As a forerunner of the large contingent of "Bills" to be here today, delegations from the stern and rock-bound coast of New England and breezy Wisconsin spent yesterday morning in Oregon sunshine and enjoying a programme of entertainment mapped out by Fred W. Wagner, chairman of the entertainment committee, and his helpers from the ranks of local Elks and citizen volunteers. The New Englanders, 86 strong, were met at the Union station by a reception committee and taken to the Multnomah hotel for breakfast. Then came a trip over the Columbia river highway, shopping tours for the women, city sightseeing trips and theater parties. Twenty-two motor cars left at 7:10 P. M. for Yellowstone Park, and the rest entrained for the north at 11:45 P. M. Leading the New England party were two grand lodge officers, James F. Duffy, grand exalted ruler, and C. F. J. McCue, grand secretary.

FOUR JAPANESE ACCUSED

Oriental Charged With Being in United States Illegally.

Complaints against four Japanese immigrants, Shiro Iwase, Kenjiro Tani, Gokichi Yamashiro and Hanjiro Miki, will be filed in federal court this morning by Hall Lusk, assistant United States attorney, charging them with being in the United States illegally at the termination of a voyage between Japan and the United States.

Penalties for this offense are severe, being fixed by a war measure at a maximum of 10 years imprisonment and \$10,000 fine. The accused Japanese are said to have landed here by Vancouver, B. C., on the Japanese steamer Port Said Maru, on June 21. The master of the vessel pleaded guilty to the charge of bringing orientals into this country illegally and was fined \$1200.

MANY DODGE POLL TAX

Clarke County Sheriff Prepares to Seize Personal Property.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—The list of those who failed to pay the poll tax in Clarke county included a number of well-known persons in Vancouver and throughout the county. The tax must be paid at once or the sheriff will

seize their personal property to satisfy the tax.

Since the list was turned over the sheriff at the beginning of the week not a single person has paid though the list includes one or two employees of the city government and at least one of the city.

Under the law the sheriff has the power to get the tax by garnishment of the delinquent's wages or salary. Most of the delinquents are married women.

A dollar of each \$5 poll tax goes into the county fund so that the county officials are anxious that people pay the tax without the county having to use up all its profit from the tax in attempting to collect the remainder of it.

BROTHER DEMANDS GIRL

Authority of Court in Case of Alice Carpenter Challenged.

Complaint that the court of domestic relations has acted without legal authority in the case of Alice Carpenter, ordering that she be committed to the feeble-minded institute at Salem and also sterilized without due process of law was made in a habeas corpus proceeding instituted in the circuit court yesterday by the girl's brother, Frank J. is more than 18 years of age and is not properly under jurisdiction of the court of domestic relations and that the court has refused his offer to care for the young woman, who, he contends, is not feeble-minded.

The charge was made that Lewis D. Carpenter, father of the girl, was responsible for the action in an effort to escape his parental obligation to support his daughter. The brother asserted that two younger children have been placed in private institutions and the girl is being kept in a pension by the father, who is earning a good salary in the employ of a laundry.

The girl now is at the Fraser home, charged with sex delinquency.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—Clarence O. Gilbert, 29, and Margaret O'Brien were re-married today. The couple were first married on board the United States ship San Diego, which was in drydock at Portsmouth, N. H.

This was in April, 1918, and a few weeks later the ship was sunk. All records went down with it, so Gilbert and his bride had nothing to show that they were married. They decided that they wanted it on the records and so the ceremony was performed for a second time.

Both are residents of Ridgefield, Gilbert being in the service at the time of the first marriage.

SCHOOL PUPILS INCREASE

Three Counties File Annual Reports With Superintendent.

SALEM, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—The total enrollment of the schools for Sherman county this year was 113, and for Clatsop county 107. The state superintendent of public instruction by the county superintendent.

The enrollment for this year in Columbia county was 2132, compared with 2058 for last year. Despite this increase the schools this year were conducted with 18 teachers less than employed last year.

Approximately 850 pupils were enrolled in the schools of Lake county this year. There were 69 teachers employed.

VOLUNTEERS MAKE CREW

RELIEF SHIP TO TOW AMUNDSEN'S VESSEL FILLED.

Norwegian Parliament Is Thanked for Appropriation for Captain to Go Exploring.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—Enough applications have been received to provide a full crew for the relief ship to be sent to Dutch Harbor to tow the Amundsen exploration ship Maud to Seattle, the men volunteering in the service without cost. It was announced today by H. H. Hammond of the Universal Shipping Trading company, agent for Captain Roald Amundsen, the world-famous explorer.

Most of the volunteers were American-born. They include able-bodied seamen, cooks, stewards, firemen, oilers and water-tenders. A full engine room crew totaling 100 men will serve without pay in the interest of science and also because of the lure of adventure.

Deck and engine room officers, it was expected today, will now come forward and accept their assignments. Request for their services was held back until a full crew had been ascertained.

The Maud was towed by the coast guard cutter Bear from the Arctic ocean to Bering sea and is now sailing southward. The probability will be met by the coast guard cutter Unalga and towed to Dutch Harbor.

Captain Amundsen today expressed his appreciation of the action of Norway's parliament, which a few days ago voted \$100,000 kroner to continue his Arctic voyage next summer.

He had asked for only 300,000, said Captain Amundsen. "I am touched by the tribute of my countrymen. I am informed, too, that the vote was unanimous and will be repeated in such appropriations."

Captain Amundsen had been bedeviled with offers of aid from every source. The presidents of the telegraphers' and seamen's unions, he recounted, had offered to furnish him with such public relations as he needed. He added that he expected, through his Seattle agent, the Universal Shipping Trading company, to obtain from coast ports an Alaska cargo which would help defray the expenses of the trip after the Maud.

HOST OF WOMEN WORKING

Eight Millions Declared Engaged in Gainful Occupations.

CLEVELAND, O., July 19.—There are 8,000,000 women in the United States in gainful occupations, Dr. Aurelia Henry Reinhardt, president of Mills college, Oakland, Cal., told the 300 delegates and women at the national convention of the national federation of business and professional women's clubs in Cleveland today.

Fifty per cent of the women are teachers, Dr. Reinhardt said, while 10 per cent occupy secretarial positions. Sixteen hundred women have graduated in law.

Lena Lake Forrest of Detroit, national president in her annual address, pleaded for a better education for business women, sane thinking on the problem of the commercial woman, intelligent citizenship and a full acceptance of the responsibilities of equal suffrage.

PULP MILL WINS CASE

Rate Reparations Offered by Interstate Commission.

THE OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, D. C., July 19.—Reparations in six separate items, aggregating \$244,126, was ordered by the interstate commerce commission by the Willamette Navigation company and a score or more of railroads to the Crown Willamette Paper company.

The award was made on account of unreasonable charges for hauling pulp from Linn, Or., to Boston and New York.

Spokane Murder Victim Buried.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 19.—Funeral services for Lee Slater, taxicab driver, said to have been murdered by unidentified assailants, were held here today. No inquest was held. Dr. J. H. Baker, county coroner, stated that facts seemed to establish that Slater was murdered. No clues were reported by the police.

Two men arrested last week were believed by authorities to have an indirect connection with the murder. Patterson was charged with bootlegging and his companion, Sam Myers, was held as a witness.

CAMPBELL SAYS CHARGE LIE

Major Under Orders to Proceed to Washington for Hearings.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 19.—Major Bruce Campbell, director of education at the Camp Pike college and formerly counsel for prisoners of war at Governor's Island, New York, described statements by Mrs. Emma Bergdall at Washington today as a "lie out of the whole cloth." Major Campbell is under orders to proceed to Washington in connection with the committee hearings.

Discussing Mrs. Bergdall's assertion that he had demanded \$100,000, Major Campbell declared:

"I never had such a conversation with Mrs. Bergdall or her son. I was counsel for Grover Bergdall when he was tried before a court-martial by following his conviction I had nothing further to do with his case."

"My connection with his case did not come about through any activity on my part. I was assigned as counsel to defend prisoners of war and automatically became his counsel when he was called for trial."

SEA WORKERS HAVE PLAN

Gentlemen's Agreement Embodies 15 Per Cent Pay Cut.

NEW YORK, July 19.—A gentlemen's agreement, embodying a 15 per cent reduction in standard wage time pay for deck officers of Ameri-

can ships and permitting masters to make their own contracts with ship owners, was formulated today by organizations of deck officers and the American Steamship Owners' association.

The new agreement, subscribed to by representatives of the shipping board, will be effective August 1, and will take the place of a signed agreement which expires on that date. Changes in working rules aboard ship were also provided to conform to pre-war conditions.

The agreement brought to an end conferences with all branches of steamship employees. Negotiations with engineers, firemen and sailors resulted in a strike last May and ended five weeks later, when officials of the unions and the shipping board signed a six months' contract at Washington. This contract was accepted by the men under protest and they returned to work.

Southwestern Cows Do Better.

SOUTH BEND, Wash., July 19.—(Special.)—The report of the Southern Washington Cow Testing association comprising the south half of Pacific county, released that 291 cows gave an average of 697 pounds of milk last month, an increase of 50 pounds for each cow over a year ago and an increase of 2.5 pounds more butter fat for each cow. There were 47 cows producing more than 40 pounds of butter fat for the month. The increase was due to the weeding out of "boarders" among the cows and the introduction of more pure bred stock.
