SCOTCH PIPERS TO GIVE CONCERT

the Clan Macleary have charge of the
boat for that evening and they will
have the Canadian veterans as spe-
cial guests and have extended a gen-

and get acquainted. The Swan leaves
the foot of Yamhill streets at 8:30
o'clock.

CHAMBER DISTRICTS BOOKLETS

More than 1000 copies each of the two
descriptive booklets on Portland and
the Columbia river highway have
been distributed at the Portland auto
park to tourists by the Chamber of
Commerce so far this month and the
demand for these booklets, which con-
tain road maps and the city map, is
still great. Miss Josephine H. Foster,
of the publicity department of the
chamber, made an inspection trip to
the campground at the corner of
Portland boulevard and Albina avenue
yesterday, to take an allotment of
the booklets to the tourists. There
were about 250 cars in the park,
with families of tourists. The regis-
tration Wednesday was 70 cars, while
58 registered Thursday. Tourists from
all parts of the country are camped
there.

TACOMA BURGERS ARRESTED

Burglars of a Tacoma house were ar-
rested yesterday in Portland before
the Tacoma police force had dis-
covered the burglary. Detectives
Coleman, Collins and Craddock ar-
rested Lester Thomas, alias Earl
Hunt, 29 years old, who is a resident
of Joliet, Ill., and Charles E. Chamber-
lain, 32 years old, while they were in
the act of selling some of the stolen
property. They confessed to robbing
a house in Tacoma belonging to a
doctor, but could give no definite
names or address. They described
the location of the residence and a
telegram was sent to the Tacoma
authorities, the amount to
several hundred dollars.

HAROLD ANDERSON CLEARED

Harold Anderson, accused of shooting Charles
Harwood, a member of the Yaquina
bay coast guard station at Newport,
last March will not go to trial. The
Lincoln county grand jury found
no true bill when they had heard the
evidence presented by Anderson and
Harwood. It was said that Anderson
did not deny the shooting as he had
telephoned Sheriff McIlvain at Toledo
that he had killed Harwood. Harwood
killed Mrs. Anna Baird and then
killed himself, had contemplated
the acts for some time, according to
Mrs. H. H. Martin, 509 Everett street,
at whose home Shepard had lived
since last October.

DANCE CONCERT

BOY INJURED BY AUTOMOBILE

Playing in the street in front of his home
at 609 Twenty-sixth street southeast,
yesterday afternoon, William Corbin,
7 years old, was knocked down and
hurt when he was hit by an automo-
bile driven by Lawrence Talbot, 647
Twenty-sixth street southeast. Talbot
attempted to stop his machine when
he saw the boy in front of him, but
the wheels about 20 feet. This
prevented injuries more serious than
several cuts and bruises.

MAN ACCUSED OF THEFT ARRESTED

Accused by his roommate, Paul Ful-

INTRUDER IN CONDITION

The condition of Albert W. Carr,
alleged burglar of the Hoyt hotel,
who was shot by detectives on the
roof of an adjoining building yester-
day morning, was reported at
Vancouver hospital to be unchanged
late last night. Hospital authorities
entertain grave doubts of Carr's re-
covery. He was charged with carry-
ing concealed weapons.

MOTORCYCLE PATROLMEN HUNT

While returning from an emergency
call, Motorcycle Patrolman Ingle col-
lided with an automobile driven by
E. T. Bolen, 992 East Thirtieth street,
at East Fifteenth and Weidler streets,
and sustained a number of painful
cuts and bruises. Ingle was thrown
from his machine to the street by the
impact and his motorcycle was badly
damaged. He was treated at the
emergency hospital and sent home.

LUMBER ASSETS \$21,055

The schedule of assets and liabilities of the
Miller Woodruff Lumber company,
whose involuntary petition of bank-
ruptcy was filed June 9, was regis-
tered yesterday. The firm has assets
amounting to \$21,055, and liabilities
amounting to \$25,481.55 according to
the statement. Most of the company's
holdings were in Scappoose and Col-
umbia county.

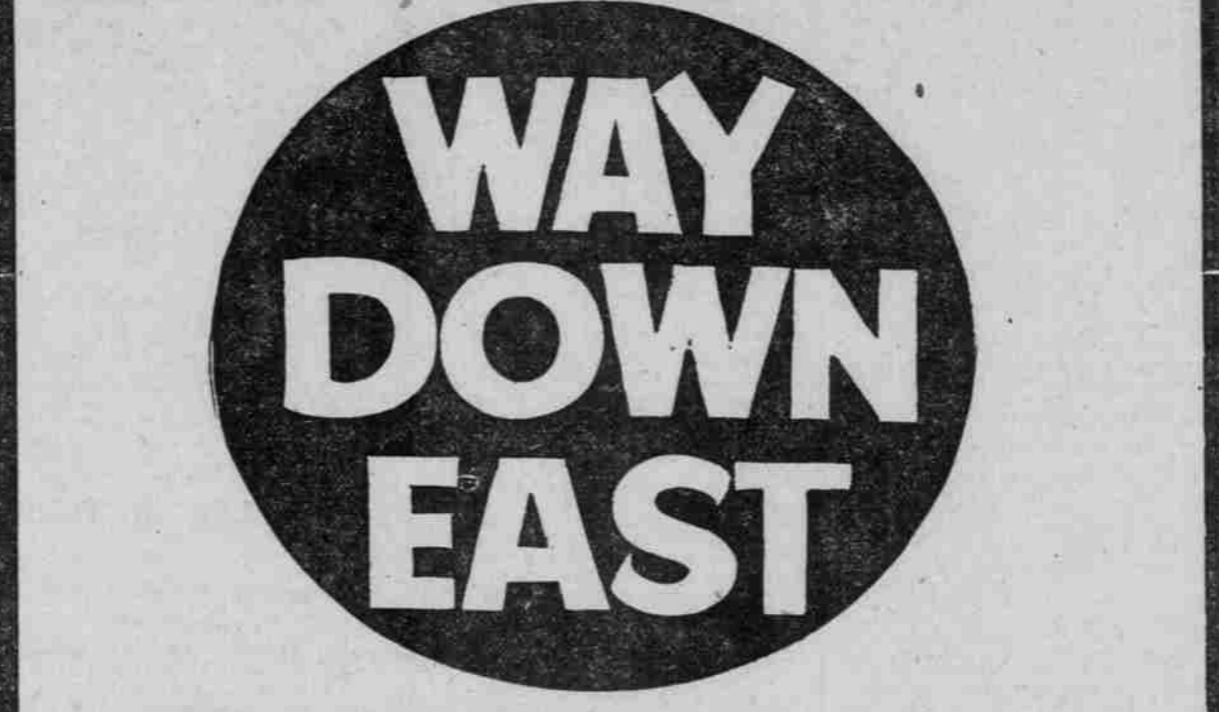
