JAPANESE FACE TRIAL

Charges that they are illegally in the United States have been filed against five Japanese by Hall Lusk, assistant United States attorney. They were arrested in Portland when they were getting away from the steamer Fort Said Maru, June 21. The captain of the steamer was fined \$1500 for bringing the men here. The five defendants are said to have stowed away in the coal bunkers and subsisted on fried fish and water during the 23 days they were at sea. The Japanese will be deported, but first they are to be tried for being illegally in the United States. The maximum punishment for this offense is imprisonment for 20 years.

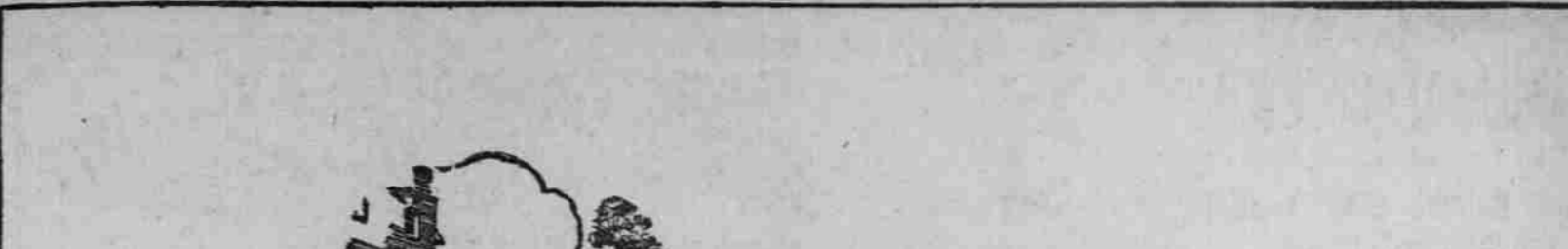
