POWER HEARING ANNOUNCED.—The district forester of the United States forest service office here will hold a public hearing on applications for waterpower developments at Spirit Lake and Toutle river, Skamania and Cowlitz counties, and at Merrill lake and Lewis river, Cowlitz county, Washington, Friday, August 5. The hearing has been arranged pursuant to a request of the federal power commission, applications having been filed with the commission for development of power at these places. The Spirit Lake Railway & Power company of Vancouver, Wash., has filed application for development at Spirit Lake and Toutle river, and C. L. Kephart of Washington, D. C., has filed application for development of water power at Spirit Lake and Toutle river and also at Merrill lake and Lewis river.

PETITION FILED FOR REHEARING.—City Attorney Grant filed a petition yesterday with the supreme court for a rehearing in the case of the city against Dr. Paul C. Yates, over the matter of a sign at the doctor's office, in Sixth street near Washington. Mr. Grant is attempting to reopen a case that has been particularly obnoxious to the city officials in their attempt to enforce an ordinance affecting street signs. Dr. Yates resented the efforts of the council on petition of business men several months ago to compel him to take down an office sign which he had erected. Legal procedure was resorted to and Dr. Yates was defeated in the circuit court. He appealed to the supreme court which reversed the decision of the lower court.

ADVERTISING AGENCY CHANGES NAME.—By recent action of the board of directors, the corporate name of Botsford, Constantine & Tyler, advertising agency, Portland and Seattle, has been changed to Botsford-Constantine company. The interests of P. S. Tyler were purchased in January by C. P. Constantine and David M. Botsford. It is announced that the change of name indicates no change at this time in the clientele or management of the company. The officers are: C. P. Constantine, president; David M. Botsford, vice-president; H. R. Failing, secretary and treasurer.

The will filed in the circuit court yesterday by her sister, Nellie Lambert, who will appoints Miss Nellie Lambert executrix of the will and names her as principal heir. The only other heirs are the following brothers and sisters, bequeathed \$100 each: Albert Lambert, Henry Lambert, Carrie White, Mary Graham, Elizabeth Wood and Lucie Woodward.

CHILD HURT AT PLAY.—A crowd of children playing on a sliding chute at Laurelhurst playground yesterday afternoon resulted in Phillip Durham, 2 years old and son of Darr H. Durham, 225 E. 5th street, street, breaking both wrists. The children were crowding up the ladder and sliding down the chute as fast as they could. The injured boy had gained the top and in his excitement slipped and fell to the ground. He was taken to Good Samaritan hospital where the fractured bones were set.

HABEAS CORPUS ASKED.—Because of his immediate rearrest by Sheriff Hurlburt on a telegraphic warrant from Seattle, following a parole on a local forgery charge, Louis Zukerman filed habeas corpus proceedings in the circuit court yesterday. On July 18 he pleaded guilty to a forgery indictment, was sentenced to two years and paroled. He contends that his rearrest has been without due process of law. Return on the writ will be heard by Judge Tagwell Thursday morning.

FORCED LANDING OF SEAPLANE MADE SAFE.—Archie Roth, pilot of a seaplane bound for Astoria and Seaside, was compelled to make a forced landing in the Columbia river, near St. Helens yesterday afternoon because of motor trouble. Roth had no difficulty in piloting the plane from a high altitude to the water. The plane was towed back to Portland, arriving at the basin of the Oregon-Washington seaplane company early last night. The plane was undamaged.

CLYDE ATTACHED BETTER.—Clyde B. Hutchison, a member of the interstate commerce commission and ex-member of the Oregon public service commission, was sufficiently improved in health as to be up and around yesterday. He is at the Multnomah hotel, where he registered upon his arrival in Portland last Saturday night. He was ill with a cold for a few days. He is on the coast on official business. He will go to Seattle today or tomorrow and will return here later.

YOUNG FORGER IS PAROLED.—A. B. Chance, whose dreams of high finance included the forgery of the names of Julius L. Meier and others to a purported world's fair contract, was paroled by Circuit Judge Tagwell yesterday afternoon after sentence to two years in the penitentiary. He pleaded guilty. The district attorney did not oppose a parole, as the young man actually received only \$2.50 from two victims and arrangements had been made to put him to work on his father's farm near Salem.

HORN MAY EXONERATED.—Kenneth Fraser, United States commissioner, yesterday dismissed the charge of having illegal possession of intoxicants that had been lodged against A. O. Gross, proprietor of the Mount Hood hotel. It had been alleged that Mr. Gross had six quarts of moonshine whiskey in his possession. This quantity of liquor had been found in the rooms of the hotel, it was alleged, but Commissioner Fraser decided the evidence was insufficient to connect it with the defendant. **FINANCES CONSIDERED.**—Financing of the 1925 exposition was the subject considered yesterday by the finance committee, which met with Julius L. Meier, president. However, nothing definite was accomplished and adjournment was taken until tomorrow at 2:30 P. M. when detailed plans for raising the needed funds will be considered. When the finance committee completes its work a report will be made to the exposition committee.

BUSINESS MEN TO MEET.—Another big programme is in store for the Progressive Business Men's club when it meets tomorrow at the Benson hotel, when Tom Skelly, friend from Lenin's land, will tell the Portland business man of conditions in Russia. Skelly, a noted baritone and member of the club, will receive a rousing reception in the nature of a home-coming event.

FORGER GETS TWO YEARS.—Philip Hund, forger, whose bad checks numbered 10 and called for \$190, pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge Tagwell yesterday afternoon and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. He said that he had a wife and six children in Idaho, but there was no evidence that he had sent any of the money obtained on the bad checks to assist in their support.

WORKMAN FALLS FROM SCAFFOLD.—L. Jensen, 41 years old, of 925 Kerby street, sustained severe injuries to his back and a fractured arm when he fell from a scaffold while at work at the plant of the Hurley-Mason company yesterday afternoon. He was removed to Good Samaritan hospital. He is expected to recover.

FOUR AND FIVE MEN CONVICTED.—Four and five men were convicted yesterday in the circuit court by Judge Tagwell. The jury found that the defendants were: Laura against Albert G. Smith, Arthur against Allen Fortin, Allen J. against Martha Taylor and James against Karl Wemborg.

MORRISON AT FOURTH

EX-SOLDIER IS SUICIDE

RAY D. ELLIS, SON OF LOCAL GROCER, HANGS HIMSELF.

Mind Said to Have Been Affected by Shell Shock Received at Front in France.

Ray D. Ellis, an overseas veteran, 39 years old, committed suicide by hanging in a room at the Rosamond hotel, 57 1/2 Third street, some time Monday night. His lifeless body was found shortly after noon yesterday by Police Sergeant Young, who broke through the door of the room when the Japanese proprietor of the place was unable to arouse the young man.

Ellis is believed to have been mentally unbalanced as a result of shell shock received on the western front in France. He had been discharged Monday morning from a government hospital at Camp Lewis, where he had been undergoing treatment for several months. Papers found in his possession showed he had been a member of company B, 27th engineers, and had served overseas for about two years. The ex-soldier is survived by his widow, living at Harrisburg, and his father, G. Ellis, who is a grocer at 400 Third street, this city.

Ellis, according to the hotel management, arrived there late Monday night and rented a room. Nothing was seen of him after that. When he failed to answer a call at noon yesterday the management summoned the police. The young man had torn a sheet from his bed and made it into a rope and had tied it to the foot of the bed. The physicians said he had been dead several hours.

The body was removed to the morgue awaiting funeral arrangements.

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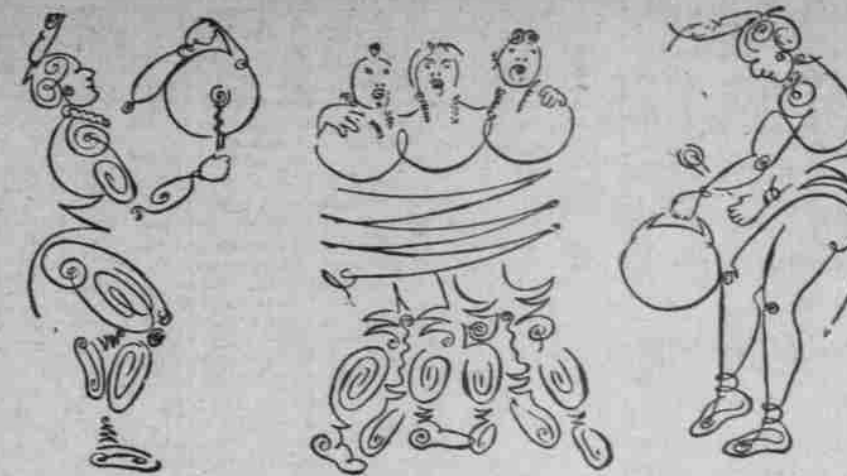
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THE CONQUEST
