SUBMARINES SAID TO BE ABLE TO CRUISE 20,000 MILES.

Diesel Engines of More Than Don ble Power of Any in Existence Ordered, Says Report.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 10.-(Special,)-Naval experts were much interested today in a report that Japan is building the largest submarines ever launched by a naval power and that they will have an estimated cruising radius of 20,000 miles and be capable of crossing the Pacific and returning to home bases without refueling.
