PORTLAND WILL GET CHEAPER GAS RATES

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION TO ORDER REDUCTION.

President Williams Announces Im pending Cut, but Cannot Give Details Pending Survey.

An order reducing the price of gas charged by the Portland Gas company will be forthcoming within the next few days from the public service commission, following the re duction in the cost of crude oil, if the prediction made yesterday by Fred A. Williams, member of the Rival for Wedding Ring Is ommission, is borne out.

Mr. Williams said that immediately following the announcement -of the reduction in the cost of crude of the commission detailed two engineers to make an investigation and report back to that body.

engineers is in our hands, it is impossible to say anything definitely, said Mr. Williams, "but it is safe to say that there will be a reduction. The amount of the reduction will depend on the report.

Mr. Williams said that the last reduction in rates on gas ordered by he commission was greater than the figures actually had justifled by something like \$25,000. This, he said would have to be taken into consideration in any further reduction. The engineers are measuring the

quantity of crude oil in the tanks of the gas company and making a check on other matters involved in the figuring of the new rate to be charged The gas company's rates originally were ordered increased by the commission January 17 of this year, the increase being based upon an in-crease in the price of crude oil from 74% cents a barrel to approximately \$2.50 a barrel. The rate at that time might require hereafter an artificial
