over the Interstate bridge going north in the month of June, according to the statistics of the bridge, to Campbells, superintendent of the bridge, to Rufus C. Holman, chairman of the board of county commissioners. The cars passing south numbered 486. The largest representation was from California, with 603 cars from that state passing north and 381 south over the bridge. Idaho was second with 37 cars going north and Colorado, third with 23 machines going in that direction. Twenty states are represented, as well as the District of Columbia, British Columbia, Honolulu and Mexico.

MAN IN ATTACK BROTHER.—Jones Hannula was ordered held to the grand jury by Judge Rossman on charge of assaulting H. Engle with a dangerous weapon. Engle, who is the landlord of the Jackson apartments, 514 Union avenue north, sustained several knife wounds in the left shoulder late Tuesday during a fight with the man. Through his attempts to stop a noisy party in an apartment occupied by Edna Hope, he identified Hannula as the man who attacked him. Miss Hope was arrested on charges of being drunk and disorderly, but received her freedom when the case was heard by Judge Rossman. Engle was not seriously injured.

ROAD TO RESORTS IS FAIR.—That the road to Arrah Wana, Rhododendron and other points on the south slope of Mount Hood is in fair condition and may be easily traveled by automobile is the statement of J. L. Bowman, manager of the Brownville Wagon Mills, who has a home at Arrah Wana and makes frequent trips to that point. A report that the road is impassable beyond Sandy on account of construction work is incorrect, Mr. Bowman said. WORKMAN'S CONDITION CRITICAL.—Attendees at St. Vincent's hospital reported yesterday that the condition of Virgil de Vietor, steel worker, who was injured Tuesday when a scaffold at the plant of the Portland Vegetable Oil mill fell, was still critical and there was doubt whether he would survive. His back is believed to be broken. The other four men who also fell were reported to be out of danger.

FIREMAN SUED FOR \$10,000.—Thomas Jennie filed a complaint yesterday against James C. Davis, director-general of railroads and the O. W. R. & N. Co. for \$10,000 damages. He claims that when he was a fireman on a locomotive of the railroad company, he was badly burned about the face, eyes and hands by a boiler which exploded. He said he lost his right eye as the result of the accident, which occurred August 1, 1919.

DRIVER FINE \$50.—Lyle E. Jones, 19 years old, was fined \$50 in police court yesterday for passing a street car while it was discharging passengers. Testimony showed he had struck a young woman, inflicting slight injuries. Jones told the court that he was driving a motor car and did not understand that the accident was due to that fact and not because he was driving a street car.

ALL CITY WILL BID WELCOME TO ELKS

Mayor Names Committee to Help Portland Lodgemen.

VISITORS TO SEE SIGHTS
 1000 Members of Antlered Herd to Stop Here on Way to Convention at Los Angeles.

All Portland is planning to get behind Portland lodges of Elks to entertain the 1000 visiting Elks who will stop for one or two days on their way home from the Los Angeles convention.

Mayor Baker yesterday appointed A. L. Tett, president of the Oregon State Motor association, to act as general chairman of a committee to assist Fred G. Wagner, who heads the Elks committee. Other members of the committee appointed by Mayor Baker include H. J. Ottenheimer of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, Marshall N. Dana of the President's council, Captain Jacob Speier and Mrs. George L. Williams, representing the women's automobile auxiliary.

Automobiles in Demand.
 Harry G. Allen, past exalted ruler of the Portland lodge and past president of the Oregon State Elks association, has been placed in charge of obtaining automobiles to carry the thousand or more Elks over the Columbia river highway. The committee faces a difficult problem, for unless the automobile owners immediately register their cars by telephoning to the Elks club, it will be hard to complete plans.

Wednesday, July 20 will be the big day for Elks from everywhere. They will roll into the city in their special trains. They will be accompanied by their bands and drill teams and Portland will take on the atmosphere of a convention city on that day.

A large number will be in the city on Tuesday and messages have been received stating that some delegations will be in Portland on Thursday. As most of the Elks will arrive Wednesday the task of handling is exceedingly difficult. For that reason Mayor Baker decided to give Portland lodge some assistance.

Visitors to Go Sight-Seeing.
 The official "bulletin board" at Elks' club shows that on Sunday the Portland Elks will arrive on Monday the West Virginia boys will come and on Tuesday representatives from more than 100 lodges of the New England states will arrive.

On Wednesday the St. Paul, Brooklyn, New York, Jersey, New Orleans and New Haven Elks will reach the city. On Thursday and Friday other delegations will come.

"We are facing a big task," said Chairman Tett. "All of these people have heard of the Columbia River highway and will want to see it. And, in addition, we should show all of them something of our city."

Elks are in need of cars and we are appealing to all automobile owners in the city to telephone to the Elks club, Broadway 145, and register their cars for service. We will not ask for the use of a car for more than one day, and we are asking that the owners tell the clerk what day they choose to aid us.

The programme for Wednesday includes a trip over the highway and through the city and an evening's entertainment at Laurelhurst park.
