LAME DUCKS HONOR LEADER.—Fred M. Leaton-Smith, vice-president and manager of W. C. Garbe company, was the recipient of a beautifully bound volume containing Allen's "As a Man Thinketh," presented by the class of the Ancient and Accepted Order of Lame Ducks at a meeting held last night in the rose room of the Benson hotel. Mr. Leaton-Smith has been the leader of the class for the last 12 weeks and his presentation was in appreciation of his work. The Ancient and Accepted Order of Lame Ducks, which has been in existence for the last three years and is organized primarily to assist members in developing their latent talents. It now has a membership of about 150.

WRIGHT'S TRIAL POSTPONED.—Municipal Judge Robinson yesterday postponed the trial of Fred Wright, Hubbard berry grower, for an indefinite period. Wright is charged with four violations, among them that of selling food unfit for public consumption at the market. Wright, who is a nervous breakdown and his physician submitted an affidavit stating he was unable to undergo the stress of a trial. Judge Robinson said his observation of Wright substantiated the statement and postponed the trial. It will probably be several weeks before it can be resumed.

STILL AND BARBER ARE TAKEN.—Roy Louka, 1183 Berkeley way, was arrested on a charge of violation of the prohibition law yesterday after Deputy Sheriff Christofersen, Schirmer and Beckman, who searched Louka's residence with a search warrant. A common tea kettle harnessed to a yard of garden hose with suitable apparatus for the purpose of distilling the still, a quart of finished product and about 25 gallons of mash. Louka was placed under arrest at his place of business.

LAD IS POISONED.—Richard Kimmel, 2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Kimmel of Park Drive, was seriously poisoned last Tuesday by drinking gasoline, but is now expected to recover. The little boy escaped the vigilance of his parents for a few moments, and ran into the garage. The attention of the elder Kimmels was attracted when they heard their son strangled. Dr. C. H. Atwood was summoned and succeeded in averting an immediate death by poisoning, though pneumonia is reported to have set in and the lad is not yet out of danger.

UNLICENSED PRACTITIONER FINED.—A. Grone, masseur, who was arrested July 14, on charges of giving chiropractic treatments without a state license, was fined \$50 when he appeared before Circuit Judge Hawkins. The complaint stated that Grone gave "one R. C. Ellsworth chiropractic adjustment of the neck using the chiropractic thrust." The case is the second within the past few days in which chiropractic practice without a license has been involved.

THREE SUSPECTS ARRESTED.—Two men and a woman arrested yesterday by Detectives Maloney and Shulpi are believed to be swindlers. They were taken into custody before they had a chance to try their art on Portland citizens. A. J. Price, one of the men, had been observed hanging around the Union station for several days. He is 24 years old and a salesman by occupation. Yesterday afternoon he met Dean Gage at a train and the watching detectives recognized the latter from a picture sent to Portland from Los Angeles. In that city Gage, when arrested, gave his name as Harry Hudson, according to the detectives. Gage is 25 years old and a jeweler. He was also arrested and the three were placed under vagrancy charges.

DEATH MAIN ACT SUSPECTED.—Death from suffocation was the verdict following the autopsy of Roy Kimball, 30 years old, who was found dead in his bed at the Pine-street apartments, 207½ Pine street, yesterday afternoon. Examination showed that Kimball had been dead two days from suffocation as the result of an epileptic fit while he was asleep. Alexander Hay, proprietor of the place, had not seen Kimball for two days and opened his room with a pass key, where he found him lying face down on the bed. He notified the police and Leo Gotsch, chief deputy coroner, was called. The body was taken to the morgue. Kimball was a baker.

WRECKING CONTRACTS LET.—Contracts have been awarded for the removal of the standpipes on East Fifteenth and West Main streets to the St. Johns district. The contract was given to LeDoux & LeDoux, a contractor which will handle the work. A subcontract has been given to the Portland Boiler Works for the dismantling of the tank, and the removal and erection of the second largest tank west of Chicago.

SALEM MINISTER FACES MARRIAGE ACT.—Rev. Fred Royston, a Salem preacher, was brought to Portland yesterday afternoon by a deputy United States marshal and placed in the Multnomah county jail on a charge of violating the marriage act. Royston is a young man, June 26, and the couple were arrested the following Thursday in the state of Washington and returned to Salem. Mr. Royston was out on bail in his home town when Hall Lusk, assistant United States district attorney, filed a complaint against him, charging violation of the white slave act.

SEARCH FOR BURGLAR CONTINUED.—Deputy Sheriff Christofersen continued the search for the burglar who twice shot H. W. Collins, 65 years old, when he was surprised in the act of robbing the Collins home late Thursday afternoon. The description of the man, who is said to be 5 feet 6 inches tall, with a high forehead, a thin mustache, a gray suit and cap, has been sent to surrounding points. Late yesterday afternoon he had not been captured. Mr. Collins is in St. Vincent's hospital where it is said his condition was improving slightly.

STREET WIDENING POSTPONED.—More than 20 property owners have presented protests to the city council against the proposed widening of the street between East Sixteenth and East Twenty-fifth streets. The remonstrants assert that the widening of the street would not be beneficial to their property and would require the laying of new pavement and the moving of buildings that have been erected with the consent of the city. The protest will be referred to Commissioner Barbur for investigation.

WARRANT ISSUED FOR C. H. THOMAS.—C. H. Thomas failed to appear in the federal court yesterday for trial on a charge of sending obscene matter through the mails, and Federal Judge Wolverton issued a bench warrant for his arrest. When arrested he was held in custody for a few days on promise to report daily to his attorneys, T. G. Ryan and Joseph Carson. The lawyers, in court, said that he had faithfully observed this promise, until Thursday. Officers believe that Thomas has left the city with his wife and two children.

STRAND THEATER SUE.—Damages amounting to \$800 are sought by the Goldenway Distributing corporation, a moving picture concern, in a suit filed in circuit court yesterday against the Strand Theater company. The complaint alleges that a picture film submitted to the company for inspection was run to a paid admission audience before formal agreement had been entered into for the use of the film for display purposes.

LAST DAY OF TAX FILING JULY 31.—July 31 is the last day for filing returns of capital stock taxes, the office of collector of internal revenue has announced. Blank forms are available at 210 customs-house and at branch offices at Eugene and Pendleton. The capital stock tax is \$1 on each \$1000 of value of capital stock in excess of \$5000.

GEORGE J. CAMERON, EX-JUDGE, ILL.—George J. Cameron, ex-municipal judge, is very low at his home and his condition is said to be serious. Judge Cameron, one of the best-known citizens of Portland, and who has a state-wide acquaintance, is suffering from Bright's disease. He has been steadily growing weaker for some time.

BUILDERS' DAY TODAY.—The builders' exchange of Portland will hold a "Builders' day" picnic at Bonneville today. The weather at Bonneville should be ideal for a picnic, according to a telegram received last night by O. G. Hughson, manager of the exchange, from weather prophets at Bonneville.

MRS. JOHN MILLER, PIONEER, LOW.—Mrs. John Miller, pioneer of 1852, is in a serious condition at her home in Jacksonville, Or. Mrs. Miller is the mother of Mrs. K. K. Kubli of Portland. Members of Mrs. Miller's family have been summoned from Oregon and California points. She is about 82 years old.

EVANS BOUND OVER.—Robbie Evans, fight promoter, yesterday waived his preliminary hearing on a charge of larceny of a diamond ring and was bound over to the grand jury with bond fixed at \$250. Bert Hughes, fighter, failed to appear at the hearing and forfeited his bond.

CLARK'S TRAVELERS.—John A. Zehnbauser, president of the Jantion Knitting mills, left Portland yesterday for the east, where he will visit the principal markets for bathing suits, the leading product of his Portland factory.

ALASKA SOCIETY OF OYAS PICNIC.—The Alaska society of Oyas will hold a picnic at Gladstone at 6 P. M. today. Coffee will be furnished and tables have been secured for members of the society and their friends.

PHONE RATE DATA MAY BE READ HERE

Portion of Rehearing in Portland Is in Prospect.

FACTS ARE NEARLY READY

Public Service Secretary Urges All Interests to Be Fully Prepared for Session July 18.

A portion of the rehearing of the telephone rate case may be held in Portland, according to advice received yesterday by City Attorney Grant from William P. Ellis, secretary of the public service commission. The resolutions declared that the commission will expect all interested parties, including the city of Portland, to be fully prepared to present their cases at Salem beginning July 18.

The letter received yesterday is in reply to a communication forwarded to Salem by City Attorney Grant a number of days ago when he urged that the hearing be held in the city of Portland, rather than in Salem.

Preparation Is Advised. The city attorney called attention to the fact that if the entire rehearing is held in Salem, it would be difficult for the city to summon many of the witnesses that could be called to the stand if the hearing were held in Portland.

Secretary Ellis of the commission stated that Chairman Williams was now in California attending important conferences relating to problems in which the commission is concerned. In the absence of the chairman, Secretary Ellis said that he intended to make any definite decision. "However," he wrote, "the commission expects that all interested parties, including the city of Portland, will be fully prepared to present their cases at the time and place set."

When he became state superintendent, the resolutions passed by his genius for organization at once told in placing the department on a basis which won recognition from the nation's educators and Oregon began to function educationally as it had never done before.

While the promise of a continuation of the case to Portland is rather vague, it is satisfactory to the city officials, who feel confident that the commission will consent to a continuance in Portland.

EX-SOLDIER IS SET FREE

Charge of Attack on Four-Year-Old Girl Is Dropped.

Charges against Philip Burg, world war veteran, accused of an attack on a four-year-old girl, were dropped following a hearing before Justice of the Peace Brown of Gresham yesterday. Evidence was not sufficient to support the charge, according to Deputy District Attorney Pierce, who conducted the hearing for the state.

Francis Johnson, father of the little girl involved, attempted to lay hands on Burg following the hearing. Johnson's first accusation of Burg resulted in an exchange of blows in which Johnson blackened Burg's eye with his fist and Burg returned the compliment with a frying pan. Burg returned to his home in Portland after the trouble but voluntarily gave himself up to Sheriff Hurlbut when he learned that he was sought for a crime.

The square deal is the big factor which will bring about peace between labor and capital, according to E. B. Fish, Chautauqua lecturer, who spoke at the luncheon of the City club at the Benson hotel yesterday noon. Mr. Fish scored both the red laborer and the red capitalist as un-American. Mr. Fish also made an appeal for the banishing of the hyphen in American life.

"The time has come when good, old-fashioned, plain American is good enough," he declared. He expressed the belief that the stand taken by the American Federation of Labor at the recent convention in Denver had "put the hooks into the reds."

The speaker denounced the employee who was not willing to let the doctrine of brotherhood be his bereavement.
