

DENTIST REPORTED IN SAN FRANCISCO

Ex-Roseburg Man Suspects
Bumfield's Presence.

DETECTIVES BEGIN HUNT

Longer Flees to Street When
Hopes for Capture of Russell
Murderer Are Expressed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 22.—Herbert B. Brecht, a mechanic reported to Captain of Police Detectives Matheson today that he believes a man who addressed him in a hotel lobby here last Tuesday night and then hurried from the place was Dr. H. M. Bumfield, dentist of Roseburg, Or., sought for the murder of Dennis Russell.

Following Brecht's report, Captain Matheson detailed detectives to search hotels in the southern part of San Francisco on the theory that Bumfield may be in hiding here.

Brecht told Matheson that he had formerly lived at Roseburg and was personally acquainted with Russell, but not with Bumfield. Tuesday night, he told Matheson, he was sitting in the lobby, reading, when a man in the next chair remarked:

"I see they got old Kabeer," Brecht said that without looking up he remarked:

"Well, I hope they get Bumfield, who murdered my old friend Russell."

Instantly, Brecht declared, the man turned and hurried out of the hotel. Brecht stated that last October he had lived in Roseburg and knew that Bumfield many times had attempted to hire Russell to blow up some dumps with dynamite. He said Russell always had refused because he did not understand the use of explosives.

BRUMFIELD CLEWS TRACED

Douglas County Officers Are Con-
fident of Capture.

ROSEBURG, Or., July 22.—(Special.)—Aside from the assertion of officers that new information is being received daily, which is proving of great assistance in clearing up the murder mystery, there are some new developments in the Brumfield case today. The officers said they had obtained considerable information, the nature of which they are unable to disclose without destroying their chance of capturing the alleged murderer of Dennis Russell, and they appeared to be confident that they would be able to apprehend the missing dentist within a reasonable length of time.

"I have never been connected with any case of a murder or any case of such magnitude involving such a great number of clues and theories," District Attorney Neuner said today. "So far as the mystery is concerned, I believe that the officers have solved that satisfactorily. There is no mystery in my mind regarding the case for with the information I have at hand, based purely upon concrete evidence, I have no doubt about the crime and am confident that the murderer will be apprehended in due course of time."

The officers have expressed their appreciation of the co-operation given by officials all over the north-west. Sheriff Starnes said he had received the best of assistance from other sheriffs and officers, and that this has greatly aided in the search. Additional notices are being circulated by the Douglas county authorities, and it is intended to cover the country with the pictures and descriptions of the missing dentist and the notice of the reward offered for his capture.

A reward of \$100 was offered yesterday for information which would solve the mystery of his disappearance. In an effort to bring in a clue, the Shriners and Masons who will participate in the search tomorrow will start without a clue, but they will have no stone unturned in their efforts to relieve the suspense of the distracted family.

Mr. Jameson, who formerly was manager of the Webfoot Lumber company, was thought to have been in a state of dependency shortly prior to his disappearance, when he was reported to have been seen by a friend who met him on Morrison street. He had suffered financial reverses on account of the uncertain condition of the lumber market.

GRAND JURY INDICTS 7

3 ALLEGED WATER PISTOL
ROBBERS ARE HELD.

Leon Starr and Leonard Wilson
Accused of Attacking Girl in
Course of Auto Ride.

CLARENCE GODDARD, Earl Fogarty and Lloyd Mayer, alleged water pistol highwaymen, were indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury yesterday on a charge of holding up Leighton R. Smith at East Ninth and East Main streets July 11. He was robbed of \$5.

Leon Starr, who was turned over to the grand jury from the court of domestic relations judge, Judge Kohls, found him mentally responsible for his actions, and Leonard Wilson, who was indicted on a charge of assault and battery, they were said to have attacked Loretta Isakson, whom they invited to ride to town in their automobile on the night of June 20.

Ed Larogne, caught in the act of pulling back the bolt fastening the door between his room and that of Frank Aylwin in the Glenwood hotel after a hole had been bored in the panel according to evidence submitted to the grand jury, was indicted on a charge of burglary. The arrest was on the night of July 17.

Mathew Halson was indicted on complaint of his divorced wife Grace on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon. He was said to have slashed her with a razor while visiting at the home of Mrs. Lucy Kirby, 475 Summer street.

Albert Reynolds was indicted for the alleged holdup of Thomas Nickles on the night of June 25.

SHORTAGE PUT AT \$3000

Ball of Clerk Accused of Thefts Will
Be Raised, It Is Said.

PENDLETON, Or., July 22.—(Special.)—The shortage in Multnomah county of which K. C. Amann, clerk in the roadmaster's office, was arrested yesterday, will amount to between \$3000 and \$4000, it was learned from an authoritative source today. The employment of an expert to determine the shortage, said C. H. Randall, deputy district attorney.

The accused man will appear before Justice Richards at Athena tomorrow morning and his bail, set yesterday at \$2000, will be raised to \$5000, according to Colonel J. H. Daley of the law firm of Raley, Raley & Steiwer, retained by Amann. It also was said he would waive preliminary hearing, which automatically will bind him over to the September grand jury.

Amann is maintaining silence regarding the charges.

HOQUIAM FARE IS CUT

Street Railway Also Reduces Tariff
for Run to Aberdeen.

HOQUIAM, Wash., July 22.—(Special.)—Though Hoquiam has had jitney service to Aberdeen and bus service to beaches and many points in the county, the operation of buses for traffic within the city has never been attempted. Within the last few days, however, the Grays Harbor Railway & Light company has changed its rate from a 6-cent fare for within either of the cities and a 12-cent fare between them with privilege of transfer, to a straight 10-cent fare everywhere. Yesterday a local bus company started operating buses into North Hoquiam, charging only 5 cents.

The electric company here has also solicited merchants of the city for a deposit of money equal to what they would probably spend for light in two months and a half.

DRYS FORM FOR DRIVE

Organized Attack to Be Made on
Activities of Bootlegger.

TACOMA, Wash., July 22.—(Special.)—State and federal authorities were marshaling their forces today for a renewed and more scientific war on bootleggers.

S. P. Butler, assistant field superintendent of the federal prohibition enforcement department, with headquarters in San Francisco, is in Tacoma going over the records of the local office and preparing plans for the launching of a drive against the bootlegging activity.

Butler prepared to transfer the office of the federal prohibition department in this state to the complete control of the state prohibition director.

HARVEST HAND IS KILLED

C. B. Sailor's Derelict Comes in Con-
tact With Live Wire.

LA GRANDE, Or., July 22.—(Special.)—One of the most tragic accidents of the harvest season occurred Tuesday in Walla Walla county, when Clarence B. Sailor was electrocuted while working on a F. D. McCully ranch near Joseph.

Sailor was busy moving a hay derrick, the top of which came in contact with a live wire, resulting in Sailor's death. The body passed through here Wednesday night en route to Columbus, O., for burial.

Otto Bush Convicted.

SALEM, Or., July 22.—(Special.)—Otto Bush, aged 55, today was found guilty in the justice court here on a charge of assault upon Samuel Dingee, 74. The evidence indicated that the men had engaged in a fist fight, with Bush as the aggressor. Bush will be sentenced Monday.

SALEM, Or., July 22.—(Special.)—More than 200 students at the Monmouth Normal school will come to Salem tomorrow to visit the state institutions. Most of the students are attending the summer school.

FINDING OF DEBTS OF RAILWAYS NEAR

President to Submit Plan to
Congress at Once.

SETTLEMENT IS REACHED

Obligations to Government Total
About \$500,000,000 After 40
Per Cent Deduction.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22.—President Harding will submit to congress next Tuesday the administration plan for funding the debts of the railroads to the government and meeting without additional appropriations the claims of the roads growing out of federal control.

An understanding has been reached between the roads and the administration. It was learned today, to facilitate speedy settlement of the claims of the carriers without any new arrangement or modification of the war-time contracts with the government. Authority to fund the debts of the roads, it was explained, is given the president by the transportation act, but it was deemed advisable to acquaint the congress with the methods under consideration.

RAILWAYS MAKE CONCESSION

After three weeks of negotiations the basis upon which the railroads' claims would be quickly met was said to have been reached through the roads acceding to the administration's request to waive claims for "inefficiency of labor" in work done on the lines by the government before returning them to private control.

The administration's position during the negotiations with the carriers was declared to have been that the roads ought to facilitate settlement without considering what the government regarded as extravagant claims for efficiency of labor. Only these claims, it was asserted, were in dispute, and so far the railroad administration has refused, with the approval of the president, to make any adjustments on that basis.

FRANK UNDERSTOOD

On the other hand, the administration felt, it was asserted, that the government had not been fair to the railroads and should give them what was rightfully theirs. At the same time it was desirable to facilitate settlement of the railroad administration, an expensive government agency. The administration and the railroads, it was maintained, had sought a frank understanding, which by laying aside elaborate claims for inefficiency of labor, would speed up the settlement desired. While all railroads participated in the short line, were not represented in the association of railway executives with whom negotiations were conducted, it was believed that the understanding reached would meet with the approval of all the carriers.

DEBTS TOTAL \$500,000,000

Debts of the roads to the government have been generally estimated at about \$500,000,000, while their claims have been put at various figures. The direct general of Railroads said that the roads had given them a recent estimate to congress, declared that while all the roads participated in the short line, the total would be \$1,250,000,000, which, settled on the basis of about 40 per cent as heretofore, would approximate \$500,000,000.

DELAYED CLAIM IS LOST

COURT UPHOLDS TIME LIMIT
ON COMPENSATION ACT.

Verdict of Jury Establishes Fact of
Injury, but Court Finds Wife
of Victim Waited Too Long.

Validity of the time limitation requirement of the workmen's compensation law in the matter of filing claims was sustained against an attack brought on the grounds that a case of mental disability would suspend the provision when Circuit Judge McCourt handed down his decision yesterday in the case of Fred N. Lough against the state industrial accident commission.

The claim was thrown out of court because filed nearly two years after the injury was received instead of within the 90 days required by law. This followed the verdict of a jury that the claimant was injured by a falling bolt while in the pursuit of his duties with the Columbia River Shipbuilding corporation, October 1, 1919. The verdict merely was advisory to the court in the acceptance of facts alleged in the claim filed May 2, 1921.

Lough's wife presented the claim for him, saying that when he was hit by the bolt he was rendered mentally and physically incapable of making a claim for compensation or even of appreciating the fact that he had such a claim. She said she did not know such a claim existed until just before the claim was filed.

Attorneys for Lough contended that the nature of the disability suspended the limitation requirement of the law.

BETTER BOOKS DEMANDED

CHAUTAUQUA SPEAKER URGES
HIGHER IDEALS.

Father D. J. Cronin Discusses Lit-
erature as Food Upon Which
Character Is Nourished.

OREGON CITY, July 22.—(Special.)—Literature as the mental food upon which character is nourished was the subject of Father D. J. Cronin at the Chautauqua today. He urged a plea for better books and higher literary ideals.

The first consideration in reading material, the speaker said, was the daily press. He blamed the reading public rather than the editors for the faults and weaknesses of the press. He said that the appetite of the people was what brought the news columns to be an "assorted collection of the violations of the ten commandments during the past 24 hours."

The better type of present day magazines, Father Cronin characterized as the "soda fountain" of American literature, where readers went for something to eat and entertain rather than for a square literary meal.

The speaker dealt at considerable

length with the field of the modern novel, lauding those of the better type, but condemning the book of the short-lived, best seller type, which possessed a cheap appeal.

The afternoon programme was begun by a community singing led by Walter Jenkins of Portland, who also directed a half-hour sing before the evening programme.

"Nothing But the Truth," a modern comedy, was presented to an audience that literally packed the grounds. In the morning Rev. C. O. McCulloch, Rev. W. S. Gordon, and Rev. M. T. Wire spoke at the forum hour of the subject of "The Union of All Churches." The forum was followed by a Methodist assembly picnic.

The symposium presented two lecturers, Mrs. Molly Barlow Wilkins and Fred V. Holman. Mrs. Barlow lectured on "Marking Historic High-spots." Mr. Holman's lecture was on the subject of rose culture.

Spinsters, Says Missourian, Under
Bill Would Dictate to Mothers
on Raising Babies.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22.—The Sheppard bill, providing for co-operation between the federal government and states in "protection of maternity and infancy," was passed today by the senate and sent to the house.

The vote on passage was 63 to 7, after sharp clashes between advocates and opponents. The former declared the legislation was a great humanitarian step, denying that it contemplated interference in the home; the latter asserted that it was "socialistic, paternalistic and bohemian."

Three republicans, Senators Borah of Idaho, Moses of New Hampshire and Warren of Wyoming, were joined by four democrats, Broussard of Louisiana, King of Utah, Reed of Missouri and Bennett of Georgia, in opposing the bill's passage.

The federal children's bureau would administer the act. The bill carries an initial appropriation of \$1,480,000 which the states would be required to match.

Senator Reed declared that "spinsters" of the children's bureau would dictate to American mothers, and offered an amendment to change the title to "A bill to organize a board of spinsters to teach mothers how to raise babies." The amendment was rejected without a roll call.

Senator Kenyon, republican, Iowa, will be in charge of the bill. He said that the bill would be a "drain on the treasury" and that it would be a "disgrace to the nation" if it were passed.

LARGER BOARD PROPOSED

MORE POWER TO WAR FINANCE
CORPORATION AIM.

Measure Being Drawn to Supplement
Pending Norris Bill—Second
Agency Held Unnecessary.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 22.—Enlargement of the functions and governing board of the war finance corporation is proposed in a bill now being prepared, according to information reaching senators today, as a substitute for the pending Norris bill.

No additional appropriation of \$500,000 revolving fund of the war finance corporation is contemplated. The bill would give the corporation sufficient for farm export financing as well as commercial aid.

The new measure, it was reported, would give the war finance corporation power to finance exports of agricultural products without creating another government corporation.

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FAMOUS TRAIN REVIVED

Aged Driver at Throttle of Engine
That Holds World's Record.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 22.—Charles Hogan, 70 years old, who managed the old engine No. 999 when it made her record run of 112.5 miles an hour, May 10, 1893, was again at the throttle of the famous Empire state when she left here this afternoon for Chicago, drawing the old DeWitt Clinton train.

Hogan declared he did not know if he could hold the throttle all the way to Buffalo, but he insisted he would engineer the trip over the scene between Lancaster and Critchfield, where he established the record that never has been beaten.

STRIKE SWEEPS FILMDOM

Thirteen Motion Picture Studios
Affected by Walkout.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 22.—Thirteen motion picture studios have been affected by the strike of their mechanics against an order reducing wages. About 1200 men were out, according to a statement today by representatives of producers.

Most of the studios simply shut down when the men struck and announced intention of halting production until September. Three or four of them have declared the open-shop and have employed other workers.
