PLAYGROUND SAFETY SOUGHT.—The safety first move is to be inaugurated in the Portland playgrounds early next week with administrative officers selected from the children on the playgrounds. H. H. Herdman and H. P. Coffin of the national safety council are introducing the safety work with the co-operation of C. P. Keyser, park and playground director. Plaques and accident charts will be posted and committees from each playground selected to teach care in the use of the playground apparatus. The playgrounds will compete for accident records among themselves. Frequent minor injuries and occasional broken bones result from careless or reckless acts on the part of children on the playgrounds.

WILLAMETTE ALUMNI TO ENTERTAIN.—Former students of Willamette university now living in Portland are planning to entertain under the auspices of the Portland Willamette University club with a launch ride down the river Monday night. The launch Dix which has been chartered for the occasion will leave the foot of west Morrison street at 6 o'clock Monday evening and the return will be made about 10 o'clock. Between 50 and 75 former students of the school are planning to participate. The committee in charge is composed of Miss Ethel Caspere, Paul Irvine and Miss Edith Lewis.

SUIT FOR \$10,000 FILED.—Alleged injuries to a finger that cut short his usefulness as a baseball player, sustained while he was employed by the Northwest Steel company, formed the basis of a suit for \$10,000 brought against that concern by D. T. McBride, trial of which was begun before Federal Judge Bean yesterday. While working on a newly-launched vessel at the Northwest yards in October, 1913, the plaintiff alleged, he sustained an injury that prevented him thereafter obtaining positions as a baseball player, formerly one of his gainful occupations, in minor industrial leagues of the city.

SCHOOL DIRECTORS DROP 3-MILL LEVY

Economy Knife Is Wielded to Reduce Expenses.

WATCHMEN'S PAY IS CUT

Clerk Thomas Startles Members Into Increasing His Bond as Custodian of Treasure.

The school board, feeling the pinch of poverty, at its session last night reduced the salaries of two watchmen from \$130 to \$100 a month, turned a deaf ear to the recommendation of the committee on property that an appraisal committee be employed to place values upon properties the board hopes to purchase, and approved a recommendation of the committee on education that no action be taken at this time to ask again for a 2-mill levy for building purposes.

Voices of all six directors present were raised in the interest of economy in the administration of public funds, and the only one lacking from the chorus was that of Director Thomas, who is on a junket to the east, his expense account being assured the official check by his fellow directors on his return.

Bond of Clerk Boosted.
 In one respect the meeting developed an embarrassment of riches. R. H. Thomas, school clerk and business manager, had drawn to the attention of the committee on business that, while he alone has keys to strong boxes in the city that hold a fortune in negotiable bonds, and besides has authority to draw checks against the school funds in banks for the full amount of the balances, his bond is sufficient to cover a liability of merely \$50,000. Any day he has free access to a million or more in cash and bonds, and this situation has existed for years.

The committee at once became interested and made a recommendation that bonds of the clerk be put at a minimum of \$100,000 and that the county auditor inspect the securities in the vaults, including his findings in the monthly reports he renders.

MISS CARPENTER FREE
 Girl More Than 18 Released From Frazer Detention Home.

Alice Carpenter was ordered released from the Frazer detention home yesterday when the hearing on a habeas corpus proceeding before Presiding Circuit Judge Taxwell developed that the girl was more than 18 years of age and that the court of domestic relations lacked jurisdiction. Judge Kanier of the latter court agreed with Judge Taxwell and Deputy District Attorney Henry that the girl was too old to be committed to the home for the feeble-minded by his court, but said that he intended to ask a ruling on the case from the office of the attorney-general.

A brother of the girl, Frank J. Carpenter, brought the habeas corpus action, charging that his father, Lewis Carpenter, was endeavoring to railroad his sister to the asylum and to have her sterilized.

Salem Store Is Robbed.
 SALEM, Or., July 21.—(Special).—Unidentified men last night entered the Lookhart department store and appropriated a watch and chain, a suit of clothes, two rings and other merchandise. This was the second time this store has been robbed within two months.

A. activities and has served as chairman of the physical committee for some time. He was elected to the board of directors in January.
