

SEASIDE DOLLS UP
TO DEDICATE WALLLarge Crowds to Attend Cel-
ebration Today.

STREETS IN SUN DRESS

Visiting Mayors to Be Guests at
Banquet Tonight; Hotels In-
crease Facilities.

SEASIDE, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Large crowds already are on hand to attend the dedication and the gala celebration to be held in honor of the newly completed seawall and promenade tomorrow and Sunday. This new \$200,000 structure, the most expensive and magnificent of its kind in the United States, being unrivaled both in length and in width by any similar work in any of the seashore resorts either on the Atlantic or the Pacific coast.

A large programme has been planned for the benefit of the many visitors expected in the city during the two days of the celebration. "We expect a tremendous crowd," said Miss Leah Leaska, who has been appointed general chairman of the programme of festivities. All the hotels and restaurants have increased facilities for the accommodation of their guests. Seaside has a fine esplanade. It is solid concrete, 800 feet long, extending from Twelfth avenue on the north to the former Seaside hospital on the south, and is electrically lighted throughout by conduit.

Streets are Decorated.
The committee of Seaside citizens in charge of the celebration includes Mayor E. N. Hurd, M. F. Hardesty, L. L. Paget, Dr. O. C. Hagemeier, Dr. R. G. Moss, Roy Williams, E. S. Proulx, E. E. Peterson, George Otton, G. L. Corey, Charles Niemi, C. W. Rowley, A. R. Wascher and Arthur Clark with Miss Leaska in charge over all. Elaborate preparations are in effect throughout the city. In front of the Hotel Seaside a speaking platform has been erected where the dedication ceremony will take place. The streets have been arrayed in their dress with evergreen foliage adorning every telephone pole and lamp post, pennants and banners flying, and all the sidewalks cleaned, spick and span in preparation for the merrymaking.

In honor of the visiting mayors and other notables who will gather here for the occasion upon special invitation of the mayor of Seaside, a banquet will be given at the Hotel Seaside tomorrow evening. Among those who will be present are Governor Ben Olcott, Mayor Baker of Portland, Mayor Halverson of Salem, Mayor Bremner of Astoria, Mayor Warren of Warrenton, Mayor Sallou of St. Helena, Edgar B. Piper of Portland, J. S. Dellinger of the Morning Astorian, G. C. Fulton of Astoria, Frank McCall of Portland, Julius L. Meier of Portland, Roger E. Pinneo, manager of the port of Astoria and Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Smith of Baker. Toasts and speeches by the visitors will be the feature of this affair.

On the beach Sunday the visitors will be entertained by special airplane feats by H. V. Shaffer, V. N. Rechsteiner and H. B. Scovell, all of whom have promised the most thrilling of loops, wing-overs, tail spins, Immelman turns, side slips, vertical banks, nose dives, combs and other death-defying stunts of skill.

ROAD CONTRACTS RUSHED

JOBS NOW UNDER WAY TO BE
FINISHED THIS YEAR.Adequate Labor Supply and Plenty
of Materials Make Easy Sail-
ing for Contractors.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Contractors employed by the state in road improvement work are making faster progress this season than at any time in the history of the state highway department, according to a report prepared here today by Roy Klein, secretary of the commission. Mr. Klein said today that practically all contracts now awarded would be completed before fall.

In previous years it was customary to carry over many contracts, with the result that roads in various parts of the state were in bad condition during the winter.

Rapid progress being made by contractors was attributed to the adequate labor supply and the fact that no delays have been encountered in obtaining materials.

As soon as the present road contracts are completed Mr. Klein said the highway department would disburse with the services of many of its engineers, and that the operating expenses of the commission would be reduced to the minimum.

PACIFIC HIGHWAY CLOSED

Work of Widening Section Between
Chehalis and Centralia Begun.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—To expedite the work of widening the Pacific highway between Centralia and Chehalis, the road has been closed to traffic by order of the county commissioners. It will not be reopened until the Southwest Washington fair, the week of August 22. In the meantime traffic will be directed over the old river road between the two cities. A night shift will be put on by the contractors to hasten the highway work.

The pouring of concrete will begin next Monday on the National Park highway, which is to be paved from its intersection with the Pacific highway on Jackson prairie to Ethel Thomas Morgan has the contract.

YOUTH ALLEGED ROBBER

Carl Johnson, 19, Turned Over to
Authorities at Centralia.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Carl Johnson, 19, was arrested early this morning by Patrolman Buck after he is alleged to have robbed Joe Wilkins' pool hall. He will be turned over to the county for prosecution. Johnson is said to have expressed a willingness to plead guilty.

SAMUEL HILL VISITS BEND

RECLAMATION OF 27,000 ACRES
IS ASSURED.Plans to Purchase Irrigation Rights
Await Only Approval of
Land Board.

BEND, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Plans under consideration by Samuel Hill for the reclamation of more than 27,000 acres of the north canal segregation, lying within the central Oregon irrigation district boundaries, have reached a stage where only the desert land board's disapproval of the contract filed this week to take over the Central Oregon irrigation company's rights in the north canal dam and the Benham falls reservoir will prevent construction. This was the declaration today of Mr. Hill, who, with Oswald West and J. C. Potter of Portland, visited in Bend after going over the north canal lands.

Organization of a \$250,000 corporation under the name of the North Canal company is contingent on approval of the contract.

Mr. Hill believes that the country east of the Cascades will be one of the richest in the world if properly developed. "Of course, I cannot say definitely that it will be done," he said. "But we are hoping that it will, and I can see no reason why it should not. Reclamation must come. Central Oregon must have her chance."

The chief object in coming to Bend and Redmond was to make sure that the proposed venture would have the support of the people of both communities. After interviewing representative business men of both cities, Mr. West expressed the belief that this backing would not be withheld.

The contract which was presented to the desert land board, Mr. West explained, calls for commencement of work within six months after the secretary has extended the time for reclamation. Completion of the task is to be within five years after the work is started. The estimated cost is \$1,000,000. The secretary of the interior, Mr. West said, is ready to extend the time as soon as a request for the same is made by the state.

6 I. W. W. SUSPECTS HELD

Radical Literature Also Seized in
Raid at Aberdeen.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Six men, suspected of being I. W. W. sent here to reorganize this district, were arrested, and about 75 pounds of radical literature seized when members of the sheriff's force and Aberdeen police department raided a house at 413 West King street last night, acting on information from Centralia authorities. Three other men, believed to be members of the same band, were arrested the latter part of last week.

Reduced Rates Help Stockmen.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 5.—(Special).—What is looked upon as the forerunner to reduced freight rates in Idaho will be of material help to the stock-

men of this state in the announcement that the interstate commerce commission have granted a 33-1-3 per cent reduction on market shipments of livestock over the Intermountain railway. The proposed reduction will affect all movements of stock between Centerville and Barber Junction.

LAND TO BE ALLOCATED

Settlement Policy in Washington
Will Affect War Veterans.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—W. D. Moreland of Tacoma, Fred M. Weil of White Bluffs and J. C. Hazlett of Wenatchee are members of a committee appointed by C. D. Cunningham, department commander of the American Legion, to confer with Dan A. Scott, director of the state department of conservation and development, before the latter completes his land settlement policy. Under the land settlement law veterans have a preferential right in the allotment of tracts, and among the

questions to be discussed between Mr. Scott and the legion committee will be a plan for determining the fitness of applicants.

Heavy Fine Imposed on Moonshiner

ABERDEEN, Wash., Aug. 5.—(Special).—C. D. Pettit, a rancher living near Satsop, received the heaviest penalty this year for moonshining in Grays Harbor county when Justice of the Peace A. C. McNeill of Montesano, Wednesday night imposed a fine of \$600 and four months in the county jail. A small still and a quantity of moonshine were found on Pettit's ranch by deputy sheriffs. No notice of an appeal has been given.

Higher Price for Apples Predicted.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Aug. 5.—(Special).—Though no market has yet been established, buyers predict prices paid for apples will be higher than those of last year. A great quantity of the apples which were hail pecked during the severe storm in Lewiston orchards in July, may be used for canning.

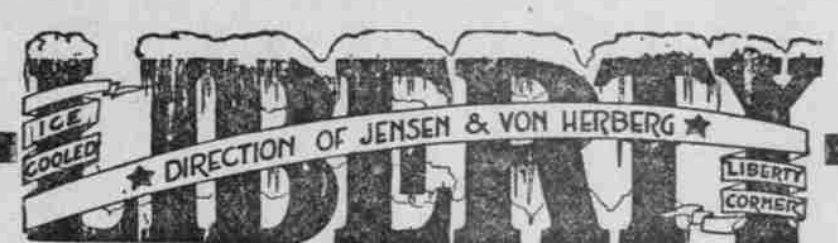
