

IRISH PARLIAMENT MEETS AUGUST 16

Notices Are Sent Members of Organization.

ULSTER HOLDING BACK

Meeting With Republicans in Dublin Reported to Have Been Turned Down by Northerners.

DUBLIN, Aug. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Irish republican parliament has been summoned to meet Tuesday, August 16, the Irish Bulletin, the official republican organ, announced tonight. Notices have been sent to all the members of the parliament.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Irish situation took a sensational turn today when it was announced in Dublin that Eamon de Valera and his associates had decided to summon a full meeting of the Irish republican parliament to consider the British government's Irish peace proposals.

It has been repeatedly stated in Dublin that the Dal Eireann should not be submitted until Ulster's attitude had been learned, but coincident with the calling of the parliament, today came conflicting reports from Dublin and Belfast concerning Ulster's position.

Dublin Meeting Vetted.
In Dublin it was reported that Ulster has been sounded and has returned an answer unfavorable to the Sinn Fein overtures. A dispatch to the Evening News from Belfast today asserted that the Ulster cabinet at this morning's meeting discussed an invitation from the Dal Eireann to Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, asking him to attend a conference in Dublin with a view to determining Ulster's attitude.

It added that there is no possibility, however, of another meeting between Sir James and Mr. De Valera in Dublin, although the Ulster premier is willing to meet the republican leader with Premier Lloyd George in London.

Out of the various conflicting reports, however, arises the question of the fact that the republican parliament is to meet, which is taken to mean undoubtedly, that Lloyd George will give a reply to Mr. De Valera in the immediate future.

Wireless Sent De Valera.
Official quarters in London know of no communications having passed between Mr. De Valera and the northern cabinet, but it was understood from another source that Premier Lloyd George, after conferring with Sir James in London this week, sent a wireless message to Mr. De Valera, which might account for the calling of the parliament.

The British cabinet already has reached a decision regarding the release of members of the Dal Eireann or in detention camps, and it is understood that the British cabinet is to release them as it thinks fit. Members who have been on the run are understood to have returned to their homes in order that they may receive their summons.

Sir James Craig left London for Belfast last night after receiving a memorial from a large number of members of the house of lords and commons to commiserate with the nation from the lower house of parliament to accept the premier's offer of Ulster.

ULSTER CABINET ASSEMBLES
Reception of Proposal From De Valera Is Denied.

BELFAST, Aug. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Ulster cabinet met this morning for a short session, at the close of which there was no communication passed as to the subject of its deliberations.

It was authoritatively learned, however, that no message from Eamon de Valera, the Irish republican leader, has as yet reached the northern cabinet.

ROTARY CLUB PLANS TRIP

Mr. Hauser was a major in the 14th engineers (railway) during the recent war and participated in some of the extensive railroad construction activities of the American army in France.

SCHOOL COURSE REVISED

Washington Adopts New Changes in Study of English.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Radical revision of English courses in elementary schools and high schools of the state is announced today by the state department of education, which has approved the report of the committee appointed by the state superintendent, Mrs. Josephine Corliss Preston.

High lights in the revision report are the transference of all technical grammar from the eighth to the high school, and the placing of emphasis upon oral English, written composition and study of literature.

Teaching of technical grammar, such as parts of speech and sentence structure, will be confined to the necessities of the student's composition work, but correctness of habitual speech and writing will be an important factor in his promotion.

WORK IN HOSPITALS PLANNED BY KNIGHTS

Catholic Order After Fund of \$2,500,000.

AID FOR SOLDIERS AIM

Secretaries Trained in War Duty to Provide Comforts for Disabled Veterans.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 4.—An announcement that the Knights of Columbus would expend approximately \$2,500,000 on hospitalization work for disabled ex-service men was made at the final session of the annual international Knights of Columbus convention here today by William J. McGinley, supreme secretary.

"This decision has been reached following an arrangement with the United States public health service whereby the Knights of Columbus will go into government military and marine hospitals to provide the disabled men with comforts and recreation," he said. "We shall also maintain such vocational training schools as we are already conducting for the benefit of shell-shocked men."

Knights of Columbus secretaries experienced in war work will be attached to the larger hospitals. The knights, Mr. McGinley added, will continue their 500 college and university courses during the forthcoming year, and the chain of 123 Knights of Columbus night vocational schools for veterans and civilians also will be maintained.

Dante Celebration Planned
It was announced that the aid of Maurice Egan, formerly United States minister to Denmark, Dr. James J. Walsh and Conde B. Palen of New York would be enlisted in promoting the Knights of Columbus celebration of Dante's 600th anniversary. These men, the announcement said, will be asked to deliver lectures in principal cities throughout the country.

The Knights of Columbus, in view of present negotiations for the settlement of the Irish question, resolved today that it would not adopt any new policy to supplement its resolution of the 1920 supreme convention in New York endorsing Irish self-government. Last year's resolution accepted Irish claims for self-determination and self-government, and urged the United States to recognize a form of government set up by these claims.

"We cannot admit," said Supreme Advocate Pelletier, district attorney of Boston, "that the Irish condition is a matter of religious or domestic politics. We feel that the protest of a people in asking for self-government for more than 700 years, coupled with the declarations of the great world war, fought that men might be free, makes the condition of Ireland a matter of concern to the conscience of the world."

The convention endorsed the Boy Scout movement in the United States wherever it has been approved by state legislatures. It also expressed its approval of the Boy Scouts of America, and urged the United States to recognize a form of government set up by these claims.

Welfare Work Contemplated.
"It is our aim to go into Italy and introduce American welfare work which the Knights of Columbus have been able to perform so successfully here at home and abroad."

"In this way we hope, in part, to repay Italy the debt laid upon America when Columbus, the great Italian, founded this western world and made it possible for Christendom to extend its sphere. We are going into the land of Columbus, probably into the home city of Columbus, to help the youth of his country."

Mr. Pelletier added that it was improbable the Knights of Columbus would extend its organization proper into Italy, saying that the immediate plans called for the establishment of an American service center in Rome under the patronage of Pope Benedict. He emphasized the fact that the Knights of Columbus were not money would not be expended on the new undertaking, but that the knights would raise a new fund for the project.

\$5000 Is Received.
Supreme Knight Flaherty announced that Peter Krantzse of Chicago, consul at Luxembourg, had telegraphed the first donation, one of \$5000.

The knights remained in session long after midnight last night.

ENGINE COMPANY REVIVED

Pioneer Fire-Fighting Organization of Jacksonville Reorganized.

JACKSONVILLE, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Jacksonville engine company No. 1, organized in the early pioneer days when Jacksonville was the principal city within a radius of 100 miles, has been revived and the company bids to give Jacksonville as good as, if not better, fire protection than any town of twice its size in Oregon.

George F. Lindley, who has had several years' experience in volunteer fire fighting, also is a paid fire department work, has been selected as foreman of the company and is busy perfecting plans for the department.

Mayor Britt, a member of the organization since boyhood, was re-elected to the office of treasurer, which position he held for many years.

The members of the company are planning the purchase of a light auto truck, upon which will be mounted a Siamese type chemical fire engine and several hundred feet of fire hose. This together with Jacksonville's gravity water system, with a pressure of 125 pounds to the square inch, will assure protection against fire that few cities of the size of the pioneer town now have.

Credentials Are Presented for Entrance to University.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Martha Shull of 214 Overton street, Portland, a graduate of the Lincoln high school, has the highest scholastic average of any girl in the state, and has been awarded credentials for admission to the University of Oregon next fall. Her average was 98.

Virginia Broughton, 553 Wasco street, presented 16½ units of straight "E" work from Jefferson high school for admission to the university. Margaret Skavlan, 493 East Eleventh street north, also a graduate of Jefferson high school, made a record of 18 units of high school work of "E" grade.

NONE EXEMPT, IS RULING

Washington Auto Drivers' License Law Applies to Everyone.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—State officials and employees are not exempt from the drivers' license law, no matter whether they operate private or state-owned vehicles, Attorney General Thompson ruled today. Where the car is operated for state purposes only, the driver may charge his tax fee to the appropriation made for the support of his department.

The National Guard is a department of the state, the decision held, and the same rule is applicable to the operation of cars by employees thereof.

Motion Picture Promoter Accused of \$90,000 Swindle.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—Jacques R. Chiriac, promoter of several motion picture film concerns, was arraigned in Tombs court today and accused of defrauding Russian soviet government depositors here of \$90,000.

The case was adjourned until next week, when state prosecutors said they wished to produce as a witness Dr. William Chapin Huntington, said to be about to depart for Paris to assume the position of commercial attache to the American embassy there.

Mexicans Watch for Banker.

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Aug. 4.—Chief of Police E. Hermosillo announced today that he and his men had been watching for several days all trains and automobiles on stage lines to Chihuahua City for a man who resembled a few Japanese, the missing Chicago banker, but so far they have failed to find any traveler who suits his description.

Sixteen Killed in Wreck.

VLADIVOSTOK, Aug. 3.—In a collision between a passenger and a freight train today near Nikolai, 16 persons were killed and 18 injured, among them a few Japanese. The collision was said to have been caused by bands of partisans who have been engaged in sporadic hostilities in that region.

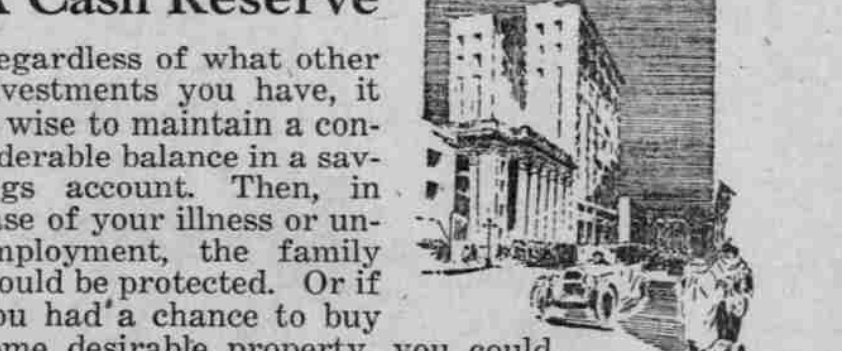
